Section 1 • Introduction

During the 2019-20 academic year, the Association will sponsor 90 national championships – 42 for men, 45 for women, and three for both men and women. Of the men's championships, three are National Collegiate Championships, 13 are Division I championships, 12 are Division II championships and 14 are Division III championships. Of the women's championships, six are National Collegiate Championships, 12 are Division I championships, 13 are Division II championships and 14 are Division III championships. The combined men's and women's championships are National Collegiate Championships.

The Pre-Championship Manual will serve as a resource for institutions to prepare for the championship. This manual is divided into three sections: General Administrative Guidelines, Sport-Specific Information, and Appendixes.

The first section applies to policies applicable to all 90 championships, while the other two sections are sport-specific.

Section 1.1 Definitions

Pre-championship Manual. Resource for institutions to prepare for the championship.

Administrative Meeting. Pre-championship meeting for coaches and/or administrators.

Appendixes. Any supplemental documents to be provided and distributed through the various resources.

Championship Manager. The NCAA staff member(s) responsible for the operational oversight of the championship.

Games Committee. The committee assigned to supervise the conduct of each championship session at a specific site. For finals sites, the games committee is typically the NCAA national committee.

NCAA National Committee. The sport committee with direct oversight responsibilities for the championship.

Non-predetermined Sites. Those sites that are selected to host at the time of the participant/team selections announcement.

Playing Rules. The rules under which the competition will be conducted.

Predetermined Sites. Those sites that are selected to host before the participant/team selections announcement.

Preliminary Rounds. The rounds of the championship before the final or championship round.

Regional Alignment. The geographic location of institutions or regional advisory committees.

Schedule of Events. Official event schedule – includes all required activities (e.g., practices, banquets, etc.).

Selection Criteria. Policies and procedures in place to guide the team selection process.

Site Selection Criteria. Policies and procedures in place to guide the site selection process.

Squad Size. Number of student-athletes per team allowed to dress in uniform and participate at the championship.

Tournament Physician. The physician designated by the host institution/conference to serve as the chief medical advisor for the championship.

Section 2 • Championship Core Statement

The championships and alliances staff strives to administer competition in a fair, safe, equitable and sportsmanlike manner so that the experience of the student-athlete is paramount.

This is attained by:

Ensuring student-athletes' optimal experience.

Executing championship events reflecting appropriate quality and values to/for stakeholders — student-athletes, coaches, administrators, member institutions, sport committees, fans, broadcast partners and corporate champions/partners.

Coordinating all aspects of the championship in an efficient, effective manner through common operating policies and practices, using internal and external resources.

Integrating championships with broadcast and corporate relationships in a manner that maintains the integrity of the championship.

Assuring effective management of the business aspects of the operation.

Enhancing the assets of the NCAA and their value by collaborating with internal and external expertise to achieve heightened exposure (e.g., community programs, fan events, banquets, anniversaries, etc.).

Section 3 • Concussion Management

[Reference: Concussion Management in Constitution 3.2.4.20 in the NCAA Division I Manual, Constitution 3.3.4.17 in the NCAA Division II Manual, and Constitution 3.2.4.17 in the NCAA Division III Manual.]

The NCAA has adopted legislation that requires all active member institutions to have a concussion management plan for their student-athletes. Traveling institutions shall follow their concussion management plan while participating in NCAA championships. If a participating team lacks appropriate medical staff to activate its concussion management plan, the host championship concussion management plan will be activated.

The legislation notes, in part, that a student-athlete who exhibits signs, symptoms or behaviors consistent with a concussion shall be removed from athletics activities (e.g., competition, practice, conditioning sessions) and evaluated by a medical staff member (e.g., sports medicine staff, team physician) with experience in the evaluation and management of concussions; a student-athlete diagnosed with a concussion is precluded from returning to athletics activity for at least the remainder of that calendar day; and medical clearance for return to athletics activity shall be determined by the team physician or the physician's designee from the student-athlete's institution. In the absence of a team physician or their designee, the NCAA tournament physician will examine the student-athlete and will determine medical clearance. Within the rules of the sport and policies established for the championship, medical staff should have access to the injured student-athlete without interference (e.g., coach).

A concussion is a brain injury that may be caused by a blow to the head, face, neck or elsewhere on the body with an "impulsive" force transmitted to the head. Concussions can occur without loss of consciousness or other obvious signs. A repeat concussion that occurs before the brain recovers from the previous one (hours, days or weeks) can slow recovery or increase the likelihood of having more severe and/or long-term problems. In rare cases, repeat concussions can result in brain swelling, permanent brain damage and even death.

Section 4 • Conduct

Section 4•1 Certification of Eligibility/Availability

[Reference: Certification of Eligibility/Availability in Constitution 3.2.4 and Bylaws 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 31.2.1.7.1, 31.2.1.7.1.2 and 31.2.2 in the NCAA Division I Manual, Constitution 3.3.4 in the NCAA Division II Manual and Bylaws 31.2.2 and 31.2.1.5 in the NCAA Division III Manual.]

Only student-athletes eligible under Bylaws 12, 13, 14, 15 and 16 may compete in NCAA championships. Member institutions are required to certify the eligibility of their student-athletes before the beginning of each academic year and to withhold ineligible student-athletes from all intercollegiate competition.

Member institutions are reminded to notify the NCAA national office before the selection date for each championship of any student-athlete who may have participated in regular-season competition but subsequently is determined to be ineligible or unavailable for NCAA championship competition.

DISCOVERY OF INELIGIBILITY OF A STUDENT-ATHLETE AFTER SELECTION

If an institution fails to report an ineligible student-athlete and the omission is not discovered until after the institution is selected to participate in the championship, necessitating the institution's withdrawal from the championship, that withdrawal shall be considered as one of the years of ineligibility, provided another institution participates in the championship in place of

the disqualified institution. If the discovery of the ineligible student-athlete occurs so near the beginning of the championship that the governing sport committee does not have a reasonable period of time to replace the disqualified institution in the bracket, that fact shall be taken into consideration in determining the number of years the disqualified institution shall be ineligible to participate.

Section 4•2 Drug Testing

[Reference: Bylaws 18.4.1.4 and 31.2.2 in the NCAA Division I Manual and Bylaws 18.4.1.4 and 31.2.3 in the NCAA Divisions II and III Manuals.]

Student-athletes who compete in NCAA championships may be subjected to drug tests in accordance with Bylaws 18.4.1.4 and 31.2.2 (Division I); 31.2.3 (Divisions II and III), and may be determined to be ineligible as a result thereof. Only student-athletes who have consented in writing to such testing are initially eligible for these championships; and thereafter, student-athletes who are tested shall remain eligible only if they test negative.

Section 4•3 Honesty and Sportsmanship

Individuals employed by (or associated with) a member institution to administer, conduct or coach intercollegiate athletics and all participating student-athletes shall act with honesty and sportsmanship at all times so that intercollegiate athletics as a whole, their institutions and they, as individuals, shall represent the honor and dignity of fair play and the generally recognized high standards associated with wholesome competitive sports.

Section 4•4 Misconduct/Failure to Adhere to Policies

MISCONDUCT

Misconduct in an NCAA championship is any act of dishonesty, unsportsmanlike conduct, unprofessional behavior or breach of law, occurring from the time the championship field is announced through the end of the championship, that discredits the event or intercollegiate athletics. Each games committee shall hold an administrative meeting with the representatives of participating institutions to review and explain the policies related to misconduct.

FAILURE TO ADHERE TO POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

A governing sport committee may assess a financial penalty against an institution for failure of any of its representatives to adhere to the policies and procedures governing the administration of the competition. This includes, but is not limited to, failure to comply with the procedures and deadlines for submitting scores, score sheets, schedules, rosters and entry/march-in forms for qualification and other materials necessary for the efficient administration of the competition. Section 4•5 Sports Wagering Policy

Sports wagering includes placing, accepting or soliciting a wager (on a staff member's or student-athlete's own behalf or on the behalf of others) of any type with any individual or organization on any intercollegiate, amateur or professional team or contest. Examples of sports wagering include, but are not limited to, the use of a bookmaker or parlay card; internet sports wagering; mobile betting; auctions in which bids are placed on teams, individuals or contests; and pools or fantasy leagues in which an entry fee is required and there is an opportunity to win a prize.

The current NCAA legislation against sports wagering prohibits NCAA student-athletes, member institutions' athletics staff and non-athletics staff with athletics responsibilities, and conference office staff from participating in sports wagering activities or providing information to individuals involved in or associated with any type of sports wagering activities concerning intercollegiate, amateur or professional athletics practice or competition in a sport in which the NCAA conducts championship competition, in bowl subdivision football and in emerging sports for women.

A wager is any agreement in which an individual or entity agrees to give up an item of value (e.g., cash, shirt, dinner, etc.) in exchange for the possibility of gaining another item of value.

STUDENT-ATHLETES

A student-athlete found in violation of the prohibition against knowingly participating in any sports wagering activities or providing information to individuals involved in or associated with any type of sports wagering activity that involves intercollegiate, amateur or professional athletics competition shall be ineligible for further intercollegiate competition, subject to appeal to the Committee on Student-Athlete Reinstatement for restoration of eligibility.

POSTSEASON

In championships in which a bracket format is used, student-athletes, coaches and administrators may not participate in bracket competitions where there is both a required entry fee and an opportunity to win a prize. Student-athletes and administrators may participate under current NCAA rules in bracket contests where there is no entry fee but a possibility of winning a prize. Some NCAA member schools, however, have chosen to ban student-athletes from participating in these types of bracket contests.

HOSTING OPPORTUNITIES

It is permissible for NCAA championships to be conducted at locations in states that permit sports wagering.

Section 4•6 Student-Athlete Experience Survey

After each championship, institutional administrators, coaches and student-athletes will be asked to participate in a post-event survey intended to capture feedback on their recent championship experience. Institutional administrators and coaches will receive an email containing a link to the survey and will be asked to ensure participation from all student-athletes.

Section 5 • Elite 90™ Award

The Elite 90 award was created to recognize the true essence of student-athletes by honoring individuals who have reached the pinnacle of competition at the national championship level in their sport, while also achieving the highest academic standard among their peers. The award is presented in every sport, every division, and goes to the student-athlete who has the highest cumulative grade-point average of all student-athletes on all teams competing at the finals site. Each institution that has at least one student-athlete qualify for the final round/site is eligible to nominate a student-athlete for the award. One student-athlete per championship will receive the award, and the announcement of the winner will be made at the finals site.

Institutions that wish to nominate a student-athlete must do so through an online nomination process. To receive more information or access the online form and submit a nomination, go to ncaa.org.

Section 6 • Fan Travel

NCAA Travel provides an easy and affordable way for family and fans to follow their favorite student-athlete(s) and team(s) as they participate in NCAA championships competition. Travel arrangements completed through NCAA Travel help support NCAA student-athletes. Section 7 • Logo Policy

[Reference: Bylaws 12.5.4, 31.1.7 and 31.1.8 in the NCAA Division I Manual, Bylaw 12.5.4 in the NCAA Division II Manual and Bylaw 12.5.3 in the NCAA Division III Manual.]

A student-athlete may use athletics equipment or wear athletics apparel that bears the trademark or logo of an athletics equipment or apparel manufacturer or distributor in athletics competition and pre- and postgame activities (e.g., celebrations

on the court, pre- or postgame press conferences), provided the following criteria are met:

1. Athletics equipment (e.g., shoes, helmets, baseball bats and gloves, batting or golf gloves, hockey and lacrosse sticks, goggles and skis) shall bear only the manufacturer's normal label or trademark, as it is used on all such items for sale to the general public; and
2. The student-athlete's institution's official uniform (including numbered racing bibs and warmups) and all other items of apparel (e.g., socks, head bands, T-shirts, wrist bands, visors or hats, swim caps and towels) shall bear only a single manufacturer's or distributor's normal label or trademark (regardless of the visibility of the label or trademark), not to exceed 2-1/4 square inches in area (rectangle, square, parallelogram) including any additional material (e.g., patch) surrounding the normal trademark or logo. The student-athlete's institution's official uniform and all other items of apparel shall not bear a design element similar to the manufacturer's trademark/logo that is in addition to another trademark/logo that is contrary to the size restriction.

Section 8 • Research

It is essential that all research efforts be coordinated by a single entity within the national office structure in order to ensure maximum efficiency and quality, avoid unnecessary duplication of effort on the part of staff and membership, allow the NCAA to prioritize research efforts given the limited time and resources of our members and adhere to federal guidelines on the responsibilities of researchers to properly protect research participants from harm.

For the purpose of this policy, "research" is defined as any systematic collection of data for the purpose of drawing generalized conclusions.

Any proposal to conduct research must be submitted to the NCAA research staff for review at least six weeks before the project begins. Research to be conducted during NCAA championships or related events, and which involves competing student-athletes or attendees, is also subject to review. This includes all research, including that conducted by or under the direction of any employee, contractor or paid consultant of the NCAA. It also includes any research conducted by other persons, but funded totally or in part by the NCAA. Any research that detracts from the student-athlete experience or requires physical activity may not be permitted at the championships (preliminary rounds and finals sites). The NCAA retains sole discretion as to whether to allow such research.

Examples of activities considered research include: Conducting surveys of athletics administrators, college presidents, faculty, coaches and student-athletes; leading an organized focus group; funding an outside study under the auspices of the NCAA; conducting market research at championship events; secondary analysis of data originally collected by the NCAA from people for other purposes; any systematic collection of data from the membership or other entities; etc.

Section 9 • Religious Conflicts

[Reference: Bylaws 31.1.4.1 and 31.1.4.2 in the NCAA Division I Manual.]

Institutional Policy. If a participating institution has a written policy against competition on a particular day for religious reasons, it shall inform the NCAA national office on or before September 1 of each academic year in order for it or one of its student-athletes to be excused from competing on that day. The championship schedule shall be adjusted to accommodate that institution. (Adopted: 4/22/98, Revised: 8/11/98, 10/28/99, 5/2/13)

Individual Championships. In individual championships, an athlete must compete according to the institution's policy regarding Sunday competition (if the institution has no policy against Sunday competition, the student-athlete shall compete on Sunday if required by the schedule).

Section 1•5 Equipment

The Wilson Forte Fybrid II, Official NCAA Championship Match Ball, will be used in all NCAA tournament games. These balls will be sent by the manufacturer to the tournament manager at the host institution for each round of competition. The host institution is responsible for “breaking in” the game balls before each tournament game. In the event of inclement weather (e.g., snow), please notify Ryan Tressel at the NCAA national office regarding shipment of optic orange Wilson soccer match balls as backup. The game balls may be distributed after the games by giving them to the participating schools, using them as promotional giveaways or by donating them to a local youth group. One ball shall be provided to the center referee.

Section 1•6 Rules

[Reference: Bylaw 31.1.6 in the NCAA Division I Manual.]

Per NCAA Bylaw 17.30, member institutions shall conduct all of their intercollegiate competition in accordance with the playing rules of the Association in all sports for which the NCAA develops playing rules. For the men's soccer championship, the 2018 and 2019 NCAA Men's and Women's Soccer Rules shall be followed to the letter.

BALL ROTATION

Not fewer than five balls shall be available for use in a game, and the balls shall be identical in size, make, grade and color. **PENALTY — The game shall not begin and the referee shall file a report with the governing sports authority.** (Playing Rule 3.2.2)

RED CARDS

For NCAA Division I men's soccer tournament games, a coach, player or other bench personnel who must sit out the next tournament game due to a red card or serving a game suspension cannot be on the team bench or the field at any time; however, he or she may join the team in the locker room postgame. Further, a coach, player or other bench personnel removed from a game shall be removed and escorted from the playing field to a predetermined location away from the spectator area and field of play that is not in view of the game (i.e., locker room or team bus). In both instances, the coach, player or other bench personnel is prohibited from any communication or contact, direct or indirect, with the team, coaches and/or bench personnel from the start of the pregame warm-up to the game's completion, including all overtime periods and penalty kicks.

SUSPENDED GAMES

In the case of inclement weather or other factors leading the referee to suspend a game, the officials, games committee and coaches shall refer to the NCAA Men's and Women's Soccer Rules. *For NCAA championship competition, a game must be played for the full 90 minutes (as opposed to 70 minutes for the regular season) to be considered a complete game.*

If a game is suspended or postponed, it will be the decision of the games committee and the referee to determine if the game can be continued that day. If conditions dictate that the game cannot be completed, the NCAA site representative and tournament manager shall contact Ryan Tressel (office: 317-917-6316). Only after contacting Tressel may a game be suspended until the next day or moved to an alternate site. Teams should be prepared with footwear for any playing surface.

Section 1•7 Uniforms

[Reference: Bylaw 12.5.4 in the NCAA Division I Manual.]

Competing teams shall have both light- and dark-colored jerseys and light- and dark-colored stockings available. The home team shall have its choice of uniform color (either light or dark) and the visiting team shall wear a uniform in contrast with that of the home team. In the event of a conflict, the home team must change uniform colors (Playing Rule 4.2.1). For the semifinals and final, the games committee will determine the home teams.

DIVISION I MEN'S SOCCER

Student-athletes competing in the championship shall wear the official uniform of their institution in competition and related ceremonies. This applies to warm-ups, press conferences, awards ceremonies, practices and postgame celebrations.

It is required that any visible garment worn under the jersey or shorts be a solid color. The same color must be worn by all team members wearing undergarments. It is recommended the undergarment match the dominant color of the respective garment.

Section 2 • Determination of Championship Participation

Section 2•1 Championship Format

The men's soccer championship provides for a 48-team, single-elimination tournament. Twenty-four conferences will receive automatic qualification. The remaining 24 teams will be selected on an at-large basis. The committee will identify the top 16 teams and seed them in the bracket. The remaining 32 teams will be paired according to geographical proximity with each other. Additionally, when pairing teams, the committee shall avoid conference matchups in an institution's first game in the tournament.

Requests for changes to the starting time or competition date (quarterfinal only) that an institution submitted with its bid must be submitted for approval to Ryan Tressel at the NCAA national office Monday before each round of the championship. The NCAA may adjust any match time due to television.

TRAVEL PARTY/BENCH LIMIT

[Reference: Bylaw 31.1.5 in the NCAA Division I Manual.]

Each team is limited to a maximum of 33 persons on its bench. Of the 33 (travel party remains at 27), 21 student-athletes are to be designated eligible for play, and the official game roster is to be submitted and exchanged 15 minutes before game time.

Other players within the travel-party limit of 27 may sit in the team bench area in uniform but not participate. Thirty-three credentials will be issued to the travel party for each team. Extra players not in uniform should not be permitted on the bench unless they are counted in the travel party limit.

A maximum of 15 additional credentials may be issued (not good for admittance) to administrative staff, additional student-athletes, etc. As part of these 15 credentials, non-student-athletes will be issued a VIP credential (access to locker room, hospitality, press conferences and field – postgame only). Student-athletes will be issued temporary field credentials (access to locker room and field – postgame only). Schools are required to complete the form in the participant manual that lists the individuals who are to receive credentials.

Section 2•2 Results

SCORE REPORTING/RPI

For the 2019-20 academic year, the NCAA statistics group is collecting schedules for Division I men's soccer. All sports information directors are asked to submit their schedules on <http://web1.ncaa.org/stats/StatsSrv/login> by Aug. 1. Subsequently, weekly game results will be updated automatically via an XML transfer from reports provided to the NCAA statistics group.

All games played on an institution's schedule shall be considered for selection purposes. Scrimmages and/or exhibition games will not count in an institution's won-lost-tied record, nor will they be considered for selection purposes. Rescheduled games (including those with a different opponent) shall be considered for selection purposes, unless the game is being counted as a scrimmage or exhibition. New games may not be added to the schedule after the start of the season. The NCAA national office (attention: Ryan Tressel) and the respective regional advisory committee chair should be informed via email of any changes to an institution's schedule after the start of the season.

RPI information will be released by 3 p.m. Eastern time on the NCAA website at www.ncaa.com on the following dates: Oct. 14, 21, 22, and 28, Nov. 4, 11, and 19. In addition, the RPI will be released after the conclusion of the championship.

Section 2•3 Selection Information

[Reference: Bylaws 31.01.2, 31.01.3 and 31.3.3 in the NCAA Division I Manual.]

Teams for the men's soccer championship shall be selected by the NCAA Division I Men's Soccer Committee. The committee has nine members. Seven of the nine committee members serve as non-voting chairs of the advisory committees. The other two members serve on an at-large basis.

The committee will conduct an in-person selection meeting. Insofar as possible, all selections will be made by Nov. 12 and will be distributed to institutions.

AUTOMATIC QUALIFICATION

AT-LARGE SELECTION

Twenty-four teams will be selected at-large. To be considered for the at-large selection process, a team must have an overall DI won-lost-tied record of .500 or better.

Section 2•4 Selection Criteria

The following criteria shall be employed by a governing sports committee in selecting participants for NCAA championships competition:

- Won-lost record;
- Strength of schedule; and
- Eligibility and availability of student-athletes for NCAA championships.

In addition to Bylaw 31.3.3, the Men's Soccer Committee shall consider the following criteria in the selection of at-large teams for the men's soccer championship (not necessarily in priority order):

- Adjusted Rating Percentage Index (RPI), which includes:
 - Won-lost-tied record (25%).
 - Opponents' strength of schedule (50%).
 - Opponents' opponents' strength of schedule (25%).
 - Bonus/penalty system (see below).
- Head-to-head competition.
- Results versus common opponents.
- Strength and results against nonconference opponents.
- Results against teams already selected (including automatic qualifiers with an RPI of 1-75).
- Late-season performance in last eight games (strength and results).
- Strength and results against conference opponents.

Recommendations provided by regional advisory committees also shall be considered by the Men's Soccer Committee. Coaches' polls and/or any other outside polls or rankings are not used as a criterion by the Men's Soccer Committee for selection purposes.

COUNTABLE COMPETITION

For NCAA team-championship selection purposes, competition is countable only when the teams played are varsity intercollegiate teams of four-year, degree-granting institutions that conduct a majority of their competition in that team sport against varsity intercollegiate teams (see Constitution 3.2.4.5) of United States four-year, degree-granting institutions. Competition against service teams, professional teams, semiprofessional teams, amateur teams, two-year colleges and club teams shall be excluded.

Additionally, the scheduling of additional matches not listed on the institution's published schedule as an aid for selection shall not be considered. If an institution encounters extenuating circumstances (e.g., natural disaster), the committee will consider a written waiver request. This request should be sent to Ryan Tressel (rtressel@ncaa.org) prior to selections. It should be noted that a team will not be penalized for the first non-Division I game on a team's schedule, but any subsequent non-Division I games will receive the maximum penalty points. All games, however, are reported in an institution's won-lost-tied record.

Section 2•5 Site Selection

Any institution interested in hosting preliminary-round competition of the 2019 NCAA Division I Men's Soccer Championship must submit a proposed budget, respond to sport-specific questions and ensure the institution's key contacts and facility information are up to date via the Championships Bid and Profile System (<https://championships.ncaa.org/admin/main>). A separate proposed budget must be submitted for each round that an institution is interested in hosting. To submit a bid, first search for the desired championship under "Championships Available for Bidding" and select "Start Bid."

This process allows all member institutions to regularly and easily access their profiles by visiting championships.ncaa.org. For profile issues, user access or to reset a password, please contact Ryan Tressel (317-917-6316 or rtressel@ncaa.org).

PROSPECTIVE HOSTS

A competing institution that cannot charge admission at its home facility, cannot establish a barrier to separate the spectators from the field of play or that does not have a field that meets minimum size requirements (70 yards x 110 yards) may not serve as host. Preference will be given to grass fields 70 yards x 115 yards and larger. Institutions serving as hosts for preliminary-round games or the semifinals and final must charge admission.

All rounds of the championship, except the Men's College Cup, will be conducted on the campus of one of the participating institutions.

Please refer to [Appendix C](#) for a facility and field checklist for preliminary-round sites.

Note: For preliminary-round sites, a team in the top 16 will automatically be selected as a site, unless the institution did not submit a bid to host. If a game involves two seeded teams, the higher seed will host, unless the institution did not submit a bid to host.

If the field is unplayable, the host will have the opportunity to find a suitable alternate site. An alternate site must have a field that meets the minimum dimensions of 70 yards x 110 yards, and must be deemed playable by the games committee and approved by the NCAA Division I Men's Soccer Committee.

CHAMPIONSHIPS BID AND HOST PROFILE PORTAL

The Championships Bid and Host Profile portal can be accessed at championships.ncaa.org. The deadline to submit all bid materials for this championship is Oct. 28.

As a reminder, prospective hosts' budgets should include committee/site representative's lodging expense, game officials' lodging expense, state and city taxes/fees, if applicable, and any ticket fees. Committee/site representative's per diem, mileage and luggage fees will be paid by the NCAA instead of the host institution. Game officials will be reimbursed via the RefPay system for their game fees, per diem, mileage and luggage fees.

For both the game officials and committee/site representatives, hosts will pay for their lodging expenses and be reimbursed by the NCAA. However, if the NCAA manages the hotel block for the game officials, the officials' lodging expenses shall be directly billed to the NCAA. The NCAA typically manages the officials' hotel block at the final site for its championships.

FACILITY PROFILE

Institutions interested in hosting preliminary-round competition of the 2019 NCAA Division I Men's Soccer Championship must add (or ensure accuracy of) facility information for the applicable competition venue. This information is located at championships.ncaa.org. Any supporting information (e.g., facility diagram, pictures) may be uploaded and attached to that facility's profile. This information will be made available to the sport committee to aid in their deliberations of prospective host sites.

KEY CONTACTS

Each institution should list and then maintain its key contacts associated with each sport and the institution. Individuals can be added via the Championships Bid and Host Profile portal at championships.ncaa.org.

SAFETY AND SECURITY PLAN

The NCAA has established a Safety and Security Advisory Group (SSAG) to develop Best Practices for all NCAA championships. The SSAG developed these Best Practices based on a review of current and future championships competition venues, discussions with safety and security experts, and their own experience and knowledge. All hosts and competition venues are strongly encouraged to refer to the Best Practices located at http://www.ncaa.org/sites/default/files/Best_Practices_for_Venue_Safety_and_Security.pdf?division=d1 when developing a safety and security program.

The suggestions outlined in Best Practices for Venue Safety and Security are based on practices that are employed by competition venues across the nation. The need and ability to implement them at each facility and event will vary. Properly trained and equipped personnel constitute the primary element of implementing a successful safety and security program.

Best Practices for championships competition venue safety are intended for guidance purposes only; they are not a requirement under NCAA or other regulations or legislation. In addition, because of the wide variety of designs and sizes of competition venues, and composition and profile of particular events, not all Best Practices will be reasonable or applicable.

The Best Practices should not be viewed as a complete or primary source of information for developing or implementing the safety program for the competition venue hosting an NCAA championship. Rather, facility managers and local public safety personnel should consider the current national threat level, nature of specific threats and the full range of resources available when responding to changes in the threat condition levels.

Each facility profile should include the safety and security plan for that facility, which would be inclusive of the NCAA Championships Safety and Security Team Contact Information form. This information can be uploaded and attached to the profile by visiting championships.ncaa.org.

FINAL FINANCIAL REPORT

[Reference: Bylaw 31.4 in the NCAA Manual.]

A final financial report from each championship site must be submitted via the Championships Bid and Host Profile portal under the "budget" tab not later than 60 days after the event.

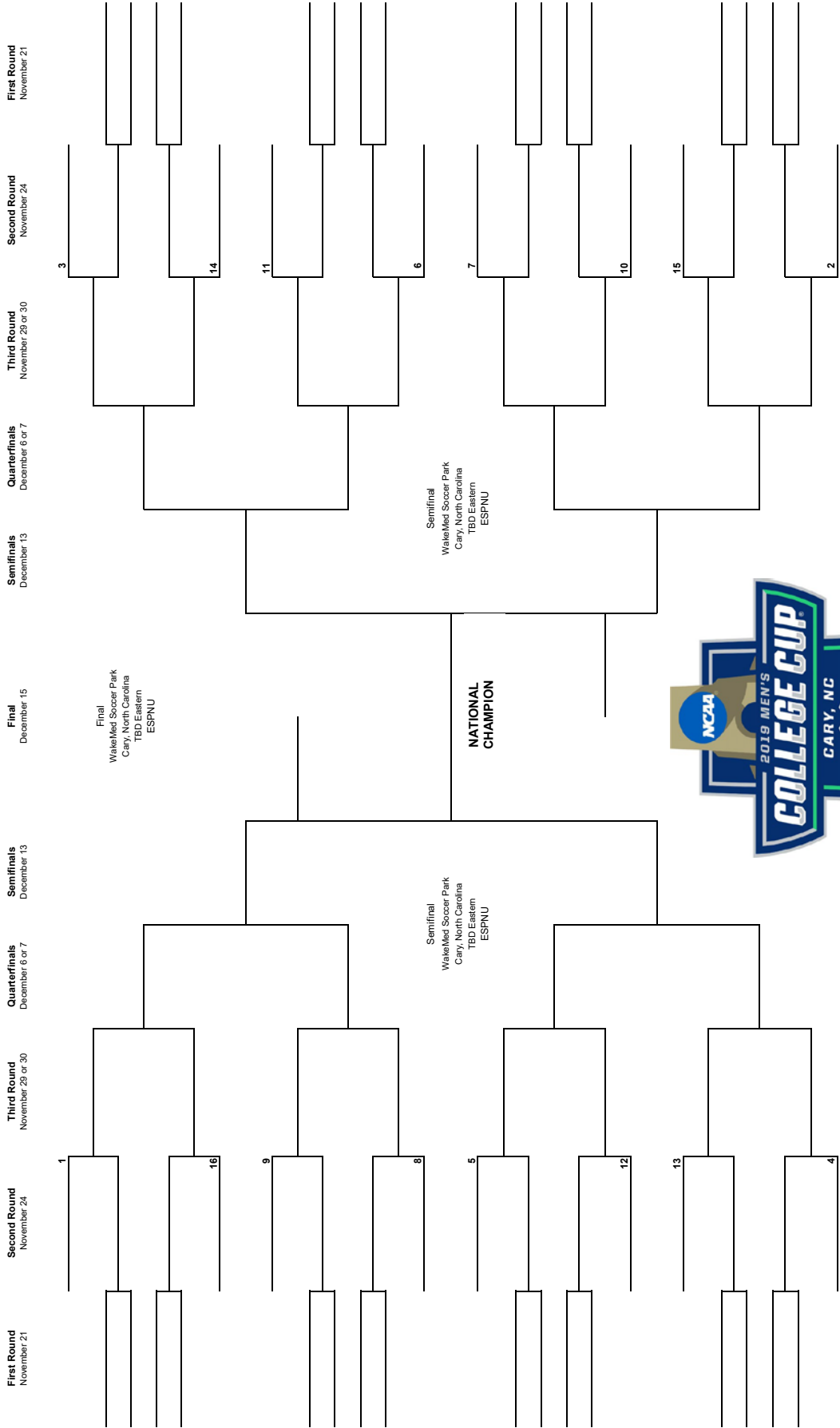

Appendix E • Officials

POSTSEASON OFFICIATING POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

A. Selection Criteria for Officials.

An NCAA sports committee may not require membership in any specific officials' association as a prerequisite for selection to officiate in an NCAA tournament. For all NCAA postseason soccer matches, officials (referee, assistant, alternate) shall be selected and assigned by the NCAA national coordinator of officials, with assistance from the regional advisors, on approval of the NCAA Division I Men's Soccer Committee. Any committee member whose team is selected to the championship will be recused from the process.

In addition, officials shall adhere to the Association's policies relating to gambling activities and drug and alcohol use. Appointments to work as an official for any of the NCAA soccer championships is conditioned on the NCAA Division I Men's Soccer Committee, in its sole discretion, remaining of the opinion that your character, fitness, rules knowledge, and regular and postseason officiating performance are all of the highest order. Failure to do so may result in termination of the officiating assignment.

- Officials shall be qualified, competent and appropriately credentialed. In selecting officials, experience and ability as a referee and as an assistant referee shall be considered.
- Officials **MUST** take and pass an online **NCAA Soccer Rules Test**. Officials will have two attempts to pass the exam with a 90% or better score. The test requirement must be fulfilled not later than October 31, 2019.
- Officials **MUST** be **Registered** with ncaasoccer.arbitersports.com in order to be considered and potentially receive an NCAA postseason assignment.
- Officials will not be assigned to a match if it involves an institution he or she attended, was or is an employee of, or if his or her spouse/partner or relatives have any of these affiliations. In addition, officials will not be assigned to a game if there is an affiliation with a member of the coaching staff (i.e., former team member).
- To be selected as a **Center Referee** for an NCAA Division I men's soccer postseason match, an official must have officiated (as a Center Referee) a minimum of six NCAA Division I men's soccer matches in the current season **or** have officiated a minimum of 10 NCAA Division I men's soccer matches over the past two years with a minimum of three in the current season.
- To be selected as an **Assistant Referee** for an NCAA Division I men's soccer postseason match, an official must have officiated (as a Center Referee and/or an Assistant Referee) a minimum of six NCAA Division I men's soccer matches in the current season **or** have officiated a minimum of 10 NCAA Division I men's soccer matches over the past two years with a minimum of three in the current season. *A combination of Division I men's soccer assignments as a referee and assistant referee may be used to meet the requirement.*
- In order for an official to be considered for selection, such official must be recommended by at least one NCAA Division I conference.
- Officials shall be within driving distance for preliminary rounds (must be within 400 miles one way for Division I) or approved for a flight.

Dec. 13 and 15	Men's College Cup, WakeMed Soccer Park, Cary, North Carolina.

C. Championship/Travel Policies and Protocol

- NCAA Rules.** Per NCAA Bylaw 17.30, member institutions shall conduct all of their intercollegiate competition in accordance with the playing rules of the Association in all sports for which the NCAA develops playing rules. For the NCAA Division I Men's Soccer Championship, the 2018 and 2019 NCAA Men's and Women's Soccer Rules shall be followed to the letter.
- Alternate Official.** For preliminary-round matches, an alternate official from the local area shall be assigned to assist at the scorer's table, facilitate player substitution and, at the discretion of the referee (in accordance with NCAA Men's and Women's Soccer Rules), replace a field official in the event of injury.
- System.** The diagonal system of control (three officials) will be used to officiate all tournament matches. Officials are to dress alike and should wear shirts whose color is in contrast to the colors worn by the competing teams.
- Uniform Patch.** NCAA patches will be sent to the host institution by the NCAA national office for officials to affix to their uniforms. They shall be worn on the upper left front of the shirt and beneath the American flag (if needed). No other patches or emblems are permitted on the officials' uniforms. This policy includes the alternate officials' hand-held flags.
- Locker Room.** Only the match officials assigned to a tournament contest, designated representatives of the soccer committee (or site representative) and the tournament director will be permitted in the officials' dressing room before, during or after a match, as needed.
- Meetings.** Officials shall arrive on site prepared for the officials meeting. It was agreed that the officials meeting must take place before the administrative meeting, allowing time for the officiating crew to survey the field for any concerns and determine the goal for potential penalty kicks. The head coaches of the participating teams are required to attend the mandatory administrative meeting at first- and second-round matches, as well as at the Men's College Cup. For third-round matches and quarterfinals, an institution may choose to have the head coach attend or designate another member of the coaching staff. It remains a requirement to have an administrator in attendance. The administrative meeting shall be held not later than 2½ hours before the start of the match. If the individuals required to attend the meeting (participating institutions' representatives, officiating crew or center referee, site representative and tournament personnel) have arrived at the site the evening before competition, then the meeting may be conducted. The host institution is responsible for communicating this information to all attendees in a timely manner so appropriate arrangements may be made.

7. **Fees.** Fees shall be as follows per match: referee—\$315; assistant referees—\$230; and alternate officials—\$125. The flat fee for officials assigned to the Men's College Cup is \$1,000. Seven officials will be selected and assigned to the Men's College Cup matches to ensure the best qualified officials based on position (referee and assistant referee) are assigned.

8. **Expense Reimbursement.** Officials, including the alternate official, assigned to first-, second-, third- and quarterfinal-round matches shall receive ground transportation expenses based on 53 cents per mile. Officials for preliminary rounds must be within driving distance of the host site (400 miles one way). (Note: The Men's Soccer Committee does have an exception for the referee only for quarterfinal matches, if warranted.)

Only officials for the Men's College Cup matches may be reimbursed for air travel, not to exceed jet coach airfare. If an official must fly, travel arrangements must be made through the NCAA travel service at Short's Travel Management, 866-655-9215.

Hotel expenses (excluding incidentals) for officials required to stay overnight at the championship site (including preliminary rounds) shall be paid by the host institution and later reimbursed by the NCAA. The host institution will make the hotel reservation. Officials, including the alternate official, will receive a \$45 per diem for meals and incidentals on each day of the championship, beginning with the day of arrival and ending with the day of departure.

Officials not required to remain overnight at the site also shall receive a \$45 per diem. Alternate officials receive a \$125 match fee unless that official substitutes for one of the match officials. Then, the alternate receives the fee of the replaced official.

9. **RefPay.** Officials for all rounds of the NCAA Division I Men's Soccer Championship will receive payment via RefPay. If you have not set up your RefPay account yet, please do so immediately to ensure timely payment. Instructions were provided when you signed up for your Arbiter account.
