

# 2025 Video Review Protocols and Procedures



If available, video review shall be used. The use of video review is a permissive rule and not required. However, if used, the video review rules outlined in the rules book as well as the following protocols and procedures must be followed. Clear and conclusive video evidence must exist for the call on the field to be overturned. Video review shall be provided by the home team, independent of the team bench areas. Consent by both teams is not necessary for use of video review unless the opponents are within the same conference and the teams' conference requires consent of both teams.

# Video Review (VR)

Each team shall be permitted **two** video review requests per game regardless of the outcome of a request. A team must have a timeout available to request a video review. Teams may request a video review in the same manner in which they request a timeout. Any video review request not used during regulation playing time may be used during overtime; however, teams are **not** given an additional video review request for overtime. **If a team requests video review of a play/call and the ruling on the field stands or is confirmed based on available video evidence (conclusive or inconclusive), the team loses a timeout.** 

**Note:** During **every** video review whether requested by a team or per the Head Official's discretion, officials will ensure that any error with the game clock or possession clock time is corrected and cardable fouls are identified, confirmed, or overturned.

# **Pregame Suggestions for Officials:**

- Arrival time to the game site should be earlier for VR games than non-VR games.
- Be prepared. Know the rules. Review the standardized video review procedures with the crew pregame.
- Review the signals for video review (see below).
- Meet with the video review technician/replay operator(s) pregame.
  - Inspect the equipment being used for video replay (tablet, laptop, cameras, etc.).
  - Be aware of the number of camera angles being used for the game and the location of each.
  - Inquire if the game and possession clocks (on-field clocks and/or digital score/clock ticker from the live stream) will be visible within the frames of the camera angles during review. If clocks will not be visible at all within the frames of the camera angles provided, the crew will know to not review timing errors or malfunctions. However, officials may still be able to review the release of the shot if the video provides audible sound to detect the PC horn.
- Similar to team requested stick check procedures, review where and how the VR will be conducted; Video review shall be conducted at a designated video monitor located within the scorer's/timer's table area. The Head Official and a second official as determined by the Head Official, will huddle and conduct the video review; when a decision is made, Head Official steps away from the table or turns around (if applicable), and delivers the final outcome to both coaches and scorer's/timer's table; message should be clear and concise. Include media personnel, if they are present. The third official is responsible for managing the field and sidelines.

# Suggestions for Officials for the Coach/Captain Meetings

#### Coaches:

- Review VR procedures and VR signals.
- Be prepared to describe the location and angles of VR cameras if the visiting coach inquires.
  - Suggested Language: We will be using video review in today's game, each team is permitted two VR requests per game regardless of the outcome. This site has (#) cameras covering the full length of the field; or, this site has (#) cameras covering restraining line to end line on both ends of the field, there is no angle for the midfield.

# Captains:

- Review VR procedures and VR signals.
  - Suggested Language: We will be using video review in today's game. Do you have any questions?

# **Video Review Suggestions for Officials:**

- What is the on-field call? Which ruling is in question?
- Request to see every possible angle so that all available angles may be reviewed, focus on the best angle to make the decision.
- There must exist clear and conclusive video evidence for an on-field ruling to be overturned.
- Officials are not re-officiating their calls, make a decision and move on. Resume play quickly and efficiently.
- Communicate to coaches (this should be a statement to coaches and not a discussion) and replay operator(s) what will be reviewed, for example:
  - Video review has been requested by (team or Head Official):
    - To determine whether the whole ball passed over the goal line.
    - To determine whether the player shooting, or the attacking team, stepped on or entered into the goal circle.
- Head Official will make the final ruling and communicate that outcome clearly:
  - After review (inconclusive evidence), the ruling on the field **stands**.
  - After review (conclusive evidence), the ruling on the field is **confirmed**.
  - After review (conclusive evidence), the ruling on the field is **overturned**.
- See below for expanded language on final rulings based on each VR permission. Officials will
  instruct coaches and teams as to the restart of play (who will have possession and where play
  will be restarted).

**Note:** Officials should not allow this permissible rule to take them out of their routine of making calls with integrity and confidence; officials are not reviewing every decision.

**Note:** Coaches are not permitted near the scorer's/timer's table during the review, including the substitution and penalty areas as defined by the rules. Coaching and substitutions are permitted during video review. This is managed by the official(s) not involved in the video review.

**Note:** If a coach or team personnel interferes with the video review process by approaching the scorer's/timer's table and injecting opinion, asking questions, or making demands, officials shall administer a misconduct foul (yellow card) to the team's head coach.

### Game Delay

If there is a team requested timeout, media timeout, injury, or other event that causes a delay during the time period following a goal ruling, no-goal ruling, or undetected goal, the Head Official will check in with coaches from both teams at the start of the delay and any team requested video review must be requested during that check-in.

## **Equipment Malfunction**

If there are any equipment malfunctions, the requesting team is not assessed a video review request. Malfunctions do not include a single camera that goes down or is out of focus. A malfunction would only occur if there is no video available at all or the monitor doesn't function so the video cannot be reviewed.

If the equipment either is not functioning at the start of the game, and then is repaired, or if the game started with functioning equipment that then fails, it is appropriate to use the equipment when it is available. If the equipment fails multiple times in a game, the Head Official will use their discretion as to when to discontinue use for that game.

#### Video Review is Permitted:

To correct the game clock and/or possession clock when there is a malfunction or timing error. Who may request? - Head Official only (partners may recommend/suggest a VR)

## **Administration of Video Review:**

If a timing error of the game clock and/or possession clock is identified during a stoppage of play:

- Official(s) shall call timeout, conference quickly to discuss the clock error and need for review.
   Be sure that prior to coming out of the conference/huddle, the Head Official has all the information that is needed.
- Head Official will signal their request, communicate with the sideline what will be reviewed, and conduct the video review.
- Head Official and second official will review the play.
- Third official will manage the field and sidelines ensuring coaches do not interfere.
- Following the completion of a video review, the Head Official will communicate clearly with both coaches and scorer's/timer's table the clock error and the adjustment that needs to be made.
  - Suggested Language: After review, a clock malfunction was detected, the game and possession clocks will be corrected to restart play (e.g., game clock will be set to 10:27 and possession clock to 82).
  - Suggested Language: After review, the clocks continued to run after the official's whistle
    and signal to stop the clocks, both will be corrected to restart play (e.g., game clock will
    be set to 10:27 and possession clock to 82).
- Resume play quickly and efficiently.

If the timing error of the game clock and/or possession clock is identified during live play:

- Immediately following the next foul and/or natural stoppage of play, or after the completion of a scoring play, officials shall call timeout, conference quickly to discuss the clock error and need for review. Be sure that prior to coming out of the conference/huddle, the Head Official has all the information that is needed.
- Head Official will signal their request, communicate with the sideline what will be reviewed, and conduct the video review.
- Head Official and second official will review the play.
- Third official will manage the field and sidelines ensuring coaches do not interfere.
- Following the completion of a video review, the Head Official will communicate clearly with both coaches and scorer's/timer's table the clock error and the adjustment that needs to be made.
  - Suggested Language: After review, a clock malfunction was detected, the game and possession clocks will be corrected to restart play (e.g., game clock will be set to 10:27 and possession clock to 82).
  - Suggested Language: After review, the clocks continued to run after the official's whistle and signal to stop the clocks, both will be corrected to restart play (e.g., game clock will be set to 10:27 and possession clock to 82).
- Resume play quickly and efficiently.

To determine when the release of a shot at the end of a possession, quarter, or overtime period occurred in relation to the expiration of time for the game clock and/or the possession clock.

• Who may request? - Head Official (partners may recommend/suggest a VR), coach, or any player on the field of play at the time of the play/call.

### **Administration of Video Review:**

- If a goal was scored, officials shall first conduct the pocket-depth stick check on the goal-scorer's stick.
- Official(s) shall call timeout, conference quickly to discuss the time on the game clock and/or
  possession clock when the shot was released and need for review. Be sure that prior to coming
  out of the conference/huddle, the Head Official has all the information that is needed.
- Head Official will signal the request, communicate with the sideline what will be reviewed, and conduct the video review.
- Head Official and second official will review the play.
- Third official will manage the field and sidelines ensuring coaches do not interfere.
- Following the completion of a video review, the Head Official will communicate clearly with both coaches and scorer's/timer's table if an administration and/or adjustment needs to be made.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field stands, goal.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field is confirmed, goal.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field is overturned, no-goal. The shooter did not release the shot prior to the expiration of the game clock and/or possession clock, (team color) possession.
- Resume play quickly and efficiently.

**Note**: If the clock is not visible during the review, an audible horn is sufficient in determining the release of the shot.

## Video Review is Permitted:

To determine whether the ball came off the body of a player of the attacking team.

• Who may request? - Head Official only (partners may recommend/suggest a VR)

### Administration of Video Review:

- If a goal was scored, officials shall first conduct the pocket-depth stick check on the goal-scorer's stick.
- Official(s) shall call timeout, conference quickly to discuss whether the ball came off the body of a player of the attacking team. Be sure that prior to coming out of the conference/huddle, the Head Official has all the information that is needed.
- Head Official will signal their request, communicate with the sideline what will be reviewed, and conduct the video review prior to the administration of the draw or possession awarded at the center.
  - If the goal is scored during an overtime period, officials shall signal their request for video review immediately following the pocket-depth check on the goal-scorer's stick.
- Head Official and second official will review the play.
- Third official will manage the field and sideline ensuring coaches do not interfere.
- Following the completion of a video review, the Head Official will communicate the outcome clearly with both coaches.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field **stands**, goal. The ball did not come off the body of an attack player.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field is confirmed.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field is overturned, no-goal. The ball came off the body of an attack player, (team color) possession.

Resume play quickly and efficiently.

To determine whether the whole ball entered the front of the goal by passing over the goal line, between the posts, and underneath the crossbar.

• Who may request? - Head Official (partners may recommend/suggest a VR), coach, or any player on the field of play at the time of the play/call.

### **Administration of Video Review:**

- If a goal was scored, officials shall first conduct the pocket-depth stick check on the goal-scorer's stick.
- Official(s) shall call timeout, conference quickly to discuss whether the whole ball entered the
  front of the goal. Be sure that prior to coming out of the conference/huddle, the Head Official has
  all the information that is needed.
- Head Official will signal their request, communicate with the sideline what will be reviewed, and conduct the video review prior to the administration of the draw or possession awarded at the center
- Head Official and second official will review the play.
- Third official will manage the field and sideline ensuring coaches do not interfere.
- Following the completion of a video review, the Head Official will communicate the outcome clearly with both coaches.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field **stands**, goal, we'll restart with a draw.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field is **confirmed**, goal, we'll restart with a draw. The whole ball crossed the goal line.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field is overturned, no-goal. The whole ball did not cross the goal line, free position for (team color) goalkeeper in the goal circle.
- Resume play quickly and efficiently.

To review a no-goal ruling or undetected goal when the ball **comes to rest** in the goal circle, or when the ball **does not come to rest** in the goal circle as a result of a deflection or rebound and the defense gains possession of the ball, video review must be requested **before the defensive team advances from their goal circle to above the 30-yard line of their defensive end**.

If the ball goes out of bounds for any reason, video review must be requested immediately.

- If there is a change of possession, video review must be requested immediately following the change of possession;
- If the attacking team maintains possession of the ball, video review must be requested immediately;
- However, if the deflection or rebound results in an instantaneous scoring play, video review may
  be requested immediately following the completion of the scoring play. If a team scores on an
  instantaneous scoring play, then video review is only permitted for that goal.

To determine whether the player shooting stepped on or into the goal circle, or any other player of the attacking team entered the goal circle, and if so, whether the act of stepping onto or into the goal circle was the result of a foul. This review may only be in response to a goal or no-goal signal.

• Who may request? - Head Official (partners may recommend/suggest a VR), coach, or any player on the field of play at the time of the play/call.

### Administration of Video Review:

- If a goal was scored, officials shall first conduct the pocket-depth stick check on the goal-scorer's stick.
- Official(s) shall call timeout, conference quickly to discuss whether or not there was a goal circle violation. Be sure that prior to coming out of the conference/huddle, the Head Official has all the information that is needed.
- Head Official will signal their request, communicate with the sideline what will be reviewed, and conduct the video review.
- Head Official and second official will review the play.
- Third official will manage the field and sideline ensuring coaches do not interfere.
- Following the completion of a video review, the Head Official will communicate the outcome clearly with both coaches.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field stands, goal or no-goal.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field is confirmed, goal or no-goal.
     Player did/did not step on/into the goal circle as a result of a foul.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field is overturned, no-goal. The player shooting stepped on (or into) the goal circle, free position for (team color) goalkeeper in the goal circle.
- Resume play quickly and efficiently.

### Video Review is Permitted:

To determine whether, as a result of a shot, the ball hits a pipe or deflects off the goalkeeper's stick.

• Who may request? - Head Official (partners may recommend/suggest a VR), coach, or any player on the field of play at the time of the play/call.

#### Administration of Video Review:

- Official(s) shall call timeout, conference quickly to discuss whether or not the ball hit a pipe or deflected off the goalkeeper's stick. Be sure that prior to coming out of the conference/huddle, the Head Official has all the information that is needed.
- Head Official will signal their request, communicate with the sideline what will be reviewed, and conduct the video review.
- Head Official and second official will review the play.
- Third official will manage the field and sideline ensuring coaches do not interfere.
- Following the completion of a video review, the Head Official will communicate the outcome clearly with both coaches.
- Scenario: Blue attack shoots at goal, ball is deflected off the goalkeeper's stick, no signal is given by the officials for 60-second reset. Blue coach requests video review.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field stands, the possession clock will not be reset.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field is confirmed, the shot did not deflect off the goalkeeper's stick. The possession clock will not be reset.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field is **overturned**, the ball deflected off the goalkeeper's stick, the possession clock will be reset to 60.
- Resume play quickly and efficiently.

To determine whether a team had possession of the ball during a power play at the end of a quarter, overtime half or period for purposes of retaining possession at the start of a subsequent quarter, overtime half or period.

Who may request? - Head Official only (partners may recommend/suggest a VR)

### Administration of Video Review:

- Official(s) shall call timeout, conference quickly to discuss whether or not a team had
  possession of the ball during a power play at the end of a quarter, overtime half or period for
  purposes of retaining possession at the start of a subsequent quarter, overtime half or period.
  Be sure that prior to coming out of the conference/huddle, the Head Official has all the
  information that is needed.
- Head Official will signal their request, communicate with the sideline what will be reviewed, and conduct the video review.
- Head Official and second official will review the play.
- Third official will manage the field and sideline ensuring coaches do not interfere.
- Following the completion of a video review, the Head Official will communicate the outcome clearly with both coaches.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field stands, the (color) team had possession of the ball at the end of the quarter.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field is confirmed, the (color) team had possession of the ball at the end of the quarter.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field is overturned, the (color) team did not have possession of the ball at the end of the quarter, the next quarter will commence with a draw.
- Refer to Rule 5, Sections 22 and 23 for the resumption of play.

## Video Review is Permitted:

To identify or confirm the number of the offender of a cardable foul <u>after</u> the card has been administered. For this permission, "identify" means making sure the card is issued to the correct player.

• Who may request? - Head Official only (partners may recommend/suggest a VR)

### **Administration of Video Review:**

- Following the administration of the card, officials may conference quickly, if needed, to identify
  or confirm the number of the offender of a cardable foul. Be sure that prior to coming out of the
  conference/huddle, the Head Official has all the information that is needed.
- Head Official will signal their request, communicate with the sideline what will be reviewed, and conduct the video review.
- Head Official and second official will review the play.
- Third official will manage the field and sideline ensuring coaches do not interfere.
- Following the completion of a video review, the Head Official will communicate the outcome clearly with both coaches.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field stands, (color) card administered to (team color and number).
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field is confirmed, (color) card administered to (team color and number).
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on field is overturned, (team color and number) will be assessed the (color) card.
- Resume play quickly and efficiently.

To determine flopping and/or embellishment fouls.

• Who may request? - Head Official only (partners may recommend/suggest a VR)

### Administration of Video Review:

- Official(s) shall call timeout, conference quickly to discuss the possible flopping and/or embellishment foul and the need for review. Be sure that prior to coming out of the conference/huddle, the Head Official has all the information that is needed.
- Head Official will signal their request, communicate with the sideline what will be reviewed, and conduct the video review.
- Head Official and second official will review the play.
- Third official will manage the field and sideline ensuring coaches do not interfere.
- Following the completion of a video review, the Head Official will communicate clearly with both coaches and scorer's/timer's table the result of the review regarding flopping or embellishment.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field stands, flopping/embellishment did/did not occur.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field is confirmed, flopping/embellishment did/did not not occur.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field is **overturned**, (team color and number) will be administered a green card for (flopping/embellishment).
- Resume play quickly and efficiently.

### Video Review is Permitted:

To identify, confirm, or overturn cardable fouls for plays already under review or for cards already administered.

- Who may request to identify (for plays already under review), confirm or overturn (for cards already administered) Green, Yellow, and Red cards? - Head Official only (partners may recommend/suggest a VR).
- Who may request to confirm or overturn (for cards already administered) **Yellow and Red** cards? Coach or any player on the field of play at the time of the play/call.

## **Administration of Video Review:**

- As a result of the video review already being conducted, official(s) shall <u>identify</u> any cardable fouls that may have been observed during the play that is already under review. As a result of a card having already been administered on the field, official(s) shall conduct VR to <u>confirm</u> or <u>overturn</u> cardable fouls. As a result of a card having already been administered on the field, a coach, or any player on the field of play at the time of the play/call shall request for the card to be <u>confirmed</u> or <u>overturned</u>.
- Official(s) shall call timeout, conference quickly to discuss the situation that may identify, confirm, or overturn any cardable fouls. Be sure that prior to coming out of the conference/huddle, the Head Official has all the information that is needed.
- Head Official will signal their request, communicate with the sideline what will be reviewed, and conduct the video review.
- Head Official and second official will review the play.
- Third official will manage the field and sideline ensuring coaches do not interfere.
- Following the completion of a video review, the Head Official will communicate the outcome clearly with both coaches.
  - Suggested language:
    - After review, the ruling on the field is confirmed, goal. In addition, we identified a yellow card for (team color and number) for a check to the head.
- Resume play quickly and efficiently.

To identify yellow and red card fouls during the act of shooting. Fouls during the act of shooting that shall be reviewed include dangerous contact, dangerous follow-through, dangerous propelling, dangerous stick in the sphere, misconduct, and slash.

• Who may request? - Head Official, Coach, or any player on the field of play at the time of the play/call.

### **Administration of Video Review:**

- This VR permission does not require a play to already be under review to identify a cardable foul during the act of shooting.
- Official(s) shall call timeout, conference quickly to discuss whether or not a foul may have occurred during the act of shooting. Be sure that prior to coming out of the conference/huddle, the Head Official has all the information that is needed.
- Head Official will signal the request, communicate with the sideline what will be reviewed, and conduct the video review.
- Head Official and second official will review the play.
- Third official will manage the field and sideline ensuring coaches do not interfere.
- Following the completion of a video review, the Head Official will communicate the outcome clearly with both coaches.
- Scenario: Blue #12 shoots at goal, during the act of shooting Blue #12 follows through into the White defender. The ball does not cross the goal line and no foul is called by the officials. White team coach requests video review.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field stands, there was no foul during the act of shooting.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field is confirmed, there was no foul during the act of shooting.
  - Suggested Language: After review, the ruling on the field is overturned, Blue #12 will be administered a yellow card for dangerous follow-through.
- Resume play quickly and efficiently.

## **Restart of Play Following Video Review**

Officials will instruct teams as to the restart of play.

If a video review results in a goal ruling, play will commence with a draw and player positioning for the draw shall apply, unless a free possession or alternate possession has been awarded pursuant to these rules. Play will commence on the official's whistle.

If the attacking team with possession of the ball requests a video review and the video review results in a no-goal ruling, the attacking team retains possession and play shall commence with a free position at the dot if the ball is in the critical scoring area, or if outside of the critical scoring area, at the spot of the ball, except that no free possession shall be taken within two meters of the boundaries. Any player from the attacking team that is on the field of play at the time of the request may take the free position. No player may be within two meters of the player taking the free position. Play will commence on the official's whistle.

If following the signal for a goal, the defensive team requests a video review and the video review results in a no-goal ruling, play will commence with a free position awarded to the requesting team's goalkeeper within the goal circle. Play will commence on the official's whistle.

If the officials request a video review that results in a no-goal ruling, play will commence with a free position awarded to the team with the player in possession of or nearest to the ball at the time of the whistle for the request. The free position will be awarded either at the dot if the ball is in the critical scoring area, or if outside of the critical scoring area, at the spot of the ball, except that no free possession shall be taken within two meters of the boundaries. Any player that is on the field of play at the time of the request may take the free position. If the ball is within the goal circle when the whistle is blown for the request, the free position is awarded to the goalkeeper, or any player, within the goal circle. Play will commence on the official's whistle.

For video reviews involving the goal circle that result in the overturning of a card, officials shall communicate the overturning of the card to the coaches and scorer's/timer's table. The game shall then commence per the administration outlined above. For video reviews involving the goal circle that result in the issuance of a card, officials shall communicate the issuance of the card to the coaches and scorer's/timer's table. The officials shall determine the proper administration outlined above and then administer the card per the applicable rule(s).

# **Video Review Signals**

Described below are the official's mechanics for when a video review is requested by an official, a coach, or a field player.



Video Review Signal When Requested by an Official = Signal timeout + draw rectangle in air + tap shoulders



Video Review Signal When Requested by a Coach = Signal timeout + draw rectangle in air



Video Review Signal When Requested by a Field Player = Signal timeout + draw rectangle in air + T shape

### **FAQs**

Q1: During pregame, the visiting team coach requests to review the video angles, is this permitted?

A1: Yes

Q2: How does a coach request a video review?

**A2:** Similar to a timeout request, a coach may request a VR through the scorer's/timer's table if the criteria for a VR is met (table personnel may blow the horn), or directly through the officials on the field.

**Q3:** If there is a table official assigned to the game, should the table official be the designated official to conduct the VR with the Head Official?

**A3:** It is recommended that the official most involved with the play under review be the second official to join the Head Official for the VR. The table official can join the third field official to monitor all other activity.

**Q4:** If a VR request by a coach is made through the scorer's/timer's table and the horn is blown during live play, and it turns out to be a situation that is not permissible for a VR, how do we handle the restart of play?

**A4:** The team will <u>not</u> be charged with one of their two VR requests for the incorrect request and play is restarted according to the procedures for an inadvertent whistle or according to the situation or penalty administration that caused play to stop..

**Note:** If the team doesn't have a timeout remaining when they request a non-permissible VR through the scorer's/timer's table, they shall also be issued a green card for delay of game per Rule 6, Section 9, f.

**Q5:** If a team requests video review of a play/call and the call on the field **stands** or is **confirmed**, does the team lose one of their VR requests as well as one of their team timeouts?

**A5:** Yes, the team loses one VR request and one of their team timeouts.

**Q6:** If a team requests video review of a play/call and the call on the field is **overturned**, does the team lose one of their VR requests as well as one of their team timeouts?

**A6:** The team loses one VR request but does **not** lose one of their team timeouts.

**Q7:** Does the on-field official need to make the on-field decision first (i.e., goal or no goal, or card being administered) prior to; a.) deciding that they need an official's discretionary video review, or b.) granting a team requested VR?

**A7:** Yes, an on-field decision must be made (i.e., goal or no-goal, or card being administered) prior to conducting a video review that requires a goal or no-goal ruling.

Q8: If both coaches request a video review at the same time, who is charged with the VR?

**A8:** The officials should do their best to try and charge the VR to the team that made the request first. If it cannot be determined, the Head Official may charge the VR as an official's review.

**Q9:** If a coach requests VR through the table prior to the ball crossing the 30 yard line but at the time of the horn, the ball has already crossed the 30 yard line (in the air or on the ground), shall we allow the VR?

**A9:** This is allowable as long as the request came prior to the ball crossing the 30 yard line (in the air or on the ground).

**Q10:** What if the GK strategically tosses the ball toward midfield to create a situation where a video review could not be made due to the location of the ball and a team requests a VR?

**A10:** VR is permitted as long as the request came prior to the ball crossing the 30 yard line (in the air or on the ground).

Q11: Will a video review go to a media timeout if the media timeout hasn't been taken yet?

**A11:** VR may go to a media timeout similar to how a team timeout does.

**Q12:** During video review, officials determine that the review is **inconclusive** due to poor video quality (wet or blurry screen, for example), is the team charged with a VR?

**A12**: Yes

**Q13:** During video review, officials determine that the review is **inconclusive** due to a malfunction (cracked screen, broken camera, feed cut out, etc.) and no video is available, is the team charged with a VR request?

**A13:** No

Q14: If following the Head Official's decision to conduct a VR on a timing error, a coach makes the same VR request for which they are not eligible, are they charged with one of their two VR requests?

A14: No, do not charge the team with a VR request as the crew has already decided to do the review.

**Q15:** White team shoots and the ball is released prior to PC expiration horn. During the shot, the ball deflects off of a White team stick then goes into the goal, do we allow the goal?

A15: Yes, the goal will count.

Q15a: Which stick is considered the goal scorer's stick?

**A15a:** Check the stick of the initial shooter, not the player whose stick caused the deflection.

**Q16:** Officials call a no-goal due to the player shooting or other attacking team player stepping on or into the goal circle. The attacking team requests a VR. During review, officials determined that a defensive push caused the shooter or attack player to enter the GC. Can the officials overturn the on-field decision and allow a goal?

**A16**: Yes

Q17: Should officials be reviewing every play where the shooter ends up in the GC?

**A17:** No, only the eligible plays where a VR is requested by an official or team as a result of a goal or no-goal decision may be reviewed.

**Q18:** Blue is on a scoring play and shoots on goal, the ball crosses the goal line but the shooter stepped on the goal circle. The official whistles, signals direction, and signals goal circle violation. The goalkeeper picks up the ball and begins to clear. The official did not signal no-goal and therefore did not visually show a goal or no-goal ruling. Is VR permitted by the Blue team?

**A18:** Yes. If the ball crossed the goal line, officials must signal a goal or no-goal. VR is permitted when a goal/no-goal ruling (signal) should have been given but wasn't.

**Q19:** Following a shot by the attacking team, the ball deflects off the pipe and comes back out into the CSA. The attacking team regains possession and the officials signal a PC reset (60). How long does the attacking team have to request a VR, to challenge that the whole ball crossed the goal line?

**A19:** The requesting team should make the VR request immediately (within 5 seconds or by the end of an immediate scoring play that may have resulted from the deflection).

**Q20:** Attack <u>shoots</u>, the ball deflects off the defender's stick and then deflects off the goalkeeper's stick, is this reviewable for the purposes of a PC reset?

**A20**: Yes

**Q21:** Attack <u>passes</u> to a teammate, the ball deflects off the defender's stick and then off the goalkeeper's stick, is this reviewable for the purposes of a PC reset?

**A21:** No, this is not a result of a shot being taken. If VR is incorrectly requested for this situation, the team will **not** be charged with one of their two VR requests for the incorrect request and play is restarted according to the procedures for an inadvertent whistle, or according to the situation or penalty administration that caused play to stop.

**Q22:** During overtime, the Blue team already used their timeout. The Blue team requests VR to determine as a result of a shot, the ball hit the pipe which would give the Blue team a 60-second PC reset. Is the VR permitted by the Blue team?

**A22:** No. A team must have a timeout available in order to request a video review of a play/call. If the team doesn't have a timeout when they request the VR through the table, they should be issued a green card for delay of game (Rule 6, Section 9, f).

**Q23:** Official administers a <u>yellow</u> card inside the CSA to Blue #10 for a check to the head. As the player is leaving the field, the Blue coach disputes the accuracy of the player being carded. Can the Head Official request a video review?

**A23**: Yes

**Q23a:** If during this VR to check the accuracy of the player carded, the official notices that there is a clock error. Can the clock also be corrected during this same VR?

**A23a:** Yes. Officials should correct any clock errors that are detected during any play/call that is under review.

**Q24:** Officials administer a <u>green</u> card to Blue #6 in the midfield for a physical foul. As the player is leaving the field, the Blue coach disputes the accuracy of the player being carded. Can the Head Official request a video review to verify the accuracy of the number of the offender?

**A24**: Yes

Q24a: Can a team request a video review of the green card decision?

**A24a**: No

**Q25:** During video review to determine if the shooter stepped on or into the GC as a result of a foul, officials see an off-ball cardable foul, can this card be adjudicated as a result of the VR for the GC violation?

**A25**: Yes

**Q26:** Red team player is going to goal and during the act of shooting follows through toward their defender, the Blue defender goes down holding their head. There is no call. The Red team coach and sideline are upset and calling for a dangerous follow through card. Can the Blue team request a VR of this play when there was no ruling on the field?

**A26**: Yes

Q26a: Can officials on their own conduct a VR thinking they may have missed the follow through foul?

A26a: Yes
