



**REPORT OF THE NCAA  
DIVISION I MEN'S BASKETBALL OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE  
JUNE 25, 2026, VIDEOCONFERENCE**

**ACTION ITEMS.**

- **Legislative items.**
  - **Weekly Hour Limitations – Outside the Playing Season – Four-Hour Limitation on Skill Instruction – Eliminate Limitation on Skill Instruction.**
    - (1) Recommendation. The NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Oversight Committee (MBOC) recommends the NCAA Division I Cabinet adopt expedited legislation, for men's basketball, to eliminate the four-hour limitation on skill instruction outside the playing season.
    - (2) Effective date. Immediate.
    - (3) Rationale. This recommendation eliminates the four-hour restriction on skill instruction, which aligns out-of-season activities with summer access. It still maintains the limit of eight hours of countable athletically related activities outside the playing season but provides institutions with autonomy to determine which activities to conduct within the eight-hour CARA limit each week outside the playing season.
    - (4) Estimated budget impact. None.
    - (5) Student-athlete impact. Minimal for there is no increase in the weekly hour time allotment.

**INFORMATIONAL ITEMS.**

1. **Legislative items.**
  - **Complimentary admissions to away-from-home competition after prospective student-athletes written commitment.**
    - (1) Action. The MBOC introduced legislation, in men's basketball, to permit an institution to issue complimentary admissions to a prospective student-athlete (or prospective student athlete's relatives or legal guardians) to an away-from-home competition beginning the calendar day after the prospective student-athlete (1) signs the institution's written offer of admission and/or financial aid or a settlement related benefits agreement; or (2) the institution receives a financial deposit in response to the institution's offer of admission.
    - (2) Effective date. Immediate.
    - (3) Rationale. Each year, situations arise in which a prospective student-athlete signs with an institution that later competes at or near the prospective student-

athlete's home. Existing NCAA rules prevent institutions from providing complimentary admissions to away-from-home contests and presents as overly restrictive in today's climate. Currently, prospective student-athletes are no longer subjected to restrictions on the forms and frequency of communication between institutional administrators or coaching staff members and a prospective student-athlete (or prospective student athlete's relatives or legal guardians) beginning the calendar day after a written commitment marking the end of the recruiting process. Establishing an exception permitting institutions to provide complimentary admissions to away-from-home contests after commitment aligns with the intent of recruiting deregulation, likely to have minimal recruiting or competitive impact and enhances the prospective student-athlete's connection to their future institution consistent with recent legislative modifications related to the period preceding the triggering of student-athlete status.

- (4) Estimated budget impact. Nominal. The proposal does not seek to increase institutional allotments for complimentary admission but rather gives an institution flexibility to distribute its allotment at its discretion.
- (5) Student-athlete impact. None.

**2. NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Oversight Committee June 22 meeting update.** The chair and vice chair of the Women's Basketball Oversight Committee provided an update on several key legislative items and action from their June 22 meeting.

- **Complimentary admissions to away-from-home competition after prospective student-athlete's written commitment.** The WBOC introduced this proposal during their June 22 meeting.
- **Weekly Hour Limitations – Outside the Playing Season – Four-Hour Limitation on Skill Instruction.** The WBOC introduced the proposal during their June 22 meeting.
- **Attendance at Division I basketball contests by men's basketball coaches.** The WBOC did not support adding women's basketball to this proposal at this time. The WBOC plans to monitor this concept for women's basketball and will determine at a later date if this is necessary to add women's basketball to this proposal. Note, the MBOC took action to introduce this proposal during its June 1-2 in-person meeting.
- **Weekly Hour Limitations – Outside the Playing Season and Preseason Practice - On-Court Practice– Preseason Transition Period.** The WBOC introduced a proposal surrounding the preseason transition period. MBOC did not support adding men's basketball to the proposal at this time and recommended that consideration of a transition period occur as part of the broader out-of-season activities concept and a holistic playing season review.

- **Out-of-Season Activities.** The WBOC provided an update on its efforts to collaborate with MBOC on their outside-the-playing-season concept. The WBOC will seek feedback on the current MBOC concept from women's basketball key stakeholders and review the feedback during a future meeting.
3. **Out-of-season activities discussion.** The oversight committee continued its discussion on out-of-season activities in Division I men's basketball. The oversight committee reviewed feedback from key stakeholders, including coaches, student-athletes, conference commissioners, faculty athletics representatives, and the Committee on Competitive Safeguards and Medical Aspects of Sports (CSMAS). The committee agreed that additional feedback and discussions are necessary prior to the potential introduction of a legislative proposal. The committee anticipates introducing a proposal that would change the period of time outside the playing season into the January 2027 legislative cycle.
  4. **NCAA Division I Men's Basketball officiating update.** The oversight committee was provided with a recap of 2025-26 officiating efforts. Further, the oversight committee reviewed data surrounding the 2026 championship which included game length, coach's challenges and appeals summary (i.e., out of bounds and flagrant fouls).
  5. **NCAA Division I Cabinet update.** The oversight committee received an update on the recent adoption of the age-based eligibility legislation by the NCAA Division I Cabinet. The oversight committee shared feedback related to future review on eligibility efforts specific to men's basketball.
  6. **NCAA Division I MBOC nominations for June 2026 vacancies.** The oversight committee was provided with the timeline and details on the process for chair and vice chair elections.
  7. **Identification of discussion topics for the upcoming NCAA Division I Men's and Women's Basketball Oversight Committees' joint meeting.** Due to time constraints, the oversight committee will address this item at a future meeting.
  8. **NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Oversight Committee June 1-2 meeting report.** The oversight committee approved its June 1-2 meeting report.
