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Section 1 • Introduction

During the 2025-26 academic year, the Association will sponsor 92 national championships - 43 for men, 47 for women and two for both men and women. Of the men's championships, four are National Collegiate Championships, 13 are Division I championships, 12 are Division II championships. Of the women's championships, eight are National Collegiate Championships, 12 are Division I championships, 13 are Division II championships and 14 are Division III championships. The combined men's and women's championships are National Collegiate Championships.

The Prechampionship Manual will serve as a resource for institutions to prepare for the championship. This manual is divided into three sections: General Administrative Guidelines, Sport-Specific Information and Appendixes.

Sections one through nine apply to policies applicable to all 92 championships, while the remaining sections are sport specific

Section 1.1 Definitions

Prechampionship Manual. Resource for institutions to prepare for the championship.

Administrative Meeting. Prechampionship meeting for coaches and/or administrators.

Appendixes. Any supplemental documents to be provided and distributed through the various resources.

Championship Manager. The NCAA staff member(s) responsible for the operational oversight of the championship.

Games Committee. The committee assigned to supervise the conduct of each championship session at a specific site. For finals sites, the games committee is typically the NCAA national committee.

NCAA National Committee. The sport committee with direct oversight responsibilities for the championship.

Non-predetermined Sites. Those sites that are selected to host at the time of the participant/team selections announcement.

Playing Rules. The rules under which the competition will be conducted.

Predetermined Sites. Those sites that are selected to host before the participant/team selections announcement.

Preliminary Rounds. The rounds of the championship before the final or championship round.

Regional Alignment. The geographic location of institutions or regional advisory committees.

Schedule of Events. Official event schedule - includes all required activities (e.g., practices, banquets).

Selection Criteria. Policies and procedures in place to guide the team selection process.

Site Selection Criteria. Policies and procedures in place to guide the site selection process.

Squad Size. In any championship in which a squad limit has been established by the governing sport committee or by the bylaws, the number of eligible student-athletes in competitive uniform eligible to participate at the start of competition.

Tournament Physician. The physician designated by the host institution/conference to serve as the chief medical advisor for the championship event(s) to be hosted at the host venue.

Section 2 · Championship Core Statement

The championships and alliances staff strives to administer competition in a fair, safe, equitable and sportsmanlike manner so that the experience of the student-athlete is paramount.

This is attained by:

Ensuring student-athletes' optimal experience.

Executing championship events reflecting appropriate quality and values to/for stakeholders – student-athletes, coaches, administrators, member institutions, sport committees, fans, broadcast partners and corporate champions/partners.

Coordinating all aspects of the championship in an efficient, effective manner through common operating policies and practices, using internal and external resources.

Integrating championships with broadcast and corporate relationships in a manner that maintains the integrity of the championship.

Assuring effective management of the business aspects of the operation.

Enhancing the assets of the NCAA and their value by collaborating with internal and external expertise to achieve heightened exposure (e.g., community programs, fan events, banquets, anniversaries).

Section 3 · Conduct

Section 3.1 Certification of Eligibility/Availability

[Reference: Certification of Eligibility/Availability in Bylaws 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 20.2.4, 31.2.1.7.1, 31.2.1.7.1.2 and 31.2.2 in the NCAA Division I Manual, Bylaws 7.3.1.5 and 18.2.1 in the NCAA Division II Manual and Division II Championships Committee Policy and Bylaws 31.2.1.5, 31.2.1.5.2, and 31.2.2 in the NCAA Division III Manual.]

Only student-athletes eligible under Bylaws 12, 13, 14, 15 and 16 may compete in NCAA championships. Member institutions are required to certify the eligibility of their student-athletes before the beginning of each academic year and to withhold ineligible student-athletes from all intercollegiate competition.

Member institutions are reminded to notify the NCAA national office before the selection date for each championship of any student-athlete who may have participated in regular-season competition but subsequently is determined to be ineligible or unavailable for NCAA championship competition.

DISCOVERY OF INELIGIBILITY OF A STUDENT-ATHLETE AFTER SELECTION

If an institution fails to report an ineligible student-athlete and the omission is not discovered until after the institution is selected to participate in the championship, necessitating the institution's withdrawal from the championship, that withdrawal shall be considered as one of the years of ineligibility, provided another institution participates in the championship in place of the disqualified institution. If the discovery of the ineligible student-athlete occurs so near the beginning of the championship that the governing sport committee does not have a reasonable period of time to replace the disqualified institution in the bracket, that fact shall be taken into consideration in determining the number of years the disqualified institution shall be ineligible to participate.

Section 3.2 Drug Testing

As part of preparation and planning to participate in championship events, member institutions are reminded and encouraged to review all applicable policy and legislative requirements pertaining to banned substances, drug testing and related eligibility requirements with their student-athletes. Student-athletes who compete in NCAA championships may be subjected to drug tests in accordance with legislation and may be determined to be ineligible as a result thereof. Only student-athletes who have consented in writing to such testing are initially eligible for these championships; and thereafter, student-athletes who are tested shall remain eligible only if they test negative.

Section 3.3 Honesty and Sportsmanship

Individuals employed by (or associated with) a member institution to administer, conduct or coach intercollegiate athletics and all participating student-athletes shall act with honesty and sportsmanship at all times so that intercollegiate athletics as a whole, their institutions and they, as individuals, shall represent the honor and dignity of fair play and the generally recognized high standards associated with wholesome competitive sports.

Section 3.4 Misconduct/Failure to Adhere to Policies

MISCONDUCT

Misconduct in an NCAA championship is any act of dishonesty, unsportsmanlike conduct, unprofessional behavior or breach of law, occurring from the time the championship field is announced through the end of the championship, that discredits the event or intercollegiate athletics. Each games committee shall hold an administrative meeting with the representatives of participating institutions to review and explain the policies related to misconduct.

FAILURE TO ADHERE TO POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

A governing sport committee may assess a financial penalty against an institution for failure of any of its representatives to adhere to the policies and procedures governing the administration of the competition. This includes, but is not limited to, failure to comply with the procedures and deadlines for submitting scores, score sheets, schedules, rosters and entry/march-in forms for qualification and other materials necessary for the efficient administration of the competition. Section 3.5 Sports Wagering Policy

Sports wagering includes placing, accepting or soliciting a wager (on a staff member's or student-athlete's own behalf or on the behalf of others) of any type with any individual or organization on any intercollegiate, amateur or professional team or contest. Examples of sports wagering include, but are not limited to, the use of a bookmaker or parlay card; internet sports wagering; mobile betting; auctions in which bids are placed on teams, individuals or contests; and pools or fantasy leagues in which an entry fee is required and there is an opportunity to win a prize.

The current NCAA legislation against sports wagering prohibits NCAA student-athletes, member institutions' athletics staff and non-athletics staff with athletics responsibilities, and conference office staff from participating in sports wagering activities or providing information to individuals involved in or associated with any type of sports wagering activities concerning intercollegiate, amateur or professional athletics practice or competition in a sport in which the NCAA conducts championship competition, in bowl subdivision football and in emerging sports for women.

A wager is any agreement in which an individual or entity agrees to give up an item of value (e.g., cash, shirt, dinner) in exchange for the possibility of gaining another item of value.

STUDENT-ATHLETES

A student-athlete found in violation of the prohibition against knowingly participating in any sports wagering activities or providing information to individuals involved in or associated with any type of sports wagering activity that involves intercollegiate, amateur or professional athletics competition shall be ineligible for further intercollegiate competition, subject to appeal to the Committee on Student-Athlete Reinstatement for restoration of eligibility.

POSTSEASON

In championships in which a bracket format is used, student-athletes, coaches and administrators may not participate in bracket competitions where there is both a required entry fee and an opportunity to win a prize. Student-athletes and administrators may participate under current NCAA rules in bracket contests where there is no entry fee but a possibility of winning a prize. Some NCAA member schools, however, have chosen to ban student-athletes from participating in these types of bracket contests.

HOSTING OPPORTUNITIES

It is permissible for NCAA championships to be conducted at locations in states that permit sports wagering.

Section 3.6 Student-Athlete Experience Survey

During the NCAA championships, the student-athlete experience is paramount. NCAA staff and hosts dedicate themselves to planning the best experiences for all involved. As part of our commitment to getting better, following the championship, participants will receive a survey to provide feedback on their experience and input on how championships can be improved for future NCAA student-athletes. Institutional administrators and coaches will receive

an email containing a link to the survey and will be asked to forward the survey to student-athletes. Additionally, this survey will be accessible via QR code found on the back of NCAA-issued championship credentials.

We also understand that sometimes certain circumstances or conditions occurring during the events may require real-time consideration. When this is the case, student-athletes may reach out to their site representative or NCAA national office staff on-site.

Section 4 • Elite Scholar-Athlete™ Award

The Elite Scholar-Athlete award was created to recognize the true essence of student-athletes by honoring individuals who have reached the pinnacle of competition at the national championship level in their sport, while also achieving the highest academic standard among their peers. The award is presented in every sport, every division, and goes to the student-athlete who has the highest cumulative grade-point average of all student-athletes competing at the finals site. One student-athlete per championship will receive the award, and the announcement of the winner will be made at the finals site.

Section 5 • Fan Travel

Section 6 • Health and Safety

As part of preparation and planning to host and/or participate in championship events, member institutions are reminded and encouraged to review all applicable health and safety policy and legislative requirements and guidance including, among others, those relating to concussion management, catastrophic injury prevention, inclement weather and independent medical care. These requirements and related information can be found in applicable division manuals, sports playing rules and the materials located on the **Health, Safety & Performance website**. In addition, a summary of some of the key health and safety considerations related to traveling to championship events can be found in the **NCAA's Guidance for Medical Care and Coverage for Student-Athletes at Away Events**.

Section 7 • Logo Policy

[Reference: Bylaws 12.5.4, 31.1.7 and 31.1.8 in the NCAA Division I Manual, Bylaw 17.1.10 in the NCAA Division II Manual and Bylaw 12.5.3 in the NCAA Division III Manual.]

A student-athlete may use athletics equipment or wear athletics apparel that bears the trademark or logo of an athletics equipment or apparel manufacturer or distributor in athletics competition and pre- and postgame activities (e.g., celebrations on the court, pre- or postgame press conferences), provided the following criteria are met:

1. Athletics equipment (e.g., shoes, helmets, baseball bats and gloves, batting or golf gloves, hockey and lacrosse sticks, goggles and skis) shall bear only the manufacturer's normal label or trademark, as it is used on all such items for sale to the general public; and

2. The student-athlete's institution's official uniform (including numbered racing bibs and warmups) and all other items of apparel (e.g., socks, head bands, T-shirts, wrist bands, visors or hats, swim caps and towels) shall bear only a single manufacturer's or distributor's normal label or trademark (regardless of the visibility of the label or trademark), not to exceed 2-1/4 square inches in area (rectangle, square, parallelogram) including any additional material (e.g., patch) surrounding the normal trademark or logo. The student-athlete's institution's official uniform and all other items of apparel shall not bear a design element similar to the manufacturer's trademark/logo that is in addition to another trademark/logo that is contrary to the size restriction.

Section 8 • Research

In order to avoid inappropriate and unnecessary participant distraction and disruption of championship events, it is expected any data collection or other research efforts conducted at or during championship events will be coordinated through the national office, with notice and a description of any research proposal to be submitted to the NCAA research staff at least six weeks before the championships event begins.

Section 9 • Travel Party

Please refer to the NCAA travel policies for all information regarding transportation and per diem expenses. NCAA Travel policies are updated annually and can be found online **here**. Please reference Appendix A of the travel policies for reimbursable travel party numbers. The travel policies supersede all other documents.

Section 10 • Religious Conflicts

[Reference: Bylaws 31.1.4.1 and 31.1.4.2 in the NCAA Division I Manual.]

Institutional Policy. If a participating institution has a written policy against competition on a particular day for religious reasons, it shall inform the NCAA national office on or before Sept. 1 of each academic year in order for it or one of its student-athletes to be excused from competing on that day. The championship schedule shall be adjusted to accommodate that institution. (Adopted: 4/22/98, Revised: 8/11/98, 10/28/99, 5/2/13)

Individual Championships. In individual championships, an athlete must compete according to the institution's policy regarding Sunday competition (if the institution has no policy against Sunday competition, the student-athlete shall compete on Sunday if required by the schedule).

Section 11 • Team Replacement Policy

Division I developed a team replacement policy considering the possibility of unforeseen circumstances impacting championship fields. The policy will be implemented in accordance with the terms set forth in the policy document available **here** when, despite best efforts, a team within the championship field is impeded or hindered from participating in the championship for reasons beyond its control.

CHAMPIONSHIP DATES

As part of a two-year pilot program, the men's and women's singles and doubles championships will be conducted in the fall of 2025, while the team championships will take place in the spring of 2026. The 2025 singles and doubles tournament will be held at the USTA National Campus in Orlando, Florida. The team tournament of the Division I Men's and Women's Tennis Championships will be held at the University of Georgia in Athens, Georgia.

CHAMPIONSHIPS DATE FORMULA

The singles and doubles championships will be conducted Tuesday through Sunday before Thanksgiving.

Tuesday-Sunday, Nov. 17-22

One championship team quarterfinal round begins 11 days before Memorial Day, and the second championship team quarterfinal begins Friday, 10 days before Memorial Day. Both semifinal matches will be Saturday and the finals Sunday.

NOTE: In even-numbered years, the men's championships events will begin first, and during odd-numbered years, the women's championships event will begin first.

First- and second-round play begins the weekend before the super regionals (Friday-Saturday or Saturday-Sunday). Super regionals will be played the weekend before finals (Friday or Saturday).

The singles and doubles and team competition of the 2026-27 Division I Men's and Women's Tennis Championships will be hosted by the University of Georgia in Athens, Georgia, regardless of whether the singles and doubles take place in the fall or spring.

Section 1.4 Balls

Wilson is the official ball of the NCAA tennis championships. The Wilson U.S. Open Extra Duty ball will be used for the men's and women's championships and will be used during all rounds of team and individual competition. Three cases of Wilson balls (per gender if dual site) will be shipped to first- and second-round tournament directors immediately after

the selection announcement. One case (per gender if dual site) will be shipped to the super-regional sites as soon as they have been determined. The individual championships site will receive 48 cases of Wilson balls. The team championships site will receive 16 cases of Wilson balls. During championships competition, balls shall be changed at the start of each set. Each participating institution must provide its own practice balls.

Section 1.5 Rules

[Reference: Bylaw 31.1.6 in the NCAA Manual.]

The United States Tennis Association and Intercollegiate Tennis Association rules will be followed, unless superseded by modifications adopted by the NCAA Men's and Women's Tennis Rules Subcommittee. The following modifications have been adopted by the committee:

 Changes in the lineup for reasons other than injury or illness should be requested 30 minutes before the scheduled start of the match to the chair of the games committee. The games committee has the right to review and, if necessary, overrule a coach's decision regarding a lineup change based on the ability of the players and the matches during the last half of the season.

The ITA carry-over rule will be in effect for the entire championships period (both team and individual). Penalties may be carried over to the institution's next match. The ITA carry-over rule will commence with the first- and second-round tournaments. Penalties may be carried over from first- and second-round sites to the institution's or individual's next match, even if the next match is at a super-regional site or at the finals site.

- 2. The committee confirmed that if a postmatch code violation given after a match in the team competition cannot be applied during the team match, then the following applies:
 - Any postmatch code is carried over to the offending student-athlete's next opportunity during that championship.
 - If the offending student-athlete has completed play in the championships, any postmatch code will be assessed at the first opportunity to the offending student-athlete's teammate(s) playing/continuing in the championships.
 - The assessment will be applied immediately (per ITA Rules).
- 3. The committee confirmed that the following applies during the singles or doubles championships:
 - Any postmatch code is carried over to the offending student-athlete's next opportunity during that championship.
 - If the offending student-athlete has completed play in the championships, any postmatch code will be assessed at the first opportunity to the offending student-athlete's teammate(s) who is also in the singles/doubles draw.
 - The assessment will be applied immediately (per ITA Rules).

The use of tobacco by student-athletes, or team or game personnel (e.g., coaches, athletic trainers, managers and game officials), is prohibited during competition. Any student-athlete, or team or game personnel, who uses tobacco during competition shall be disqualified for the remainder of that competition.

Section 1.6 Uniforms

[Reference: Bylaw 12.5.4 in the NCAA Manual.]

All competitors should wear exclusively the official uniform of their institution during competition, warmup for competition, interviews and the awards ceremonies. All players on each team are expected to wear the same team uniform at the start of the match. Apparel bearing professional sports team logos cannot be worn.

Section 2 • Determination of Championship Participation

Section 2.1 Championships Format

The men's and women's championships shall consist of team and individual championships. The tournaments shall be conducted according to the format approved by the NCAA Division I Men's and Women's Tennis Committee. All matches shall be played outdoors, weather permitting. At all times, the referee, or a designated replacement, in consultation with the games committee, shall determine which matches shall be played indoors.

MEN'S AND WOMEN'S TEAM CHAMPIONSHIPS

Bracket. The Division I Men's and Women's Tennis Championships are conducted as 64-team, single-elimination tournaments.

First- and Second-Round Dates. First- and second-round competition will be conducted at a minimum of 16 sites with four teams per gender at each site, adhering to the following schedule:

Institutions interested in hosting the men's and women's competition simultaneously must conduct the competition Friday-Saturday, May 1-2.

The NCAA will not reimburse expenses for teams competing in first- and second-round competition.

Incomplete Match Policy. In the event a site is unable to complete competition by the designated time, the following procedure shall be in place:

Second Round. If no indoor backup is available at the site and inclement weather or other unforeseen circumstances have made it impossible to complete the second-round match Sunday, second-round play must start by 9 a.m. local time Monday. The host must do everything possible, including moving to an alternate site, to complete the match. If the match still cannot be completed Monday, the Division I Men's and Women's Tennis Committee is authorized to advance the higher seeded team to the super regional after reviewing all actions attempted by the host to complete the match.

Super Regional. If no indoor backup is available at the site and inclement weather or other unforeseen circumstances have made it impossible to complete the super-regional match Saturday, super-regional play must start by 9 a.m. local time Sunday. The host must do everything possible, including moving to an alternate site, to complete the match. If the match still cannot be completed Sunday, the Division I Men's and Women's Tennis Committee is authorized to advance the higher seeded team to the final site after reviewing all actions attempted by the host to complete the match.

Finals site schedule. Super-regional round winners advance to the finals site at the University of Georgia in Athens, Georgia, adhering to the following schedule.

INDIVIDUAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

Brackets. The Division I men's and women's tennis singles and doubles championships brackets consist of 64 singles players and 32 doubles teams per gender participating in the single-elimination tournaments. In the event one or more of these selections declines an invitation, an alternate(s) will be selected from the alternate list.

Singles and Doubles Championships Dates. Competition for the men's and women's singles and doubles championships will take place Nov. 18-23 at the USTA National Campus in Orlando, Florida.

Parameters for the Singles and Doubles Draws. The following parameters have been established for the singles and doubles championships draws:

- Seed No. 1 is placed on the top line of the bracket.
- 2. Seed No. 2 is placed on the bottom line of the bracket.
- 3. Seed Nos. 3 and 4 are randomly drawn to determine placement in the top half or the bottom half of the bracket (and cannot be in the same half of a No. 1 or No. 2 teammate).
- 4. Seed Nos. 5, 6, 7 and 8 are randomly drawn (i.e., No. 1 seed could play the No. 5, 6, 7 or 8 seed in the quarterfinals).
- 5. Conference opponents do not play each other in the first round.
- 6. Two teammates separated into opposite halves of the bracket.
- Three or four teammates the top two teammates (via seeding or ITA rankings) are separated into opposite halves, the other two placed in the remaining quarters randomly.
- 8. Five or more teammates see item "6" above with the remaining teammate(s) placed as far away from their teammates as possible in a quadrant.

Qualification Events for the Individual Championships. Individuals have the opportunity to qualify for the singles and doubles championships via approved qualifying pathway events. Each qualifying pathway event will qualify a specified number of players per gender for the singles and doubles fields, as outlined below. Please see page 25 (Selection Procedures) of this manual for details on the qualifiers for each pathway event.

Qualifying Pathway Event Notes.

- Any singles player or doubles team that already qualified via the ITA All-American Championships or ITA Regional Championshpis are not eligible to particiate in the ITA Sectional Championships in that discipline.
- Doubles players who have qualified in the NCAA doubles championships via the ITA All-American Championships or ITA Regional Championships must forfeit any previously earned doubles qualification in order to play doubles with a different partner at the ITA Sectional Championships.
- The ITA Sectional Championships will conclude after the guarterfinals and the guarterfinal playoff for the for singles, and after the semifinals and the third-place playoff for doubles.

The draw for the singles and doubles championships will be announced on ncaa.com by 6 p.m. Eastern time, Saturday, Nov. 15.

ANNUAL FORMS

Results Reporting. Any institution interested in entering a team or individuals in the championships must submit results online at **wearecollegetennis.com** from all dual matches and collegiate tournaments in which they have competed. Results will only be accepted online. In a September mailing to all head coaches, the Intercollegiate Tennis Association distributed instructions on how to access and report your team and individual scores. For questions regarding this process, please contact Cody Johnson (phone: 602-687-6382; email: **cody.johnson@itatennis.com**) at the ITA.

To be considered for selection, coaches must submit results online by 10 p.m. local time on Mondays and, for team competition, Sunday, April 26, at 10 p.m. local time.

Failure to follow these reporting procedures will jeopardize an institution's eligibility for championships selection.

Lineup Procedures. The tennis committee requires online submission of lineup forms for the championships. The online lineup forms must be accessed via the NCAA Single-Source Sign-on system. Each user must have an individual account created by their school's single-source sign-on administrator to access the site. The SSO administrator also must assign the "Tennis Lineup" application to the user before the lineup form can be completed.

Once access to SSO has been established and privileges to the lineup application have been granted, users can log on by going to **ncaa.org** and clicking on the **My Apps** link in the Membership drop-down menu. Clicking on the "Tennis Lineup" link will open the application.

All automatic-qualifying teams and any team desiring consideration for at-large selection to the championships are required to submit the official online NCAA lineup form to the NCAA not later than 5 p.m. Eastern time Sunday, April 26. Any lineup form received after 5 p.m. Eastern time is subject to a fine of up to \$500 as determined by the tennis committee. The tennis committee may entertain appeals to the established lineup submission deadlines to review extenuating circumstances.

After the initial lineup submission, coaches will have the opportunity to make adjustments to their lineups for each subsequent weekend of competition in accordance with ITA rules. Unchanged lineups will carry forward from round to round and will remain subject to being challenged. See Challenge Procedures section of this manual for a detailed timeline.

The lineup form includes space to list a maximum of 15 team members who must be physically able and eligible to play. As such:

- When a coach lists their 15 student-athletes, the coach is confirming that all 15 student-athletes may have the
 opportunity to play in the NCAA championships.
- All 15 student-athletes may travel to the championships events.
- All 15 must be physically able and eligible to play. Student-athletes injured to the point of not being able to play (e.g., broken bones), who have been declared redshirts or who are ineligible for NCAA, conference or institutional reasons cannot be listed on the lineup form.
- Only nine of these 15 student-athletes may play in the first and second rounds of competition. These nine are designated at the administrative meeting the day before the start of competition.
- For first- and second-round competition, institutions are not reimbursed by the NCAA for any expenses.
- Teams that win second-round matches and advance to the super-regional sites will designate, at the administrative meeting the day before the start of the super regionals, nine student-athletes who will play in the super regionals. These nine student-athletes can be different from the nine who played in the first and second rounds, as long as they were on the original list of 15 student-athletes on the team's lineup form.
- Teams that win super-regional matches and advance to the championships site will designate, at the administrative meeting the day before the start of finals site competition, nine student-athletes who will play in the championships. These nine student-athletes can be different from the nine who played in the super regionals, as long as they were on the original list of 15 student-athletes on the team's lineup form.
- The NCAA will reimburse each institution advancing to the super regionals and the championships site for a
 maximum of nine student-athletes (and a total travel party of 13 individuals). The institution bears the cost if
 it decides to take any additional members of the original 15 members listed on the lineup form to the superregional and championships sites.

Consistent with ITA rules, coaches must list student-athletes in order of singles-play strength, including any doubles specialists, on the lineup form. The lineup that is presented to the referee at the administrative meeting before the start of competition must consist of only nine players total (including doubles specialists).

The committee has established a fine of \$500 that may be assessed for failure of an institution to submit its lineup 30 minutes before the start of a dual match and/or for improperly submitting lineup changes that occur within the two minutes between doubles and singles competition.

Expense Reimbursement Form. Expense reimbursement for participation in the super regionals and at the finals site will be filed through an online system. The Travel Expense System can be found online at Travel.ncaa.org. All competing institutions must request reimbursement through the online system in order to receive the appropriate reimbursement.

Countable Contest Attestation. At its January 2025 meeting, the Division I Sports Oversight Committee supported establishing a penalty at selections for exceeding the legislated countable contest limit (25 dates of competition). As a result, the Division I Tennis Committee implemented a required attestation for each head coach to confirm that they did not exceed the countable contest limit by the start of their conference tournament (or last regular-season match for teams without a conference tournament).

ALL institutions, regardless of conference standing, must submit the online attestation via the link (to be emailed to all head coaches) by Wednesday, April 22. Failure to complete the attestation will result in a \$500 fine.

An institution found to be inviolation of exceeding the countable contest limit will face the following penalties: Removal of the highest ITA-ranked win per match exceeding the limit and replacing with its next best ranked win (for selection purposes only, not for seeding purposes); assessment of a \$2,500 fine per match exceeding the limit; suspension of the head coach for the first two rounds; and removal of the opportunity to host the first two rounds if seeding earned that opportunity. There will be additional penalties for repeat offenders.

CERTIFICATION OF ELIGIBILITY/AVAILABILITY

[Reference: Certification of Eligibility/Availability in the Division I General Section and Bylaws 12.10.1 and 31.2.1.7 in the NCAA Manual.]

Only student-athletes eligible under Bylaws 12, 13, 14, 15 and 16 may compete in NCAA championships. In accordance with Bylaw 12.10.1, member institutions are required to certify the eligibility of their student-athletes before each academic year and to withhold ineligible student-athletes from all intercollegiate competition. Member institutions are reminded to notify the NCAA national office before the selection date for each championship of any student-athlete who may have participated in regular-season competition but subsequently is determined to be ineligible or unavailable for NCAA championship competition. [For the Division I men's championships, institutions must notify Kelsi Mahoney (phone: 317-917-6455; email: kmahoney@ncaa.org); for the Division I women's championships, institutions must notify Paige Newman (phone: 317-917-6660; email: pnewman@ncaa.org) before April 26.]

TRAVEL PARTY/SQUAD SIZE

Squad Size. The official squad size for the team championship shall be nine players. Transportation reimbursement and per diem will be provided for only nine student-athletes for teams advancing to the super regionals and the finals site. For first- and second-round play, institutions are responsible for their own expenses.

For the team tournament, wristbands/credentials will be provided for the noncompeting rostered student-athletes to provide access to the court and team areas during their team's matches. These individuals must follow all bench decorum policies and adhere to the directions of the head referee.

Travel Party. For the team portion of the 2026 tennis championships, the NCAA will reimburse for four nonathletes, bringing the official travel party total to 13 individuals (nine student-athletes and four nonathletes) who will be reimbursed by the NCAA for advancing to the super regionals and the finals site.

DIVISION I MEN'S AND WOMEN'S TENNIS

The official travel party for institutions with individuals qualifying for the singles and doubles championships is determined as follows:

1-3 student-athletes selected	1 non-student-athlete included in travel party
4-6 student-athletes selected	2 non-student-athletes included in travel party
7-9 student-athletes selected	3 non-student-athletes included in travel party
10 or more student-athletes selected	5 non-student-athletes included in travel party

Section 2.2 Scoring

Singles and Doubles Championships. All matches shall be the best-of-three sets. No-ad scoring and a seven-point tiebreaker (first to seven points, must win by two points) at six-games-all will be used for all matches. In doubles, a 10-point match tiebreaker will be played in lieu of a third set.

Team Championships. The matches shall be regulation dual matches. Three doubles matches consisting of six-game sets will be played for one team point, followed by six singles matches, each valued at one team point; played the best of three sets. No-ad scoring will be used and a seven-point tiebreaker (first to seven points, must win by two points) will be played at six-games-all. The team winning four or more team points advances in the championship bracket.

During the championships, all matches will be stopped after the doubles point is decided. All remaining individual matches will be stopped once a team winner (four points won) has been determined. The score will only reflect completed matches.

CHALLENGE PROCEDURES

Men's and Women's Team Championships. The challenge process is part of the Tennis Lineup application. Anyone wishing to challenge a lineup must access the system and submit the challenge by the prescribed deadline. Submitted challenges will be visible to the coach of the challenged team, NCAA staff and the Division I Tennis Committee. The coach of the challenged team will need to provide their written response within the lineup system, in the rebuttal section. This response will be visible to the challenging coach, NCAA staff and the tennis committee.

Additionally, the tennis committee expanded the lineup challenge opportunity to each weekend of competition. A detailed schedule the lineup challenge process is listed below. All times are Eastern time.

Fines. Failure to follow the results reporting or lineup form submission procedures could jeopardize a team or individual's eligibility for championships selection. Institutions failing to adhere to the procedures outlined above for the submission of regular-season results and lineup forms will be assessed a financial penalty. An institution assessed such a financial penalty must make payment to the national office before the institution's team or individual(s) will be allowed to compete.

The tennis committee will implement a \$500 fine in accordance with Bylaw 31.1.11 (failure to adhere to policies and procedures) for any institution that has its lineup challenged and overturned by the committee.

DRAWS

In the team championships, the teams will be seeded and placed in the bracket as indicated in Appendix A and Appendix B. The team draws will be announced on ncaa.com Monday, April 27, by 5 p.m. Eastern time.

The draws for the singles and doubles championships will be announced on ncaa.com by 6 p.m. Eastern time, Saturday, Nov. 15.

SEEDING/PAIRINGS

Singles/Doubles Seeding. The tennis committee seeds individuals using the selection criteria. The selection criteria include a review of individual results obtained beginning Sept. 7, 2025 (or the first day of classes, whichever is earliest) through Nov. 9, 2025.

The tennis committee will seed the top eight singles players in order and place the next eight alphabetically. For the doubles championship, the tennis committee will seed the top four teams in order, based on the selection criteria, and place the next four teams alphabetically by institution. The seeding for the singles and doubles championships will be announced at 4 p.m. Eastern time, Monday, Nov. 10, along with the announcement of the entire field.

Team Seeding. The tennis committee will seed teams using the selection criteria. The selection criteria include a review of team results obtained beginning Jan. 1 through April 26, 2026.

The tennis committee will seed teams 1-16 in order and place the remaining 48 teams into the bracket creating the fewest number of flights. Teams from the same conference shall not meet in the first and second rounds.

LODGING INFORMATION

Preliminary Rounds. Information regarding the championships shall be sent by the host institution to the visiting teams immediately after the announcement of the sites. All reservations and arrangements, however, must be made by the participating institutions. Hotels secured for teams must be within 30-45 minutes of the competition site, with a preference for 30 minutes. Participating institutions are responsible for the rooms reserved by the NCAA and host institutions. Participating institutions are expected to stay at the hotel assigned by the host and are responsible for confirming with the hotel the number of rooms they will require and the rooming lists before the first day of practice. If an institution prefers to stay at another hotel, the institution must use the allotted rooms for persons accompanying the official travel party or will be required to pay for one night of the allotted rooms. The participating institution is expected to pay the penalty to the impacted hotel before departing from the locale.

Finals Site (Team). The eight men's and eight women's teams advancing to the finals site will be assigned lodging by the tennis committee. Institutions are obligated to stay at the assigned property. Institutions failing to stay at their assigned hotels are financially responsible to the assigned hotel. If an institution prefers to stay in another hotel, the institution must (1) obtain a release of the rooms in writing from the hotel's general manager or (2) use the rooms for persons accompanying the official travel party. Institutions failing to stay at their assigned hotels are financially responsible to the assigned facility for a minimum of three nights.

Finals Site (Individuals). Participants are not required to stay at the contracted hotels. Contracted hotels will be available for reservations on a first-come, first-served basis.

Section 2.4 Selection Criteria

Reference: Bylaws 31.01.2, 31.01.3 and 31.3 in the NCAA Manual.]

Bylaw 31.3.3.1 - Countable Competition. For NCAA team-championship selection purposes, competition is countable only when the teams are varsity intercollegiate teams of four-year, degree-granting institutions that conduct a majority of their competition in that team sport against varsity intercollegiate teams (see Bylaw 20.2.4.7) of United States four-year, degree-granting institutions. Competition against service teams, professional teams, semiprofessional teams, amateur teams, two-year colleges and club teams shall be excluded.

Once a conference tournament begins, any matches played outside of the tournament by a member of that conference shall no longer be counted for purposes of selection to the NCAA Division I Men's or Women's Tennis Championships. Results from such matches will not be included in a team's ITA rankings or other selection criteria.

Selection Criteria. The following criteria shall be employed by a governing sports committee in selecting participants for NCAA championships competition [Bylaw 31.3.3; criteria for selection of participants]:

- Won-lost record.
- Strength of schedule.
- Eligibility and availability of student-athletes for NCAA championships.

In addition to Bylaw 31.3.3, the tennis committee has received approval from the NCAA Division I Sports Oversight Committee to consider the following criteria in the selection of at-large teams for the men's and women's tennis championships (not necessarily in priority order):

Primary Criteria

- Head-to-head competition.
- Results versus common opponents.
- Strength of schedule.
- Wins versus teams (or individuals) already selected at time of consideration.

Tiebreaking Procedures

If the evaluation of the primary criteria does not result in a decision, the tiebreaking procedures will be reviewed. The following criteria listed will be evaluated in priority order:

- Head-to-head competition.
- Strength of schedule.

Primary Criteria Defined

Head-to-head competition.

This is a one-on-one direct comparison between two teams (or individuals). The tennis committee will award a maximum of two points for defeating the same opponent one or more times.

Results versus common opponents.

This is a comparison of the results between two teams against common opponents. The team with the better winning percentage against common opponents will win the category with a maximum of one point awarded.

Strength of schedule.

The Division I Sports Oversight Committee has approved the following strength-of-schedule definition for Division I tennis: The ITA rankings will be used to represent a combination of four categories (won-lost record or percentage, strength of schedule, significant wins and significant losses). Higher-ranked teams (or individuals) will be awarded a specific number of points based on their percentage difference (using the rankings' average point-per-match formula) over the team (or individuals) they are being compared with in the selection and seeding process. Points will be awarded on the following scale:

1 point - If higher-ranked team's (or individual's) average is 1-10% greater than the lower-ranked team's (or individual's) average.

2 points - If higher-ranked team's (or individual's) average is greater than 10% and less or equal to 20% than the lower-ranked team's (or individual's) average.

3 points - If higher-ranked team's (or individual's) average is greater than 20% greater than the lowerranked team's (or individual's) average.

Wins versus teams (or individuals) already selected at time of consideration.

A one-point margin is sufficient to win the category. The tennis committee will award one point for each win over the same opponent.

Wins versus the top 50 teams in the ITA rankings.

Wins versus the top 60 singles players in the ITA rankings for eligible/entered singles players.

Wins versus the top 30 doubles teams in the ITA rankings for entered/eligible doubles teams.

NOTE: The same criteria will be used for seeding, when seeding the top 16 teams, top 16 singles players and top eight doubles teams.

Teams must have at least a .500 record versus Division I institutions to be considered for an at-large berth.

SELECTION PROCEDURES

Teams or individuals from an institution that has failed to adhere to the lineup and results reporting procedures outlined in this manual may not be considered for selection to the championships.

Team Championship. Twenty-seven conference champions for men and 30 conference champions for women will receive automatic qualification into the team championships. In the event that one or more teams decline an invitation. an alternate team(s) will be selected. Refer to Appendix A and Appendix B for the team championships brackets. The tennis committee will convene April 26-27 to select the at-large teams and seed and pair teams into the championships. The tennis committee compares team versus team using the selection criteria to make the selections and seeds. The data used during selections are provided through the institutional results-reporting process (see Results Reporting).

Singles and Doubles Championships. Individuals have the opportunity to qualify for the singles and doubles championships via several qualifying pathway events conducted by the ITA in the fall. The qualifying pathway events, including the number of players advancing into the singles and doubles championships for each event, are as follows:

- ITA All-American Championships 10 singles players (eight main draw quarterfinalists and two feed-in consolation finalists) and four doubles teams (four main draw semifinalists).
- ITA Regional Championships each of the 13 regions will advance two singles players (two finalists) and one doubles team (winner).
- ITA Conference Masters Championships each Division I conference eligible for team automatic qualification will have the opportunity to have its singles and doubles conference tournament winners, or, if no conference tournament is conducted, nominate one singles player and one doubles team, to participate. The ITA Conference Masters field size will mirror the number of eligible AQ conferences each year. The four singles semifinalists, plus three doubles teams (two finalists plus the third/fourth playoff winner), will qualify for the singles and doubles championships.
- ITA Sectional Championships each of the four sectionals will advance six singles players (the four singles semifinalists plus the two winners of the quarterfinal playoffs), and three doubles teams (the two doubles finalists plus the plus the third/fourth playoff winner).

For the doubles championship, a student-athlete can participate with only one partner. An institution with a studentathlete who qualifies on a doubles team with two or more partners must declare which qualified team will play in the doubles championship by 11:59 p.m. Eastern time, Sunday, Nov. 9. The nondeclared doubles team would have the ability to be selected in the doubles draw with the other partner via the alternate list only if the declared doubles team withdraws. The alternate list seeding will be followed for any withdrawing team. Failure to declare by the deadline will result in a \$500 fine and may jeopardize the team's participation in the championship.

Singles and Doubles Alternates. Alternates for the singles and doubles championships are determined as follows:

Singles. All singles players who have reached, but did not advance from, the qualifying round at any qualifying pathway event are automatically added to the alternate list. Singles players will be removed from the alternate list if they advance from the qualifying round at a later qualifying event.

Doubles. All doubles teams that have reached, but did not advance from, the qualifying round at any qualifying pathway event are automatically added to the alternate list. Doubles teams will be removed from the alternate list if they advance from the qualifying round at a later qualifying event.

Singles and Doubles. The alternate list will be ordered by the selection criteria (see Section 2-4). No prioritization will be assigned to any qualifying pathway event. Should a singles player or doubles team that has already qualified to the NCAA championships via the ITA All-American Championships also advance to one of the qualifying spots for their specific ITA Regional, the third/fourth place singles match winner or the doubles team runner-up would move into the respective qualifying spot. Each ITA Regional will advance two singles players and a doubles team into the NCAA championships. After the ITA Regionals complete, should a singles player or doubles team that qualified via the ITA Regional pathway withdraw from the NCAA championships, the committee will fill the spot from the alternate list, which has no prioritization for any qualifying pathway event.

In case of injury, illness or extenuating circumstances before the opening round, alternates selected by the tennis committee shall be substituted in numbered order if available until the warmup of the last match of the first round starts. The substitution of alternates will be dictated by the maximum field size. If a student-athlete withdraws immediately before the start of the championships and the next alternate on the list is not on site, the tennis committee may select a player(s) from those available at the championships site in order to fill the bracket. Alternates must confirm attendance at the championships by 5 p.m. Eastern time, Tuesday, Nov. 11.

Section 2.5 Site Selection

PRELIMINARY-ROUND SITE SELECTIONS (TEAM CHAMPIONSHIPS)

With the adoption of Bylaw 31.1.3.2.5, each sports committee will comply with the bylaw to the greatest extent possible and in doing so, the following policies will be implemented.

- For non-revenue generating championships that seed a quarter of the bracket, sites will be awarded to the seeded teams that submit a bid that meets the requirements for hosting. In the event that a seeded team does not submit a bid that meets the requirements, the sports committee will maintain the current policy of geographic consideration when assigning the host sites. The committee will use the geographic consideration to help maintain the balance of integrity of the selection.
- The committee also will separate first- and second-round conference opponents when assigning teams to sites.

Each institution interested in hosting first- and second-round and/or super-regional competition, regardless of potential seed, must complete and submit an online facility evaluation and contacts information not later than Friday, April 17. Instructions on how to access and submit the form will be distributed via the monthly championships newsletter. Only institutions that complete and submit the facility evaluation and contacts information will be considered for first- and second-round and/or super-regional host opportunities, including the top-seeded teams.

It is not necessary to complete a proposed budget form for preliminary-round competition; however, hosts will be asked to submit their actual receipts and expenditures via the online budget form for informational purposes after the conclusion of the event. Each first- and second-round host will receive a \$6,400 stipend if it hosts men's or women's competition, and a \$11,700 stipend if it hosts both the men's and women's tournaments. Each super regional host will receive a \$1,000 stipend if it hosts men's or women's competition, and a \$2,000 stipend if it hosts both the men's and women's tournaments. Stipends will not be paid until the actuals have been submitted.

The tennis committee has adopted the following requirements for preliminary-round host sites:

- Minimum of six hard-surface, quality courts of similar speed and surface with umpires' chairs.
- Adequate number of practice courts of same or similar surface to the competition courts near the competition site.
- Availability of backup indoor site. Potential hosts may submit a waiver request to the committee if indoor courts are not available.
- Appropriate seating for estimated attendance.
- Minimum of six ITA-certified umpires plus one head referee.
- Adequate training facilities and medical personnel on-site at all times.
- Tournament director (other than the institution's head coach) and appropriate game management personnel.
- Two squeegees and two blowers available at each competition court.
- Hotels (27 rooms for single-gender sites and 54 rooms for dual-gender sites for first and second rounds; nine rooms for single-gender sites and 18 rooms for dual-gender sites for super regionals) secured 30-45 minutes from the competition site, with a strong preference for 30 minutes.
- Hosts must provide a letter of agreement between the host and the team hotel(s) to the championships bid portal stating that rooms are being held. Failure to provide the letter of agreement may jeopardize your selection as a host. Failure to secure the minimum number of rooms for visiting team(s) may result in a \$500 fine and could jeopardize a school's selection as a future host.

DIVISION I MEN'S AND WOMEN'S TENNIS

In an effort to enhance the student-athlete experience at the preliminary rounds of competition, the tennis committee has implemented the following additional requirements for hosting:

- Hosts shall provide a players' lounge area with refreshments.
- Hosts shall ensure that Event 1 merchandise is displayed appropriately.
- Hosts shall ensure NCAA signage is displayed properly.

Any institution or conference interested in hosting a preliminary round of the 2026 tennis championships must submit a facility evaluation form, contacts information, host scheduling questionnaire, and hotel information and agreements to be considered to host.

SAFETY AND SECURITY PLAN

Based on a review of current and future championships competition venues, discussions with safety and security experts, and their own expertise and knowledge, the NCAA has established a Safety and Security Advisory Group to develop a compilation of Best Practices for NCAA championships, which may be accessed here. We urge each competition venue to take these Best Practices into account when developing its safety and security program.




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
Appendix A • Women's Team Bracket




Appendix B • Men's Team Bracket



Appendix C • Women's Singles Bracket




Appendix D • Men's Singles Bracket


