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Section 1 • Introduction

During the 2024-25 academic year, the Association will sponsor 90 national championships - 42 for men, 45 for women and three for both men and women. Of the men's championships, three are National Collegiate Championships, 13 are Division I championships, 12 are Division II championships and 14 are Division III championships. Of the women's championships, six are National Collegiate Championships, 12 are Division I championships, 13 are Division II championships and 14 are Division III championships. The combined men's and women's championships are National Collegiate Championships.

The Prechampionship Manual will serve as a resource for institutions to prepare for the championship. This manual is divided into three sections: General Administrative Guidelines, Sport-Specific Information and Appendixes.

Sections one through nine apply to policies applicable to all 90 championships, while the remaining sections are sport specific.

Section 1.1 Definitions

Prechampionship Manual. Resource for institutions to prepare for the championship.

Administrative Meeting. Prechampionship meeting for coaches and/or administrators.

Appendixes. Any supplemental documents to be provided and distributed through the various resources.

Championship Manager. The NCAA staff member(s) responsible for the operational oversight of the championship.

Games Committee. The committee assigned to supervise the conduct of each championship session at a specific site. For finals sites, the games committee is typically the NCAA national committee.

NCAA National Committee. The sport committee with direct oversight responsibilities for the championship.

Non-predetermined Sites. Those sites that are selected to host at the time of the participant/team selections announcement.

Playing Rules. The rules under which the competition will be conducted.

Predetermined Sites. Those sites that are selected to host before the participant/team selections announcement.

Preliminary Rounds. The rounds of the championship before the final or championship round.

Regional Alignment. The geographic location of institutions or regional advisory committees.

Schedule of Events. Official event schedule - includes all required activities (e.g., practices, banquets).

Selection Criteria. Policies and procedures in place to guide the team selection process.

Site Selection Criteria. Policies and procedures in place to guide the site selection process.

Squad Size. In any championship in which a squad limit has been established by the governing sport committee or by the bylaws, the number of eligible student-athletes in competitive uniform eligible to participate at the start of competition.

Tournament Physician. The physician designated by the host institution/conference to serve as the chief medical advisor for the championship event(s) to be hosted at the host venue.

Section 2 • Championship Core Statement

The championships and alliances staff strives to administer competition in a fair, safe, equitable and sportsmanlike manner so that the experience of the student-athlete is paramount.

This is attained by:

Ensuring student-athletes' optimal experience.

Executing championship events reflecting appropriate quality and values to/for stakeholders — student-athletes, coaches, administrators, member institutions, sport committees, fans, broadcast partners and corporate champions/partners.

Coordinating all aspects of the championship in an efficient, effective manner through common operating policies and practices, using internal and external resources.

Integrating championships with broadcast and corporate relationships in a manner that maintains the integrity of the championship.

Assuring effective management of the business aspects of the operation.

Enhancing the assets of the NCAA and their value by collaborating with internal and external expertise to achieve heightened exposure (e.g., community programs, fan events, banquets, anniversaries).

Section 3 • Conduct

Section 3.1 Certification of Eligibility/Availability

[Reference: Certification of Eligibility/Availability in Bylaws 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 20.2.4, 31.2.1.7.1, 31.2.1.7.1.2 and 31.2.2 in the NCAA Division I Manual, Bylaws 7.3.1.5 and 18.2.1 in the NCAA Division II Manual and Division II Championships Committee Policy and Bylaws 31.2.1.5, 31.2.1.5.2, and 31.2.2 in the NCAA Division III Manual.]

Only student-athletes eligible under Bylaws 12, 13, 14, 15 and 16 may compete in NCAA championships. Member institutions are required to certify the eligibility of their student-athletes before the beginning of each academic year and to withhold ineligible student-athletes from all intercollegiate competition.

Member institutions are reminded to notify the NCAA national office before the selection date for each championship of any student-athlete who may have participated in regular-season competition but subsequently is determined to be ineligible or unavailable for NCAA championship competition.

DISCOVERY OF INELIGIBILITY OF A STUDENT-ATHLETE AFTER SELECTION

If an institution fails to report an ineligible student-athlete and the omission is not discovered until after the institution is selected to participate in the championship, necessitating the institution's withdrawal from the championship, that withdrawal shall be considered as one of the years of ineligibility, provided another institution participates in the championship in place of the disqualified institution. If the discovery of the ineligible student-athlete occurs so near the beginning of the championship that the governing sport committee does not have a reasonable period of time to replace the disqualified institution in the bracket, that fact shall be taken into consideration in determining the number of years the disqualified institution shall be ineligible to participate.

Section 3.2 Drug Testing

As part of preparation and planning to participate in championship events, member institutions are reminded and encouraged to review all applicable policy and legislative requirements pertaining to banned substances, drug testing and related eligibility requirements with their student-athletes. Student-athletes who compete in NCAA championships may be subjected to drug tests in accordance with legislation and may be determined to be ineligible as a result thereof. Only student-athletes who have consented in writing to such testing are initially eligible for these championships; and thereafter, student-athletes who are tested shall remain eligible only if they test negative.

Section 3.3 Honesty and Sportsmanship

Individuals employed by (or associated with) a member institution to administer, conduct or coach intercollegiate athletics and all participating student-athletes shall act with honesty and sportsmanship at all times so that

intercollegiate athletics as a whole, their institutions and they, as individuals, shall represent the honor and dignity of fair play and the generally recognized high standards associated with wholesome competitive sports.

Section 3.4 Misconduct/Failure to Adhere to Policies

MISCONDUCT

Misconduct in an NCAA championship is any act of dishonesty, unsportsmanlike conduct, unprofessional behavior or breach of law, occurring from the time the championship field is announced through the end of the championship, that discredits the event or intercollegiate athletics. Each games committee shall hold an administrative meeting with the representatives of participating institutions to review and explain the policies related to misconduct.

FAILURE TO ADHERE TO POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

A governing sport committee may assess a financial penalty against an institution for failure of any of its representatives to adhere to the policies and procedures governing the administration of the competition. This includes, but is not limited to, failure to comply with the procedures and deadlines for submitting scores, score sheets, schedules, rosters and entry/march-in forms for qualification and other materials necessary for the efficient administration of the competition. Section 3.5 Sports Wagering Policy

Sports wagering includes placing, accepting or soliciting a wager (on a staff member's or student-athlete's own behalf or on the behalf of others) of any type with any individual or organization on any intercollegiate, amateur or professional team or contest. Examples of sports wagering include, but are not limited to, the use of a bookmaker or parlay card; internet sports wagering; mobile betting; auctions in which bids are placed on teams, individuals or contests; and pools or fantasy leagues in which an entry fee is required and there is an opportunity to win a prize.

The current NCAA legislation against sports wagering prohibits NCAA student-athletes, member institutions' athletics staff and non-athletics staff with athletics responsibilities, and conference office staff from participating in sports wagering activities or providing information to individuals involved in or associated with any type of sports wagering activities concerning intercollegiate, amateur or professional athletics practice or competition in a sport in which the NCAA conducts championship competition, in bowl subdivision football and in emerging sports for women.

A wager is any agreement in which an individual or entity agrees to give up an item of value (e.g., cash, shirt, dinner) in exchange for the possibility of gaining another item of value.

STUDENT-ATHLETES

A student-athlete found in violation of the prohibition against knowingly participating in any sports wagering activities or providing information to individuals involved in or associated with any type of sports wagering activity that involves intercollegiate, amateur or professional athletics competition shall be ineligible for further intercollegiate competition, subject to appeal to the Committee on Student-Athlete Reinstatement for restoration of eligibility.

POSTSEASON

In championships in which a bracket format is used, student-athletes, coaches and administrators may not participate in bracket competitions where there is both a required entry fee and an opportunity to win a prize. Student-athletes and administrators may participate under current NCAA rules in bracket contests where there is no entry fee but a possibility of winning a prize. Some NCAA member schools, however, have chosen to ban student-athletes from participating in these types of bracket contests.

HOSTING OPPORTUNITIES

It is permissible for NCAA championships to be conducted at locations in states that permit sports wagering.

Section 3.6 Student-Athlete Experience Survey

During the NCAA championships, the student-athlete experience is paramount. NCAA staff and hosts dedicate themselves to planning the best experiences for all involved. As part of our commitment to getting better, following the championship, participants will receive a survey to provide feedback on their experience and input on how championships can be improved for future NCAA student-athletes. Institutional administrators and coaches will receive an email containing a link to the survey and will be asked to forward the survey to student-athletes. Additionally, this survey will be accessible via QR code found on the back of NCAA-issued championship credentials.

We also understand that sometimes certain circumstances or conditions occurring during the events may require real-time consideration. When this is the case, student-athletes may reach out to their site representative or NCAA national office staff on-site.

Section 4 • Elite 90™ Award

The Elite 90 award was created to recognize the true essence of student-athletes by honoring individuals who have reached the pinnacle of competition at the national championship level in their sport, while also achieving the highest academic standard among their peers. The award is presented in every sport, every division, and goes to the student-athlete who has the highest cumulative grade-point average of all student-athletes competing at the finals site. One student-athlete per championship will receive the award, and the announcement of the winner will be made at the finals site.

Section 5 • Fan Travel

Through support from Marriott International as the Official Hotel Partner of the NCAA, NCAA championships are pleased to provide easy and affordable accommodations for family and fans to follow their favorite student-athlete(s) and team(s) as they participate in NCAA championships competition. Section 6 • Health and Safety

As part of preparation and planning to host and/or participate in championship events, member institutions are reminded and encouraged to review all applicable health and safety policy and legislative requirements and guidance including, among others, those relating to concussion management, catastrophic injury prevention, inclement weather and independent medical care. These requirements and related information can be found in applicable division manuals, sports playing rules and the materials located on the Health, Safety & Performance website. In addition, a summary of some of the key health and safety considerations related to traveling to championship events can be found in the NCAA's Guidance for Medical Care and Coverage for Student-Athletes at Away Events.

Section 7 • Logo Policy

[Reference: Bylaws 12.5.4, 31.1.7 and 31.1.8 in the NCAA Division I Manual, Bylaw 17.1.10 in the NCAA Division II Manual and Bylaw 12.5.3 in the NCAA Division III Manual.]

A student-athlete may use athletics equipment or wear athletics apparel that bears the trademark or logo of an athletics equipment or apparel manufacturer or distributor in athletics competition and pre- and postgame activities (e.g., celebrations on the court, pre- or postgame press conferences), provided the following criteria are met:

- Athletics equipment (e.g., shoes, helmets, baseball bats and gloves, batting or golf gloves, hockey and lacrosse sticks, goggles and skis) shall bear only the manufacturer's normal label or trademark, as it is used on all such items for sale to the general public; and
- 2. The student-athlete's institution's official uniform (including numbered racing bibs and warmups) and all other items of apparel (e.g., socks, head bands, T-shirts, wrist bands, visors or hats, swim caps and towels) shall bear only a single manufacturer's or distributor's normal label or trademark (regardless of the visibility of the label or trademark), not to exceed 2-1/4 square inches in area (rectangle, square, parallelogram) including any additional material (e.g., patch) surrounding the normal trademark or logo. The student-athlete's institution's official uniform and all other items of apparel shall not bear a design element similar to the manufacturer's trademark/logo that is in addition to another trademark/logo that is contrary to the size restriction.

Section 8 • Research

In order to avoid inappropriate and unnecessary participant distraction and disruption of championship events, it is expected any data collection or other research efforts conducted at or during championship events will be coordinated through the national office, with notice and a description of any research proposal to be submitted to the NCAA research staff at least six weeks before the championships event begins.

Section 9 • Travel Party

Please refer to the NCAA travel policies for all information regarding transportation and per diem expenses. NCAA Travel policies are updated annually and can be found online **here**. Please reference Appendix A of the travel policies for reimbursable travel party numbers. The travel policies supersede all other documents.

Section 10 • Religious Conflicts

[Reference: Bylaws 31.1.4.1 and 31.1.4.2 in the NCAA Division I Manual.]

Institutional Policy. If a participating institution has a written policy against competition on a particular day for religious reasons, it shall inform the NCAA national office on or before September 1 of each academic year in order for it or one of its student-athletes to be excused from competing on that day. The championship schedule shall be adjusted to accommodate that institution. (Adopted: 4/22/98, Revised: 8/11/98, 10/28/99, 5/2/13)

Individual Championships. In individual championships, an athlete must compete according to the institution's policy regarding Sunday competition (if the institution has no policy against Sunday competition, the student-athlete shall compete on Sunday if required by the schedule).

Section 11 • Team Replacement Policy

The Division I Competition Oversight Committee developed a team replacement policy considering the possibility of unforeseen circumstances impacting championship fields. The policy will be implemented in accordance with the terms set forth in the policy document available **here** when, despite best efforts, a team within the championship field is impeded or hindered from participating in the championship for reasons beyond its control.

DATE FORMULA

The championship finals are scheduled for Friday and Sunday of Memorial Day weekend. Quarterfinals will be held Thursday the week before the finals. First- and second-round games will be held Friday and Sunday before the quarterfinals.

PRELIMINARY-ROUND GAME TIMES

For the first and second rounds, game time(s) shall be established by the host institution within the time frames stated above. Host institutions will submit their preferred game times, and the order of games played for the first round, with their bid submission. The women's lacrosse committee will approve the requested game times and order prior to the selection show. For those first-round games in which the host team is not a participant, consideration shall be given to a game time conducive to the participating teams and its fans. Institutions without lighted facilities are required to schedule the start time to allow a four-hour window for a daylight opportunity to play the game. Requests to deviate from those times listed above must be submitted in writing and approved by the NCAA Division I Women's Lacrosse Committee by April 25 and/or requested by TV partners. Requests after this deadline are subject to be denied. Hosts may submit quarterfinal game time restrictions or preferences to be considered by ESPN and the women's lacrosse committee.

Section 1.5 Equipment

The manufacturer will send game balls to the tournament manager at the host institution for each round of competition. Practice balls will be provided at the final site.

In accordance with Bylaw 12.5.4, athletics equipment (e.g., shoes, gloves, helmets, sticks) may bear only the manufacturer's normal label or trademark as it is used on all such items for sale to the general public. Failure to comply with this regulation may jeopardize a student-athlete's eligibility.

All equipment must conform to the specifications outlined in the 2024 and 2025 NCAA Women's Lacrosse Rules book.

Section 1.6 Rules

[Reference: Bylaw 17.33 in the NCAA Manual.]

Per NCAA Bylaw 17.33, member institutions shall conduct all of their intercollegiate competition in accordance with the playing rules of the Association in all sports in which the NCAA develops playing rules. For those sports in which the Association follows rules that are developed by other governing bodies and modified by the governing sports committee, the adopted playing rules shall be used. The governing sports committee will not consider any results for selection purposes not played in accordance with NCAA rules, or those rules adopted by an outside organization.

This championship will be conducted according to the 2024 and 2025 NCAA Women's Lacrosse Rules.

DURATION OF GAMES

For NCAA tournament play, all games must be played to completion. If a tournament game is suspended and played on another day, it will be played from the point of interruption.

Section 1.7 Uniforms

The designated home team (as determined by the Women's Lacrosse Committee) will wear light-colored uniforms for all rounds of competition.

In competition and during related ceremonies (pregame/warmup, introductions, award ceremonies and postgame interviews), student-athletes in the championship shall wear exclusively their official game uniform or institutional apparel. This applies to warmup uniforms and competitive uniforms.

All visible undergarments worn must be of one solid color and must be white, gray, black or one of that team's uniform colors. All team members who choose to wear visible undergarments must wear the same color. [NCAA Women's Lacrosse Rule 2, Sections 33 and 34.]

Section 2 • Determination of **Championship Participation**

Section 2.1 Championship Format

The NCAA Division I Women's Lacrosse Championship provides for a 29-team, single-elimination tournament. For the 2025 championship, 15 conference automatic bids will be awarded, and 14 teams will be selected at large. (See Appendix A for the bracket.)

TRAVEL PARTY/BENCH LIMIT

[Reference: Per Diem and Transportation in the Division I General Section and Bylaw 31.4.6 in the NCAA Manual.]

Please refer to the NCAA Travel policies for all information regarding transportation and per diem expenses. The travel party for Division I Women's Lacrosse is 40. Travel policies are located online at ncaa.org/championships/travel/ championships-travel-information.

Each team must designate its 32 players who will be eligible to play in the championship. The 32 players may be changed each game if needed. Starting lineups will be recorded in the official scorebook 15 minutes before the game begins. Changes to the lineup cannot be made until the game starts. A roster with names and numbers of all players must be at the scorer's table before the start of the game. An institution that is advised it is in violation of this regulation and does not promptly conform shall automatically forfeit the competition. There shall be no inordinate delay of the competition to allow the institution to conform to the rule.

Each team will be permitted 12 additional nonathletes, along with one administrator and one doctor, on the sidelines beyond the roster of 32 for a total of 46. The individuals exceeding the travel party shall include nonparticipating, dressed student-athletes and institutional personnel (coaches, managers, athletic trainers, physicians and administrators). The nonparticipating, dressed student-athletes are permitted to participate in pregame warmup activities at the discretion of the institution. There is no bench limit on nonparticipating, dressed student-athletes. This total must include an administrator from the participating institution.

Section 2.2 Results

RESULTS REPORTING

The results-reporting and statistics-reporting processes are combined for Division I women's lacrosse. Schools will submit all schedule and results information to the NCAA statistics site (web1.ncaa.org/stats/StatsSrv/login), and this information is transferred into the RPI system for use by the sports committee. Specific instructions and reporting deadlines will be communicated to sports information directors in a memo from the media coordination and statistics staff. STAT CREW

All host sites should use Stat Crew programs to submit statistics for postseason contests. At the end of each game or day of competition, a packed file from each preliminary/championship contest must be sent to Liz Wacienga at Iwacienga@ncaa.org) and ncaastats@ncaa.org at the NCAA national office. These files should be sent immediately after each contest or day of competition.

Fourteen teams will be selected at large. To be considered during the at-large selection process, a team must have a Division I overall won-lost record of .500 or better.

SEEDING

The committee will seed and pair teams for the championship according to the geographic travel policy established by the NCAA Division I Competition Oversight Committee. The committee shall seed the top eight teams of the championship field.

TRAVEL INFORMATION

Please refer to the NCAA Travel policies for all information regarding transportation and per diem expenses. Travel policies are located on the NCAA website at ncaa.org/championships/travel/championships-travel-information. Teams and/or individuals should provide themselves sufficient money to meet all expenses throughout the tournament, including those for ground transportation, lodging, meals and other miscellaneous needs.

Section 2.4 Selection Criteria

To be considered for selection for the championship, regular-season games that are tied after regulation play must be decided with an overtime period. Teams must play a minimum of 10 contests. The committee requests conference championship games start by noon Eastern time the **Sunday** prior to the selection announcement.

The Women's Lacrosse Committee will select at-large teams based on the criteria in Bylaw 31.3.3 (as listed below) in addition to the primary criteria.

- Won-lost record;
- Strength of schedule; and
- Eligibility and availability of student-athletes for NCAA championships.

Primary Criteria (not necessarily in priority order):

- Comprehensive evaluation of the Rating Percentage Index (RPI 25% won-lost record; 50% opponents' strength of schedule; and 25% opponents' opponents' strength of schedule).
- Head-to-head competition.
- Results vs. common opponents.
- Significant wins and losses.
- Evaluation of the 10 highest-rated teams on an institution's schedule; defined by two components: strength of schedule and winning percentage.

Secondary Criteria

If the evaluation of the primary criteria does not result in a decision, the secondary criteria will be reviewed. All the criteria listed will be evaluated (not listed in priority order).

- Late-season performance (last six games, including conference tournaments winning percentage and strength of schedule).
- Results against teams already selected (including automatic qualifiers).
- Nonconference RPI.

Additionally, input is provided by regional advisory committees for consideration by the Women's Lacrosse Committee. Coaches' polls and/or any other outside polls or rankings are not used by the Women's Lacrosse Committee for selection purposes.

Bylaw 31.3.3.1 - Countable Competition

For NCAA team-championship selection purposes, competition is countable only when the teams played are varsity intercollegiate teams of four-year, degree-granting institutions that conduct a majority of their competition in that team sport against varsity intercollegiate teams (see Constitution 3.2.4.5) of United States four-year, degree-granting institutions. Competition against service teams, professional teams, semiprofessional teams, amateur teams, two-year colleges and club teams shall be excluded.

Section 2.5 Site Selection

Any institution interested in hosting preliminary-round competition of the 2025 championship must submit a proposed budget, respond to sport-specific questions and ensure that the institution's key contacts and facility information are complete and current in the Championships Bid Portal. Please note that in order to submit a bid, you must first locate the desired championship in the "Championships Available for Bidding" section and select "Start Bid."

Please note that all member institutions have regular and easy access to their profiles by visiting championships.ncaa.org. For profile issues, user access or to reset a password, please email championshipbid@ncaa.org or contact the respective championship manager.

VENUE REQUIREMENT

A team must play at least one match during the regular season in the venue it submits as the host facility. If an institution cannot meet this requirement, you may submit a waiver (including clear rationale) to the women's lacrosse committee. The committee will review the waiver and issue a decision. The waiver must be submitted by the bid deadline (Friday, April 25) to ckolby@ncaa.org. The committee will give priority to on-campus venues that can provide student-athletes with a positive experience.

Venues must provide a locker room for each participating team for pregame and postgame preparations. If the locker room is not accessible (distance, etc.) for halftime, the host institution must provide an adequately sized walled tent with lighting and seating. If the tent is not on a permanent surface, a floor should be provided. All locker room arrangements must be submitted with the bid submission for the women's lacrosse committee's review. Any alternate locker room arrangements should be discussed with the participating teams on the participating team call.

VIDEO REVIEW

Video review is permissible for preliminary rounds. Hosts must indicate their desire to use video review in their bid submission. Video review will be provided by the NCAA at the semifinals and final round. Video review requirements for hosts will be provided within the bid materials. For all questions related to video review, please reach out to ckolby@ncaa.org.

BROADCAST REQUIREMENTS

The first and second rounds will be broadcast on ESPN+ via the hosts. Minimum requirements will be outlined within the bid specifications. Quarterfinals will be broadcast on ESPN networks. Venues must be able to accommodate ESPN requirements in order to host a quarterfinal round.

CHAMPIONSHIPS BID AND HOST PROFILE PORTAL

The Championships Bid Portal is located at championships.ncaa.org. The deadline to submit all bid materials for this championship is Friday, April 25.

In addition to projected ticket sales and game expenses, prospective hosts should include the following when completing a proposed budget:

- Committee/site representative lodging.
- Game officials lodging.
- State and city taxes/fees.
- Ticket and facility fees.

Committees/site representative's per diem, mileage and luggage fees will be paid by the NCAA, not the host institution. Game officials will be reimbursed via the RefQuest system for their game fees, per diem, mileage and luggage fees.

FACILITY PROFILE

Institutions interested in hosting championship preliminary-round competition must add (or ensure accuracy of) facility information for the applicable competition venue. This information is located at championships.ncaa.org. Any supporting information (e.g., facility diagram, pictures) may be uploaded and attached to that facility's profile. This information will be made available to the sport committee to aid in their deliberations of prospective host sites.

KEY CONTACTS

Each institution should list and then maintain its key contacts associated with each sport and the institution. Individuals can be added via the Championships Bid and Host Profile portal at championships.ncaa.org.

LODGING

Prospective hosts shall secure 30 double/double, nonsmoking rooms for each visiting team. Specific hotel details are available in the bid checklist and host manual. For specific questions, please reach out to **ckolby@ncaa.org**. A letter of intent for each proposed hotel holding rooms must be included in the submitted bid materials. Host should try to put teams in separate hotels with equal amenities, when possible. This information can be uploaded and attached to the profile by visiting **championships.ncaa.org**.

SAFETY AND SECURITY PLAN

Each facility profile should include the safety and security plan for that facility. This information can be uploaded and attached to the profile by visiting **championships.ncaa.org**.

FINAL FINANCIAL REPORT

A final financial report from each championship site must be submitted via the Championships Bid and Host Profile portal under the "budget" tab not later than 60 days after the event.



Appendix C • Officials

POLICIES AND SELECTION OF OFFICIALS

All officials for NCAA Division I postseason games shall be appointed by the NCAA Division I Women's Lacrosse Committee in conjunction with the NCAA national coordinator for officials. Any committee member whose team is selected to the championship will be recused from the process.

A sports committee or games committee may not require membership in any specific officials' association as a prerequisite for selection to officiate in an NCAA meet or tournament. Officials shall adhere to the Association's policies relating to gambling activities, drugs and alcohol, and must conduct themselves in a manner befitting intercollegiate athletics. Failure to do so may result in termination of the officiating assignment.

REQUIREMENTS

All officials assigned to an NCAA postseason tournament game must do the following:

- 1. Register on RefQuest website;
- 2. Consent and pass a background check;
- Complete NCAA-assigned training and conflict-of-interest form;
- Annually attend an NCAA rules interpretation session in person or via webinar;
- 5. Pass the annual rules test with a score of 90% or higher;
- Be evaluated through NCAA national coordinator of officials and assignors; and
- Referee a minimum of six NCAA contests during the current lacrosse season.

Additional requirements may be added by the national coordinator of officials and the requirements are subject to change.

An official will not be assigned to a game if it involves an institution they attended, was or is an employee of, or if their spouse/partner or relatives have any conflicting affiliations. Other situations that could be perceived as a conflict of interest will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis.

ASSIGNMENTS

Three field officials and one alternate official will be assigned to all games. Teams will receive the names of assigned officials the day prior to game day.
