The games committee for the championships will conduct one in-person meeting on Monday, March 9 at the Utah Olympic Park Museum Building. Other meetings will be held virtually (Microsoft Teams). These meetings are required for all coaches. The NCAA Skiing Committee and the NCAA rules official(s) will use these meetings to cover all necessary rules and information. A fine of \$100 will be assessed for those institutions not in attendance. NCAA committee members and rules representatives, along with host staff will carry out the meeting agendas.

Opening Ceremony

There will be an opening ceremony after the administrative meeting on Tuesday, March 10. Please have athletes arrive and line up at 4:45 p.m. at the Olympic Park Ski Museum. An opening social will be held after the Opening Ceremony.

Barbeque

The traditional barbeque will be held at Solider Hollow following the mass start races on Saturday, March 14 at approximately 1:00 p.m. This will be a ticketed event and tickets for student-athletes and coaches within the designated travel party are covered under the NCAA banquet policy and will be included in the registration packet.

The deadline for returning the banquet and barbeque form is Monday, March 9th. Additional team personnel not covered under the NCAA policy may attend the barbeque and purchase tickets for \$30 each. Additional barbeque tickets may be paid for at the time your team registers for the championships. The following represents what the NCAA will cover:

- Teams with 1-3 student-athletes competing may bring 1 non-athlete at no additional cost
- Teams with 4-6 student-athletes competing may bring 2 non-athletes at no additional cost
- Teams with 7-9 student-athletes competing may bring 3 non-athletes at no additional cost
- Teams with 10-12 student-athletes competing may bring 5 non-athletes at no additional cost

Training

Both championship venues will be available for unofficial and official training prior to the start of the championships. Day passes/lift tickets must be purchased online in advance of training.

Alpine

Utah Olympic Park will be available for unofficial free skiing on Monday March 10th and then Tuesday for Official Training. Monday will be the hill ski only, no gates will be in place. A lift ticket is required to be purchased to use the lift on Monday. Gates will be in place on Tuesday for GS Official Training. Lift tickets for Monday will be **\$45**. These can be purchased at Guest Services at the Utah Olympic Park Museum main desk.

Nordic

Soldier Hollow will be available for free ski training from 9:00AM-12:00PM on Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday. Athletes and coaches can purchase a trail pass on arrival at the venue. The course marked with arrows by 9:00AM on Monday morning. All participants entering the course must have a valid liability waiver filled out and submitted prior to skiing. No spectators are allowed on the course, all spectating must be done from the Soldier Hollow operations building and plaza.

Weather Policy

The NCAA will provide a weather detection system for the championships if necessary or host/facility can utilize its own system. The games committee will do everything possible to complete each portion of the championships. However, the committee reserves the right to modify the schedule of events due to the weather. In the event of a weather emergency, please follow the evacuation procedures as set forth in Section 8 of this manual.

Section 7 - Championship Format

The format for the NCAA Men's and Women's Skiing Championships is determined by the NCAA Men's and Women's Skiing Committee, subject to the approval within the Division I governance process.

The NCAA Men's and Women's Skiing Championship will consist of 148 student-athletes (74 men and 74 women) shall qualify in the region in which their institution is located. A total of 80 Nordic participants (40 men and 40 women) and 68 Alpine participants (34 men and 34 women) will qualify for the championships.

The maximum team size shall be 12 persons, three per gender per discipline, composed of a maximum of six men and a maximum of six women. The maximum entry in an individual event for any team is three individuals. Only men can compete in men's events. Only women can compete in women's events.

A 40-point scoring system will be used for the championships, wherein the top 30 finishers in each event receive points. At the conclusion of the championships, the team with the most total points will be declared the champion.

Section 8 - Championship Operations

Alpine Gates, Binding, and Ski Check

Slalom Gates will be 30 millimeters. Alpine competitors will have the height of their bindings checked immediately following each Alpine competition in the finish area. A 50-millimeter limit is enforced. Alpine competitors will have their skis tested for fluor as soon as they finish their run. Alpine skis will be governed by FIS rules and/or USSA standards for Giant Slalom.

Coaches Bibs

Nordic: Each team will be permitted four team representatives on the course. Each person must be safe sport certified. We will distribute four armbands to each team to identify those permitted to be on the course. These arm bands will be distributed at the coaches' meeting. In addition, we will collect the names of the four people certified from each team to be on the course that will be wearing the armbands the evening prior to each day of competition. Arm bands will need to be returned following the championships. Any lost or missing arm bands will come with a fine to be replaced.

Alternates (Injury Notification)

If a selected individual suffers injury, illness or force majeure between Tue., March 3, and either Tue., March 10 (Alpine) or Wed., March 11 (Nordic), the institution must submit written notification and verification by a physician or host institution athletic trainer to Kevin Alcox (kalcox@ncaa.org), who will distribute it to the skiing committee, games committee, and staff.

Notifications must be received by the time of the coaches meeting the day before the first scheduled competition in that discipline (Alpine or Nordic). If a team making a substitution per the guidelines has consecutive alternates, the team may substitute with any of those alternates. Failure to report injury, illness or force majeure of selected student-athletes in a timely fashion is considered unethical and unsportsmanlike and could result in misconduct sanctions per NCAA Bylaw 31.1.10 in the NCAA Manual. Entries will be official on Tuesday, March 3 for the Central, East, and West regions.

Hospitality

There will be Dasani Water and Powerade/Body Armor available at the venues for participants and coaches during official training and competition days. Powerade water bottles will be given to each athlete and should be utilized as certain branded bottles are no permitted.

Post-Championship & Competition Site Evaluations

All evaluations will be sent from the NCAA at the conclusion of the event.

Registration

Registration will take place at the Best Western Pluss Landmark Inn (Headquarters Hotel):

- Sunday, March 2 from 4:00-6:00 p.m.
- Monday, March 3 from 8:00-11:00 a.m.

Scoring

A 40-point scoring system will be used for the championships, wherein the top 30 finishers in each event receive points. A further breakdown of the scoring can be found in the [NCAA Skiing Rules Modifications](#). At the conclusion of the championships, the team with the most total points will be declared the champion. Results will be updated in real time and will be made available at www.ncaa.com.

Videotaping

Institutions are permitted to videotape championship competitions by their teams or their individual student-athletes for archival, coaching or instructional purposes. Each institution is permitted to use one video and one still camera and may videotape only that portion of the competition in which it participates. The videotapes may not be used for commercial purposes.

Waxing Facilities and Testing

Alpine: There is no alpine waxing space available. Waxing should be done at your hotel/condos. If you have no options for space, please contact Kevin Alcox (kalcox@ncaa.org) and Alan Hansing (ahansing@huntsman.utah.edu) for assistance in finding a location if nothing is available to you where you are staying.

Equipment and Wax testing will take place at the completion of race. Process for all testing will be covered during coaches meetings prior to competition of each race.

Nordic: Team spaces will provided in a Wax Tent at the venue for those not bringing their own trailers. Teams should indicate their choice in the NCAA Team Travel Information Form, which is due by 5 p.m. on Thursday, March 5.

Fluorine Testing and Equipment Control Protocols

The 2026 NCAA Ski Championships will utilize the SkiFT fluorine detection system. This system was utilized from 2019-2024 by U.S. Ski and Snowboard to enforce the use of only non-fluorinated ski wax products in all National Nordic competitions. All testing will be performed by a trained Equipment Controller with assistance from volunteer Testing Personnel. Random

testing will be selected prior to each race using a random number generator to select random bib numbers for testing.

Control Area

The Control Area is a fenced area adjacent to the Finish Area. There will be racks inside the Control Area for skis to be held prior to testing, a tent in which to perform the testing, and a rack outside the Control Area where athletes/coaches may pick up skis once they have been tested, or if they are not needed for testing. Only Testing Personnel are allowed inside the Control Area. Once skis are in the Control Area, they may not be removed from the area until they are tested or determined not to be needed for testing. At this time, Testing Personnel will move skis to the Pick-up Rack outside of the control area.

Equipment Controller

University of Utah will designate a volunteer Equipment Controller for each event. They will be trained by U.S. Ski & Snowboard personnel. They are responsible for the oversight of the Control Area. The Equipment Controller will perform the test on each ski, ensure the samples are adequately marked and stored, and maintain possession of the samples until they are shipped for testing.

Testing Protocol

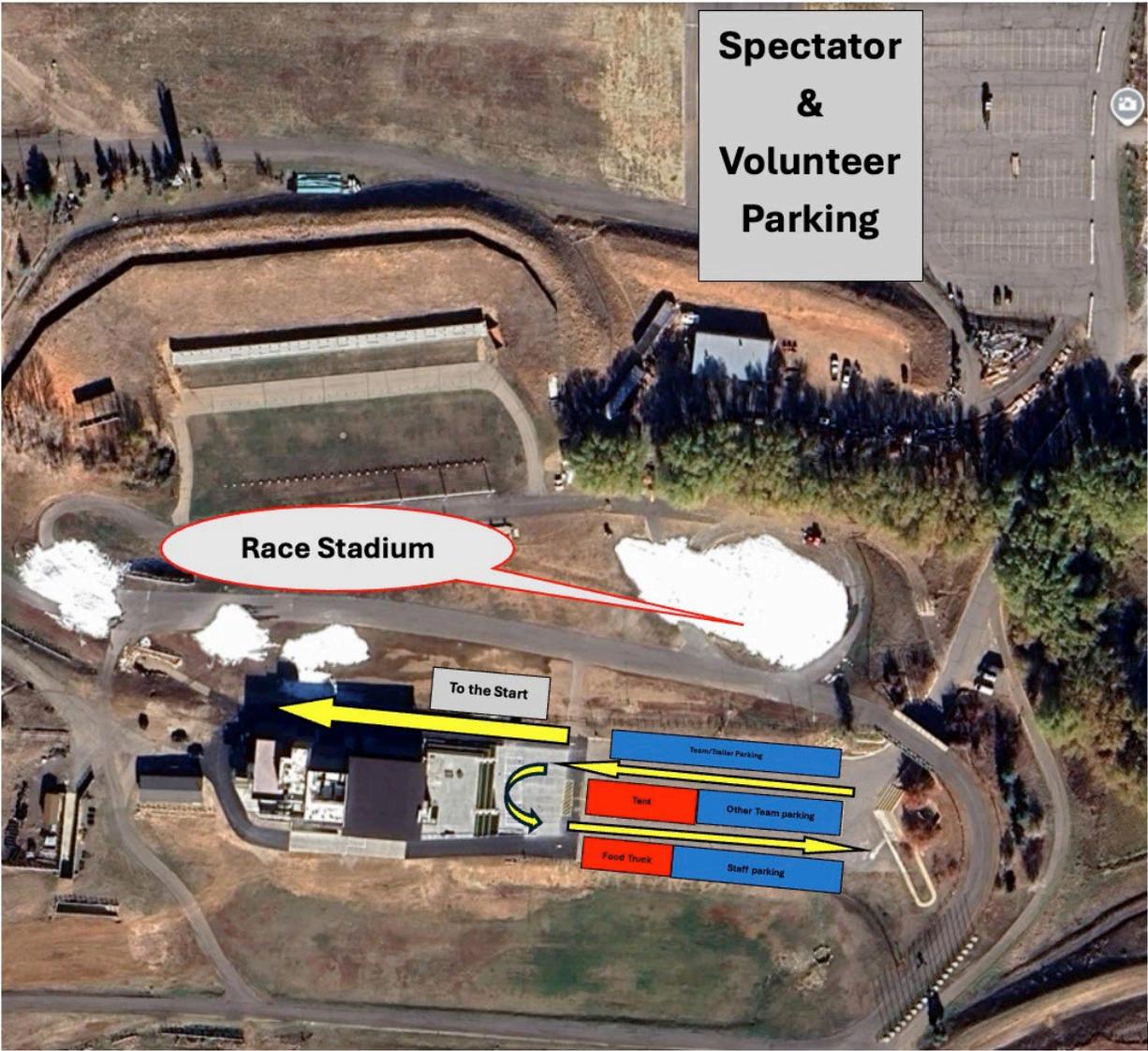
- Skis are taken from the Finish Area to the Control Area by Testing Personnel.
- Skis to be tested are brought into the tent A 3M Sticky Disk is pressed onto the base once, Removed, rotated 90 degrees and pressed on again.
- The 3M Sticky Disk is put into a sample container and labeled with competitor identifier (bib #? Name? USSA #).
- The samples are kept in the possession of the Equipment Controller until they are shipped to Germany to be analyzed by the lab for the presence of Fluorine.
- Results are returned to Race Organizers upon completion of analysis.

Additional, skis will be selected for testing randomly. Those skis will be taken by Testing Personnel from competitors upon crossing the finish line and taken to the Control Area for testing. Once tested, skiers or coaches may pick up those skis from the Pick-up Rack outside the Control Area.</p> |

Section 11 - Drug Testing

The NCAA is dedicated to fair and equitable competition throughout each round of championships and strongly supports the drug-testing program in order to safeguard the health and safety of the participating student-athletes.

Athlete Notification

Couriers will notify student-athletes selected for drug testing. Student-athletes will be instructed to read and sign the Individual Championship Student-Athlete Notification Form. Depending on the sport, student-athletes may need to report to drug testing following the conclusion of the awards ceremony. Student-athletes and an administrator will be guided/taken to the drug testing area/location at each of the two facilities for testing.

Media Obligations

At individual/team championships, student-athletes who are selected for drug testing must fulfill all media obligation before reporting to the drug-testing area.

Participating Institution's Notification

While couriers will notify student-athletes of his/her selection for drug testing, it is the student-athlete's responsibility to advise their institution of his/her selection for drug testing. Any issues or delay in reporting for drug testing will result in a championship misconduct.

Prolonged Test

If the student-athlete's team must depart the championship prior to a student-athlete completing drug testing, an institutional representative must remain with the student-athlete. If the student-athlete and/or institution incur additional expenses because of the delay (e.g., hotel, transportation back to campus, etc.), the institution may request reimbursement from the NCAA.

Testing Process

Student-athletes are drug tested through urinalysis and must provide a specimen in view of a drug-testing collector of the same gender. The length of the collection process depends on the

student-athlete's ability to provide an adequate specimen. If a student-athlete provides an adequate specimen immediately upon arriving in the drug-testing area, the entire process can be completed within 20 minutes. If the student-athlete is unable to provide an adequate specimen, he/she must remain in the drug-testing area until one is provided. There is no maximum allotted time for a student-athlete to provide an adequate specimen.

Per Diem

Per diem will be provided for the approved official travel party, based on the number of qualifiers from each institution. These numbers are the same as the breakdown listed in section 21 below.

We welcome all spectators to our venues and ask that they respect the integrity of the competitions, stay in designated areas on the mountain/courses, and listen to the directions of our volunteer controllers.

Due to the snow conditions at Soldier Hollow, no spectators will be allowed on the course, but may access the Soldier Hollow main building to view the course from an elevated perspective.

At the Utah Olympic Park, no hiking up the mountain is allowed without a credential, and all spectators must remain in the finish corral at the bottom of the run.

All coaches and student-athletes will be made available via request for post-competition interviews following the 10-minute cooling-off period. There will be no formal press conference.

Section 17 - Medical

Athletic Training

Patrick Jenkins (pjenkins@huntsman.utah.edu) will coordinate all athletic training needs. Athletic Trainers will be available on location during all training sessions and competitions. Team physicians will be on call during practices and onsite for competitions.

Concussion Management

The NCAA has adopted legislation that requires all active member institutions to have a concussion management plan for their student-athletes. Participating institutions shall follow their concussion management plan while participating in NCAA championships. If a participating team lacks the appropriate medical staff to activate its concussion management plan, the host championship concussion management plan will be activated.

The legislation notes, in part, that a student-athlete who exhibits signs, symptoms, or behaviors consistent with a concussion shall be removed from athletics activities (e.g., competition, practice, conditioning sessions) and evaluated by a medical staff member (e.g., sports medicine

staff, team physician) with experience in the evaluation and management of concussions; a student-athlete diagnosed with a concussion is precluded from returning to athletics activity for at least the remainder of that calendar day; and medical clearance for return to athletics activity shall be determined by the team physician or the physician's designee from the student-athletes institution. In the absence of a team physician or their designee, the NCAA tournament physician will examine the student-athlete and will determine medical clearance.

A concussion is a brain injury that may be caused by a blow to the head, face, neck, or elsewhere on the body with an "impulsive" force transmitted to the head. Concussions can occur without loss of consciousness or other obvious signs. A repeat concussion that occurs before the brain recovers from the previous one (hours, days, or weeks) can slow recovery or increase the likelihood of having long-term problems. In rare cases, repeat concussions can result in brain swelling, permanent brain damage, and even death.

Medical Examinations

As the event sponsor, the NCAA seeks to ensure that all student-athletes are physically fit to participate in its championships and have valid medical clearance to participate in the competition. The NCAA tournament physician, as designated by the host school, has the unchallengeable authority to determine whether a student-athlete with an injury, illness or other medical condition may expose others to a significantly enhanced risk of harm and, if so, to disqualify the student-athlete from continued participation. For all other instances, the student-athlete's on-site team physician can determine whether a student-athlete with an injury or illness should continue to participate or is disqualified. In the absence of a team physician, the NCAA tournament physician will examine the student-athlete and has valid medical authority to disqualify him or her if the student-athlete's injury, illness or medical condition poses a potentially life-threatening risk to himself or herself. The chair of the governing sports committee (or a designated representative) shall be responsible for administrative enforcement of the medical judgment, if it involves disqualification.

Section 18 - Participant Expectations & Guidelines

Code of Conduct

The NCAA expects each championship to exhibit an experience that represents the highest level of fair play and good sportsmanship. The NCAA and the NCAA Division I Championships/Sports Management Cabinet expect that student-athletes, coaches and administrators do their best to ensure participation in intercollegiate athletics promotes character development for all participants, enhances the integrity of higher education and promotes civility; therefore, championship events should adhere to such fundamental values as respect, fairness, civility, honesty and responsibility. These values should be manifest not only in athletic participation, but also in the broad spectrum of activities associated with the championship event. Accordingly, the Championships Committee will take strong action in response to any form of misconduct by student-athletes, coaches and/or administrators during the entire championship. This includes criticism of officials and a misconduct incident at the competition.

Ethical Behavior by Coaches

Members of the coaching profession have certain inherent obligations and responsibilities to the profession, to the student-athletes and to all those with whom they come into contact in the field. Coaches are expected to be role models who conduct themselves with integrity and high ethical standards at all times.

The words and actions of a coach carry tremendous influence, particularly on the young people under his or her direction. It is, thus, imperative that he or she demonstrate and demand high principles of sportsmanship and ethical behavior.

Therefore, coaches must:

1. Always place the safety and welfare of student-athletes above the value of a win and above any personal prestige or glory.

2. Ensure that the coaching staff and all others associated with the program treat the student-athletes under their control with fairness and respect.
3. Remember that they are on public display and that their conduct reflects upon the image of their respective institutions.
4. Teach their student-athletes strict adherence to the rules and regulations of the sport, the institution and other governing bodies to which they are responsible.
5. Firmly establish with their student-athletes the standards of acceptable conduct.
6. Treat opponents and assigned officials with respect and demand that student-athletes do the same, instilling in their student-athletes the importance of respect and sportsmanship over winning.
7. Ensure that student-athletes understand that taunting, intimidating and baiting opponents is unacceptable behavior and will not be tolerated.
8. Monitor their coaching staff and student-athletes to ensure that they do not use profane and vulgar language while representing the institution.
9. Ensure, along with institutional administration, that fans are reminded of the expectations of sportsmanship and respect for officials and opponents and their supporters.

Misconduct

[Reference: Bylaw 31.02.4 in the NCAA Division II Manual.]

Misconduct in an NCAA championship is any act of dishonesty, unsportsmanlike conduct, unprofessional behavior or breach of law, occurring from the time the championship field is announced through the end of the championship that discredits the event or intercollegiate athletics.

Sportsmanship

The primary goal of the rules is to maximize the safety and enjoyment of the student-athlete. Sportsmanship is a key part of that goal. Sportsmanship should be a core value in behavior of players and bench personnel, in crowd control by game management and in the officials' proper enforcement of the rules governing related actions.

Sports Wagering

The NCAA defines sports wagering as putting something at risk – such as an entry fee or a wager – with the opportunity to win something in return. The NCAA opposes all forms of legal and illegal sports wagering on college sports. Student-athletes and athletics administrators cannot place a sports wager for any NCAA-sanctioned sport. This includes wagering on the intercollegiate, amateur or professional level.

A student-athlete involved in sports wagering on the student-athlete's institution permanently loses all remaining regular-season and postseason eligibility in all sports. A student-athlete who is involved in any sports wagering activity that involves college sports or professional athletics, through Internet gambling, a bookmaker, a parlay card or any other method employed by organized gambling, will be ineligible for all regular-season and postseason competition for at least one year.

In championships in which a bracket format is used, student-athletes, coaches and administrators may not participate in bracket competitions where there is both a required entry fee and an opportunity to win a prize. Student-athletes and administrators may participate under current NCAA rules, in bracket contests where there is no entry fee but a possibility of winning a prize. Some NCAA member schools, however, have chosen to ban student-athletes from participating in these types of bracket contests.

Tobacco Ban

The use of tobacco products is prohibited by all game personnel (e.g., coaches, trainers, managers and game officials) in all sports during practice and competition. Penalties (as determined by the applicable rules-making committees and sports committees with rules-making responsibilities) shall be established for such use.

The use of tobacco products is prohibited during practice and competition. A member of the official travel party who uses tobacco products during a practice or competition shall be disqualified for the remainder of that practice or competition.

Section 20 - Tickets

Ticket Prices

Admission is free for all four days of the championships for all competitors and spectators. Those wishing to ski will be required to buy a trail pass and/or lift ticket.

Section 21 - Travel Party

Squad Size

Participating teams are limited to a squad size of no more than twelve (12) eligible student-athletes. No more than three (3) student-athletes are eligible per gender, per discipline.

Travel Party Size

In accordance with NCAA policies, official travel party sizes are as follows:

- Teams with 1-3 student-athlete(s) competing are allowed 1 non-athlete.
- Teams with 4-6 student-athletes competing are allowed 2 non-athletes.
- Teams with 7-9 student-athletes competing are allowed 3 non-athletes.
- Teams with 10-12 student-athletes competing are allowed 5 non-athletes.

Section 22 - Uniforms

Student-athletes competing in the championships shall wear the official uniform of their institution in competition and related ceremonies. This applies to warm-ups and competitive uniforms.

A student-athlete may use athletics equipment or wear athletics apparel that bears the trademark or logo of an athletics equipment or apparel manufacturer or distributor in athletics competition

and pre- and postgame activities (e.g.: Celebrations, pre- or postgame press conferences), provided the following criteria are met:

1. Athletics equipment (e.g.: shoes, helmets, goggles and skis) shall bear only the manufacturer's normal label or trademark, as it is used on all such items for sale to the general public; and
2. The student-athletes institution's official uniform (including numbered racing bibs and warm-ups) and all other items of apparel (e.g.: socks, head bands, t-shirts, wrist bands, visors or hats, and towels) shall bear only a single manufacturer's or distributors normal label or trademark (Regardless of the visibility of the label or trademark), not to exceed 2 ¼ square inches in area (rectangle, square, parallelogram) including any additional material (e.g.: patch) surrounding the normal trademark of logo. The student-athletes institution's official uniform and all other items of apparel shall not bear a design element similar to the manufacturer's trademark/logo that is in addition to another trademark/logo that is contrary to the size restriction.

Logo Policy*

[Reference: Bylaw 12.5.4 in the NCAA Division I and II Manuals, and Bylaw 12.5.3 in the NCAA Division III Manual.]

The provisions of Bylaw 12.5.4 (Divisions I and II) or Bylaw 12.5.3 (Division III) indicate that an institution's official uniform and all other items of apparel (e.g., socks, headbands, T-shirts, wristbands, visors or hats, and towels) that are worn by student-athletes in competition may bear a single manufacturer's or distributor's normal trademark, not to exceed 2 1/4-square inches, including any additional material (e.g., patch) surrounding the normal trademark or logo. The logo or trademark must be contained within a four-sided geometrical figure (i.e., rectangle, square, parallelogram).

In addition, an institution's official uniform cannot bear a design element similar to the manufacturer's that is in addition to another logo or that is contrary to the size restrictions.

A student-athlete representing an institution in intercollegiate competition is limited to wearing apparel items that include only the logo (not to exceed 2 1/4-square inches) of an apparel manufacturer or distributor. The student-athlete may not wear any apparel that identifies any other entity, other than the student-athlete's institution.

These restrictions apply to all apparel worn by student-athletes, and any and all credentialed personnel in the bench area during the conduct of competition, which includes any practices and pregame or postgame activities.

This bylaw will be strictly enforced at all NCAA championships and the names of individuals and institutions that are not in compliance with this bylaw shall be forwarded to the NCAA enforcement staff. Non-compliance with this legislation could result in loss of eligibility, forfeiture of points earned by those ineligible student-athletes and adjustment of team standings.

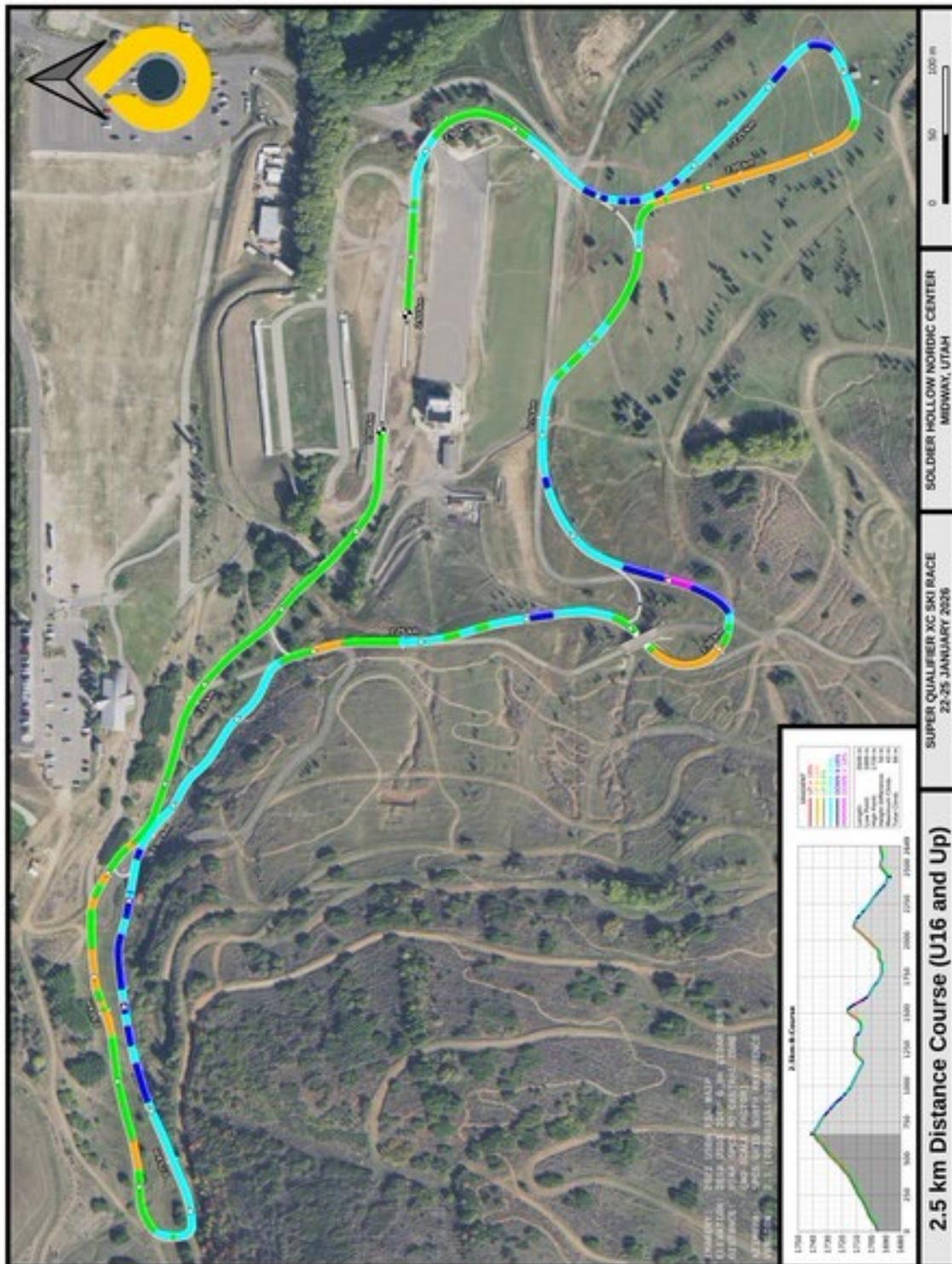

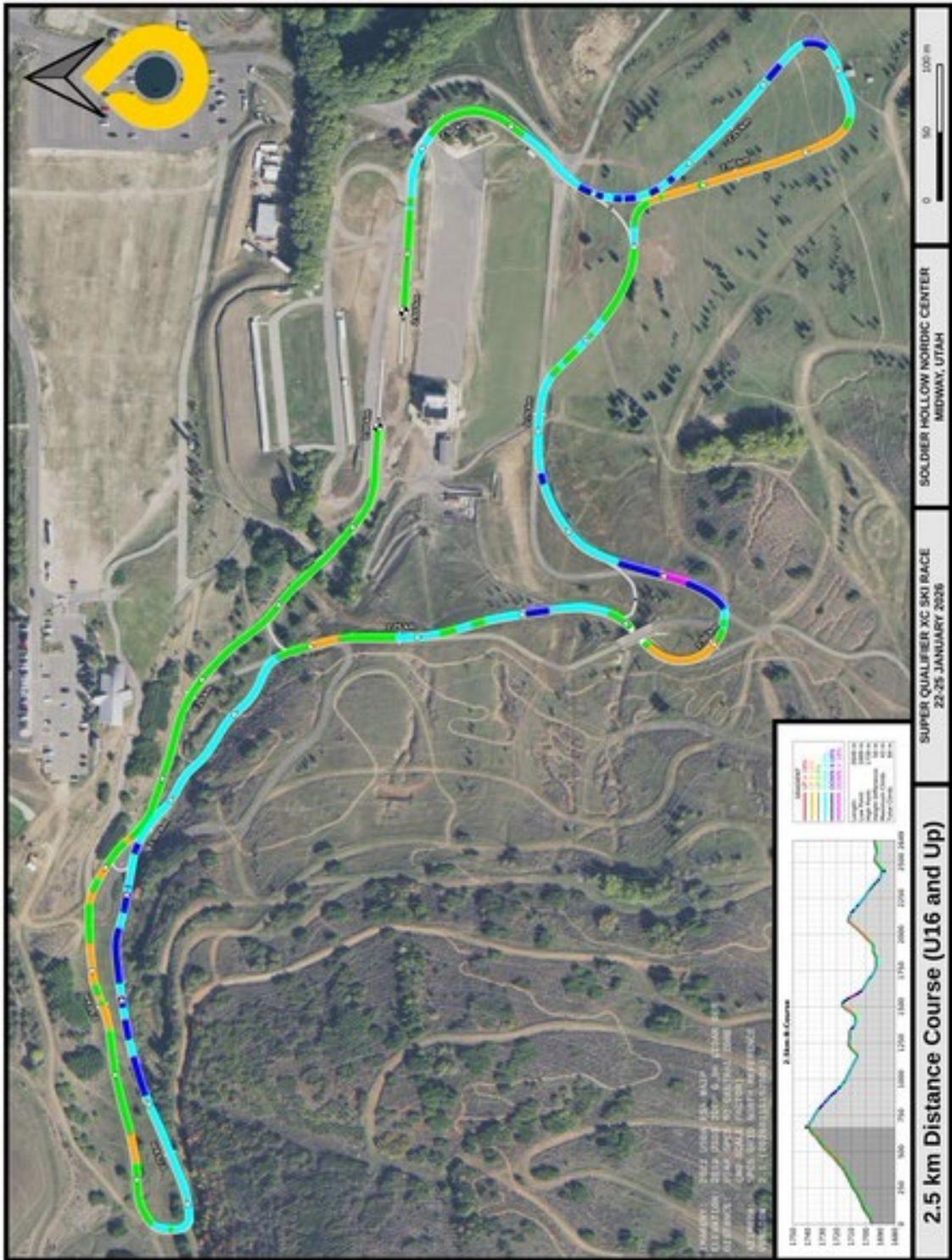

APPENDIX A: COURSE MAPS (NORDIC 7.5K)



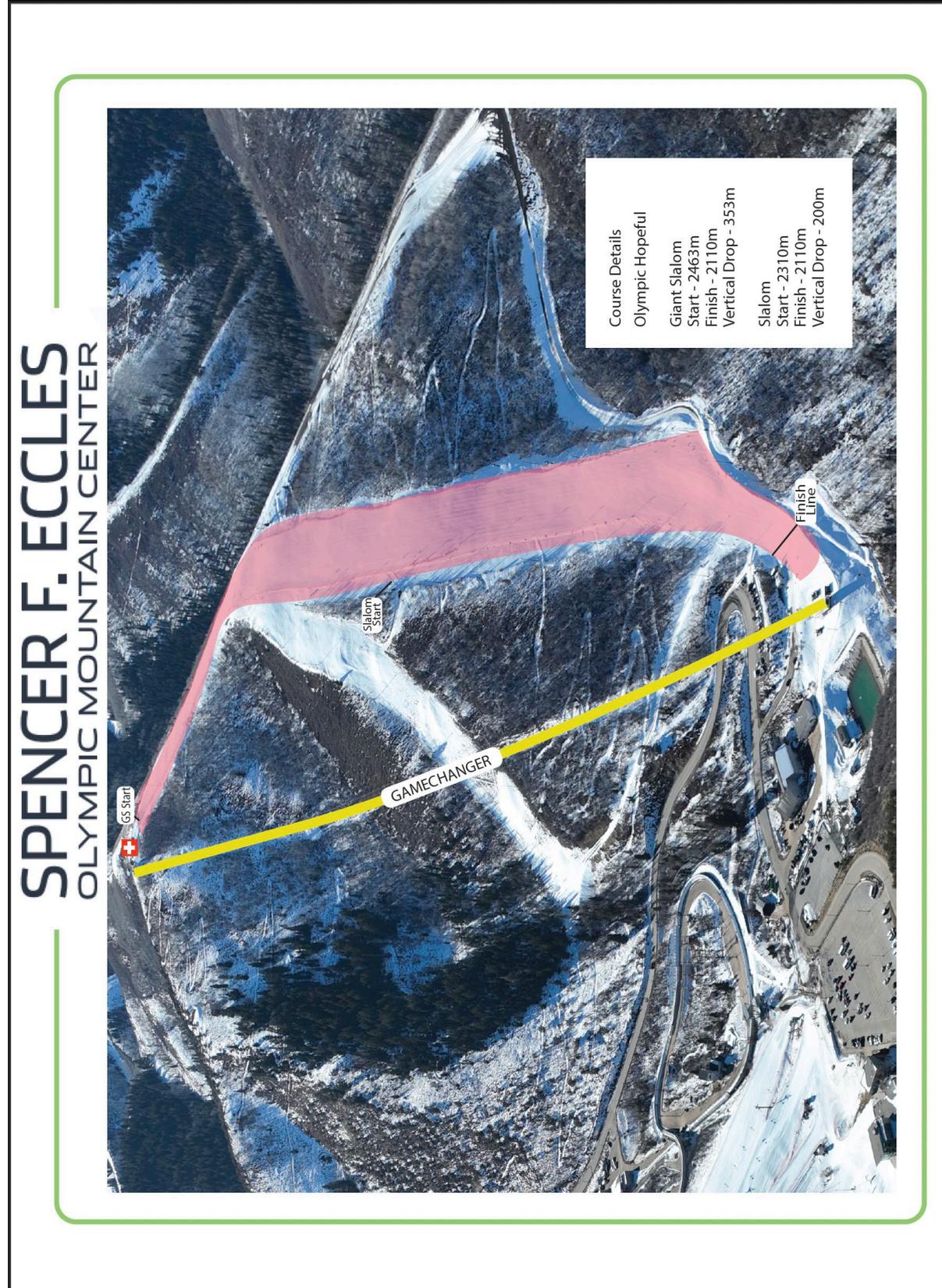
3 Complete Laps for 7.5km Total Distance

Emergency Policies & Procedures

1. An injury or medical event may be initially identified by a coach, parent, event official, spectator, or another athlete. These occurrences should be routed to the nearest medical personnel available. Our non-medical volunteers should be provided with the emergency contact list and instructed on protocols for notifying nearest medical staff to their station/location.

A. Medical incidents that occur on course will be managed by the assigned medical personnel nearest to the incident.

B. Any athlete experiencing loss of consciousness, loss of ABC's (airway, breathing or circulation), open wounds and/or neuromuscular compromise requires immediate evaluation by a designated medical provider and immediate notification of the Medical Director or Director of Emergency and Risk Management.

C. If emergency transport is deemed necessary, the Director of Emergency and Risk Management will be alerted immediately via the medical channel on the 2-way radios to initiate the transport process/calling 911.

2. In an emergency situation involving more than one-person, medical personnel should place an initial emphasis on rapid evaluation and triage, and activation of the Emergency Response System via the process as outlined above.

3. Medical issues involving a coach, spectator or volunteer should be directed to the Ski Patrol and handled according to venue policy.

Emergency Equipment

All medical and event staff should be trained on where to retrieve emergency medical equipment.

AED – Location listed on emergency contact cards.

Checked prior to event to document it is in working order.

Spine Board, Cervical collar and associated immobilization/padding

Oxygen, face mask with nasal cannula

Activating Emergency Response System:

The Director of Emergency and Risk Management or the Medical Director is responsible for activating EMS and will be in continuous communication regarding emergency situations. In the event the medical director is not onsite, the lead medical personnel will communicate with the emergency medical director.

SUMMARY

1. All medical stations are equipped with trauma equipment needed for patient stabilization: spinal immobilization, o2 (airways, bvm's, masks), sam splints, traction/leg splints, bandages, ice, AED on-site, etc. Detailed Inventory in Exhibit A. Medical Stations are shown in Exhibit D.
2. A medical helicopter will be available if needed (weather permitting). Evacuation procedure in Exhibit A, Helicopter Landing Zone (LZ) in Exhibit C
3. All medical transport will be directed to the nearest appropriate medical facility based on the level of trauma. Transport to the nearest level one trauma center will be available if needed. Local medical facilities are in Exhibit B
4. The UOP medical team consists of: UOP emergency first responders, Park City Fire Department (PCFD), Airmed/Life flight, University of Utah Sports Medicine Department, and the University of Utah Neurosurgical Critical Care Department.
5. Scat5 concussion assessments can be provided.

Event Injury Response Procedure – West Peak Area

1.1 Overview

These procedures are applicable in the event of an Athlete being injured during training or competition on West Peak at the Utah Olympic Park. Jump Operations, Plant Operations, and the Host Staff will assist in the management of this incident. The primary responsibility of the UOP patrol will be injury management and stabilization.

1.2 Park Operations

UOP EMTs will respond from the Medical Station at the top of the Game Changer Lift to the patient for first contact. If required, UOP will shut down all park operations including all training on the Track Operations side of the park. The West Peak patrollers will contact the Track side patrollers and the Jumpside patrollers to shut down operations should they need to depart their location and assist in the incident if necessary. All patrol communications will be broadcast on Channel 1.

1.3 Contact PCFD and Air Med

After performing an initial assessment, the on-scene patrollers will contact the Park City Fire Department and relay all pertinent incident information. The patrol first responder will call for an extrication team if needed and communicate the number of patients. If necessary the patrol first responder will also contact Air Med and place a helicopter on standby status. Patrol will continue their assessment of the patient(s) and update PCFD on patient condition.

1.4 Patient Care

A minimum of 2 UOP patrollers will respond to the scene or one patroller for each patient. Patrol located at stations 1 and 2 will coordinate transport and evacuation via radio on channel 1 to the medical suburban stationed between the plant and the bottom of Game Changer. Additional patrollers responding from jump side or track operations should bring additional backboards and additional KEDs as needed to location 2. Additional people may be provided to assist in moving patients and for patient care. The assistants will be assigned to a specific patroller and will follow the patroller's instructions. After patrol has performed a triage assessment on the patients, the additional operations personnel may be reassigned to other areas.

1.5 Extrication

In the event that a patient will be flown via air ambulance, the quickest extrication and transport site to the landing zone will be on the North side of Jump Center shown in Exhibit C. Both sides of Nordic Jump flats should be clear of snow to allow proper emergency vehicles entry, i.e snowmobile or ambulance. If the athlete comes to rest somewhere other than the bottom of the West Peak, then the extrication will be performed at the point of rest.

2 Injured Transportation from the Utah Olympic Park

When administering care, you are expected to provide a standard of care as set by the Utah State Bureau of Emergency Medical Services EMT Basic or National Ski Patrol Outdoor Emergency Care guidelines. Responding to medical and traumatic injuries is your top priority as a Utah Olympic Park Patroller.

2.1

The first responder will initiate transportation from the UOP either by private car, taxi, ambulance, or Air Med depending on the severity of the injury/illness and the location of the patient. A person who is not ambulatory should be discouraged from using a private vehicle or taxi.

If an ambulance is called, Patrol will arrange the location where the patient will be transferred. The plant operator or grounds crew will be alerted via Radio on Channel 2 to rendezvous with the ambulance and escort the ambulance to the patient transfer site. The ambulance crew will want a patient update when they arrive and have their own paperwork to complete. Request a copy of the ambulance crew's paperwork prior to their departure.

The first responder may also determine an air ambulance is necessary if there is an immediate threat to life and limb. The first responder will relay to Patrol an air ambulance is needed. The first responder should take into consideration patient location and current weather conditions when requesting Air Med. Air Med is unable to fly in inclement weather or high winds. If the first responder is unsure if Air Med can fly, dispatch both a ground and air ambulance. The air ambulance pilot will decide if the flight is possible.

Patrollers at the Utah Olympic Park are expected to extract an injured party from anywhere within the Utah Olympic Park boundaries. Patrollers should be familiar with all UOP extrication and response equipment.

2.2 Communication

All radio communications between rescuers needs to be accurate and concise to ensure proper patient care and handling. After the initial assessment, the first responder will contact patrol with an exact location, patient's age, patient's gender, suspected injuries/illnesses, and a request for any additional equipment. If it is immediately obvious that the situation requires ALS, a patroller may call PCFD and/or Air Med assistance.

2.3 Air Ambulance

In the event of an air ambulance, the Landing Zone in Exhibit C will be the designated LZ. The access road will be closed at the security gate located at the plant, except for emergency vehicles. Either a member of patrol, or plant operations will be designated the landing zone coordinator. Only the landing zone coordinator will be in communication with the air ambulance during approach.
