

REPORT OF THE NCAA DIVISION I COUNCIL JUNE 25-26, 2024, MEETING

In an effort to connect NCAA Division I Council items to the NCAA pillars of academics, fairness and well-being, items included in this report have an identifying pillar. There is an additional pillar, operational, that is used to denote items that relate to maintaining a stable and efficient Division I.

KEY ITEMS.

- 1. Legislative Actions. (Academics/Fairness/Well-Being/Operational) The NCAA Division I Council took the following key legislative actions, effective on the dates specified. These actions are detailed in Attachment A and voting results are available in Attachment B.
 - a. NCAA Division I Proposal No. 2024-44 Recruiting Notification of Transfer Postgraduate Student-Athletes October 1. The council <u>adopted</u> Proposal No. 2024-44 as emergency legislation, effective immediately, to move the initial date to enter the NCAA Transfer Portal, from August 1 to October 1, for a student-athlete seeking to enroll as a postgraduate student at another institution following the next academic term or academic year.
 - b. Proposal No. 2024-38 - Recruiting - Recruiting Model - Football. The council adopted Proposal No. 2024-38 as expedited legislation to amend the Football Bowl Subdivision and NCAA Football Championship Subdivision recruiting models to accommodate the first opportunity to sign a National Letter of Intent. Changes to recruiting opportunities legislation correspond with recent changes to football recruiting calendars approved by the NCAA Division I Football Bowl Subdivision Oversight Committee and the Football Championship Subdivision Oversight Committee. The changes are also necessary to accommodate the first opportunity to sign a National Letter of Intent in June at the conclusion of the individual's junior year in high school. Allowing recruiting opportunities during the spring contact period at the educational institution and any other location provides more flexible opportunities for prospective student-athletes, their family members and offcampus recruiters to evaluate academic and athletic preparedness. Similarly, an increase to 168 recruiting person days during the spring contact period allows offcampus recruiters additional opportunities to engage in off-campus recruiting opportunities with prospective student-athletes before the June signing period. The proposal is effective August 1, 2024.
 - c. Proposal No. 2024-41 Division I Membership Multisport Conference Sports Sponsorship Minimums Men's Sports. The council adopted Proposal No. 2024-41 as expedited legislation to specify that men's individual sports for which a conference determines a conference champion may be used satisfy sports sponsorship criteria for a multisport conference. The previous multisport conference sports sponsorship standards were adopted in January 2011 and required conferences to have a minimum of 12 sports with at least six men's sports, including men's basketball. In addition to basketball, a conference was required to sponsor football or two other men's team sports. A minimum of seven members

were required to sponsor basketball and a minimum of six members were required to sponsor five other sports, including football or two additional men's teams sports. The five men's team sports, other than basketball and football, have varying levels of interest across the United States and in some regions, sport sponsorship may be declining. Further, ice hockey and lacrosse have been sponsored by numerous single-sport conferences reducing opportunities for multisport conferences to sponsor them. By eliminating the requirement to sponsor the additional two men's team sports, conferences will have greater flexibility to meet the 12-sport requirement. Further, this proposal will give conferences greater flexibility to add a conference member if an institution were to leave the conference, without the burden of asking schools to add sports. The proposal is effective August 1, 2024.

- d. Proposal No. 2024-42 Governance Structure and Committees Men's Basketball Committee Composition. The council adopted Proposal No. 2024-42 as expedited legislation to specify that the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee shall consist of 12 members, including one member from each of the conferences named in NCAA Bylaw 9.2.2.1.1 that is eligible for automatic qualification, four members selected from the seven highest ranked other conferences based on basketball success and the remaining members from the remaining conferences. The proposal is effective immediately.
- e. Proposal No. 2024-43 Governance Structure and Committees Women's Basketball Committee Composition. The council adopted Proposal No. 2024-43 as expedited legislation to specify that the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee shall consist of 12 members, including one member from each of the conferences named in Bylaw 9.2.2.1.1 that is eligible for automatic qualification, four members selected from the seven highest ranked other conferences based on basketball success and the remaining members from the remaining conferences. The proposal is effective immediately.
- f. Proposal No. 2024-6 Athletics Personnel and Recruiting Limitations on the Number of Coaches and Off-Campus Recruiters Football. The NCAA Division I Football Oversight Committees <u>adopted</u>, and the council took no action on Proposal No. 2024-6, which is now considered adopted and final. The proposal permits any institutional staff member to provide technical and tactical instruction to football student-athletes and is effective immediately. The proposal does not amend the limit on the number of off-campus recruiters and does not allow an institution to hire football staff members for the sole purpose of recruiting prospective student-athletes off campus or allow an institution to hire individuals outside of the athletics department to provide coaching instruction to student-athletes.
- g. Proposal No. 2024-33 Infractions Program Penalties Exemplary Cooperation. The council adopted Proposal No. 2024-33, which clarifies the

application of exemplary cooperation throughout the resolution of an infractions case, as specified, and eliminates use of the postseason competition penalty in cases in which exemplary cooperation is demonstrated, except in the limited circumstance in which a party is a repeat violator. The proposal is effective August 1, 2024.

- 2. Introduction of Legislation to Modify the Duration of Transfer Windows from 45 Days to 30 Days. (Fairness/Operational) At the recommendation of the NCAA Division I Basketball and Football Oversight Committees, the council introduced legislation into the October 2024 legislative cycle to reduce, from 45 days to 30 days, the duration of notification of transfer windows in basketball and football. Between June and October, the football oversight committees will discuss the timing and format of sport-specific 30-day windows. For basketball, the proposal would result in a 30-day transfer window beginning the day after the end of the second round of the applicable NCAA Division I basketball championship. The NCAA Division I Student-Athlete Experience Committee will continue to review the proposal and consider feedback from the NCAA Division I Student-Athlete Advisory Committee prior to considering or recommending an amendment to modify the transfer windows for all other sports. The proposal would be effective immediately.
- 3. Introduction of Legislation to Establish a National Collegiate Championship in Women's Wrestling and NCAA Women's Wrestling Committee. (Well-Being/Operational) At the recommendation of the NCAA Division I Strategic Vision and Planning Committee, the council introduced legislation into the January 2025 legislative cycle to establish a national collegiate championship in women's wrestling and establish the NCAA Women's Wrestling Committee.
- 4. Comprehensive Student-Athlete Eligibility Legislation Review. (Academics/Fairness/ Well-Being/Operational) The council authorized a comprehensive review of the eligibility-impacting rules for student-athletes to align them with the changing environment and the needs of today's student-athletes. While the review is underway, in addition, the council authorized NCAA staff to apply reasonable discretion when reviewing eligibility cases and interpretation requests, considering mitigating factors and the intent of the legislation. Recommendations for rule changes will be presented to the council over the course of the review with completion anticipated in October 2025.

ACTION ITEMS.

INFORMATIONAL ITEMS.

1. Other Expedited Legislation. (Fairness/Well-Being/Operational) The council <u>adopted</u> the following proposals as expedited legislation. These actions are detailed in Attachment A and voting results are available in Attachment B.

- a. Proposal No. 2024-39 Division I Membership Minimum Participants Requirements for Sport Sponsorship Golf. The proposal, which is effective August 1, 2024, reduces, from five to four, the minimum number of participants needed to satisfy sports-sponsorship requirements in men's and women's golf.
- b. Proposal No. 2024-40 Division I Membership Minimum Contests Requirements for Sport Sponsorship Men's Gymnastics. The proposal, which is effective August 1, 2024, reduces, from nine to eight, the minimum number of contests required to satisfy sports-sponsorship requirements in men's gymnastics.
- 2. Update from NCAA President Charlie Baker. (Fairness/Well-Being) The council received an update from President Baker on issues relating to the proposed settlement of legal cases, the state of congressional engagement and continued success in building an NCAA fan database that will increase exposure for student-athletes and enable more robust marketing and promotional efforts tailored to fans' individual preferences.
- 3. Update and Discussion of National Division I and Association-Wide Issues. (Academics/Fairness/Well-Being/Operational) The council received an update on issues related to the proposed settlement of legal cases, including a discussion of the proposed injunction, timeline and opportunities to organize the decision-making structure and establish priorities. After receiving the update, the council engaged in a wide-ranging discussion about the future of Division I and the governance structure. Additional council meetings will be scheduled for the purpose of providing updates and opportunities for discussion on the ongoing issues.
- 4. Review of Sports Wagering Legislation. (Well-Being/Operational) The council continued its review and discussion of potential changes to the sports wagering legislation and whether the legislation should be changed to permit student-athletes or institutional staff to wager on professional sports. The council will continue its discussion and potentially consider a legislative recommendation during its October meeting.
- 5. NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Performance Fund Update. (Fairness/Well-Being/Operational) The council received an update on the process for the membership to consider the addition of a Women's Basketball Performance Fund as an element of revenue distribution. The update included recent feedback shared from a membership survey on the target fund value and distributions. In August, the NCAA Division I Board of Directors Finance Committee is expected to approve the performance fund and the NCAA Division I Board of Directors is expected to sponsor a proposal for membership consideration during the NCAA Convention in January.
- 6. NCAA Division I Board of Directors Infractions Process Committee Review of the Vacation of Records Penalty. (Fairness/Operational) The council received an update on the Infractions Process Committee's review of the vacation of records penalty in the infractions program and discussed its continued application. The council agrees that the

vacation of records penalty remains a meaningful penalty and supports the NCAA Division I Committee on Infractions' recent action to distinguish between institutional and individual records in certain circumstances. The council also agrees that application of the penalty should depend on the specific circumstances of each case.

- 7. NCAA Office of Inclusion, Education and Community Engagement. (Fairness/Well-Being/Operational) The council received an update on the work of the NCAA Committee on Women's Athletics and a recommendation from the Strategic Vision and Planning Committee to introduce a proposal into the January 2025 legislative cycle to establish a national collegiate championship in women's wrestling and establish the NCAA Women's Wrestling Committee. The council also received an update on emerging sports for women and women's flag football and the review of Association-wide diversity, equity and inclusion committees.
- **8.** Name, Image and Likeness Technology Update. (Fairness/Well-Being/Operational) The council received an update on the development of the name, image and likeness database and related technology which will be online August 1.
- 9. Reports from Council Committees. The council received reports from its standing committees that included action and informational items. Roll-call vote results of legislative actions are available in Attachment B.
 - a. NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Oversight Committee.
 - Legislation Introduced into the October 2024 Legislative Cycle. (Well-Being/Operational) The NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Oversight Committee introduced legislation into the October 2024 pilot legislative process to specify that an institution shall not play its first regular-season contest (game or scrimmage) with outside competition prior to the Wednesday of the 22nd week prior to the Division I Men's Basketball Championship game. The proposal would be effective August 1, 2025.
 - Rationale. Currently, the length of the playing season in basketball fluctuates between 21 or 22 weeks based on the timing of when the championship game occurs. This proposal would standardize the playing and practice season to 22 weeks, eliminating variability in the length of the playing season based on the calendar and/or when the championships are held. The proposal would relieve scheduling compression that currently occurs in years when the playing season is 21 weeks. Shifting the first permissible contest date avoids conflicts with election day and provides flexibility as it relates to potential facility and television window conflicts.
 - 2) Outside Competition Review. (Fairness/Well-Being/Operational) The Men's Basketball Oversight Committee received an update from its Outside

Competition Working Group and will consider concepts that would change the outside competition rules in men's basketball. The Men's Basketball Oversight Committee and NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Oversight Committees will discuss the review and determine next steps during their next joint meeting. The Men's Basketball Oversight Committee anticipates sponsoring a legislative proposal in October as part of the January 2025 legislative cycle.

b. Women's Basketball Oversight Committee.

Playing and Practice Seasons – Women's Basketball – Length of Playing Season. (Well-Being/Operational) The Women's Basketball Oversight Committee introduced legislation into the October 2024 pilot legislative process to specify that an institution shall not play its first regular-season contest (game or scrimmage) with outside competition prior to the Monday of the 22nd week prior to the Division I Women's Basketball Championship game. The proposal would be effective August 1, 2025.

Rationale. Currently, the length of the playing season in basketball fluctuates between 21 or 22 weeks based on the timing of when the championship game occurs. This proposal would standardize the playing and practice season to 22 weeks, eliminating variability in the length of the playing season based on the calendar and/or when the championships are held. The proposal would relieve scheduling compression that currently occurs in years when the playing season is 21 weeks. Shifting the first permissible contest date avoids conflicts with election day and provides flexibility as it relates to potential facility and television window conflicts.

2) Recruiting – Complimentary Admissions – Postseason Conference Tournaments. (Well-Being) The Women's Basketball Oversight Committee introduced legislation into the pilot legislative process to allow a conference office to provide complimentary admissions to a postseason conference tournament, provided the admissions are given for reasons unrelated to recruiting.

Rationale. Current legislation prohibits institutions and conferences from providing complimentary admissions to prospective student-athletes for conference tournaments. This proposal would help conferences build relationships with local communities while also improving student-athlete championship experiences by providing them opportunities to compete in front of larger crowds. The provision of complimentary admissions to conference postseason events would promote conferences, generate interest in women's basketball and attending college, and build goodwill with local communities.

c. NCAA Division I Competition Oversight Committee.

1) Merger of the Competition Oversight Committee and Student-Athlete Experience Committee. (Operational) The council <u>introduced</u> legislation into the October 2024 council-governance legislative cycle to merge the Competition Oversight Committee and Student-Athlete Experience Committee. The proposal would be effective immediately.

Rationale. Outside of the four sport-specific oversight committees (Division I Football Bowl Subdivision Oversight Committee, Football Championship Subdivision Oversight Committee, Men's Basketball Oversight Committee, and Women's Basketball Oversight Committee) there is no distinct oversight committee for the other Division I and national collegiate championship sports that is responsible for the entirety of a sport's ecosystem. Support of all other sports comes from the Competition Oversight Committee or the Student-Athlete Experience Committee, depending on the subject area. This proposed merger is designed to create a system in which sports other than football and basketball and their involved matters are addressed with increased efficiency. The proposed new committee would oversee regulatory matters (e.g., Bylaws 13, 17, 18 and 31) and the sport committees in all sports other than football and basketball would report to it. Importantly, the merging of existing council standing committees does not change the scope of work for sport committees. Sport committees would still primarily be responsible for the administration of the postseason.

- 2) Review of Automatic Qualifier Legislation. (Fairness/Operational) The council received an update on the Competition Oversight Committee's review of current legislation related to automatic qualifier eligibility. The review is based on the number of waiver requests received seeking relief due to post-pandemic and realignment issues, such as conferences seeking to retain an automatic qualification with fewer than five members, or conferences seeking relief of the two-year waiting period. The Competition Oversight Committee agreed to continue evaluating waivers on a case-by-case basis recognizing that conferences continue to face challenges with automatic qualifier access.
- 3) Championship Awards Program. (Well-Being/Operational) The Competition Oversight Committee revised the championship awards program for 2024-25 based on feedback from sport communities. For sports with a single site only, semifinalist trophies will be reinstated, and trophies will be presented to the national champion, runner-up, and two semifinalists. For sports with team place determined by a total of individual points, the fourth-place trophy will be reinstated, and trophies will be presented to the national champion, runner-up, and third place and fourth

place finishers. Semifinalist and fourth place trophies will also be retroactively awarded for 2023-24. Finally, for sports with regionals, the awards program will maintain presenting trophies to regional winners at the regional sites and to the national champion and runner-up at the finals site.

- **Key Topics for Future Discussion.** The Competition Oversight Committee will review site selections for 2026-27 and 2027-28 during future meetings.
- d. Football Bowl Subdivision Oversight Committee and Football Championship Subdivision Oversight Committee.
 - 1) Postseason Football Handbook. (Fairness/Operational) The council received a report that the NCAA Division I Football Bowl Subdivision Oversight Committee Administrative Committee reviewed the 2024-25 NCAA Postseason Bowl Handbook and, at the request of the Football Bowl Subdivision Conference Football Administrators, amended the handbook to permit postseason bowl games to occur approximately one week earlier beginning with the 2024-25 season (e.g., allow postseason bowl games to begin on December 13, 2024).
 - 2) **Key Topics for Future Discussion.** The Football Oversight Committees agreed to review the football playing season including the preseason, first contest date (including contests during week zero), in-season activities, out-of-season conditioning, spring football and summer athletics activities. In addition, the committees received an update on and will continue to discuss women's flag football as a potential emerging sport for women.
- e. NCAA Division I Legislative Committee.
 - Blanket Waiver Countable Aid for Undergraduate Transfer Student-Athletes. (Fairness/Well-Being) The Legislative Committee directed NCAA staff to issue a blanket waiver to allow institutions to exempt otherwise countable athletics aid for undergraduate four-year college transfer student-athletes from team limits during the 2024-25 and 2025-26 academic years when the transfer student-athlete re-enters the NCAA Transfer Portal and no longer participates in intercollegiate athletics at the institution, or the transfer student-athlete has not graduated and has no remaining seasons of eligibility but has time remaining on the student-athlete's five-year period of eligibility. The blanket waiver would not allow athletics aid to be canceled but would allow institutions to exempt disbursed aid from counting against team limits.

- National Letter of Intent Program. (Fairness/Well-Being/Operational) At the request of the Conference Commissioners Association and its National Letter of Intent (NLI) Policy and Review Committee, the Legislative Committee agreed to work with the NLI Advisory Group to explore how to incorporate the core benefits of the NLI program into institutional athletics aid agreements, update NCAA legislation where necessary, and eliminate the NLI program. The goal is to develop a new signing model for the Conference Commissioners Association to review no later than its September 25-26 in-person meeting, with a potential legislative recommendation for the council to consider during its October 2024 meeting, prior to the start of signing year (November 13, 2024).
- Nonscholarship Student-Athletes Transfer Portal Access. (Fairness/ Well-Being) The Legislative Committee discussed lack of access to the NCAA Transfer Portal for nonscholarship student-athletes who are informed they will no longer have a spot on their team after the transfer windows close for the academic year. The Legislative Committee will request feedback from the sport oversight committees, the Student-Athlete Experience Committee and the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee to consider whether legislative change should be considered.
- 4) Key Topics for Future Discussion. During a future meeting, the Legislative Committee will discuss the utility of maintaining rules related to disclosure of outside income and benefits and certification of compliance. Data on recent enforcement trends regarding mandatory disclosure will be reviewed to inform the discussion.

f. Strategic Vision and Planning Committee.

Access to Division I Championship When No Championship is Available in Division II – Men's Ice Hockey. (Fairness/Operational) The council introduced legislation into the October 2024 council-governance legislative cycle to specify that an active Division II member institution is eligible to compete in the Division I Men's Ice Hockey Championship if no men's ice hockey championship is conducted in Division II. The proposal would be effective August 1, 2025.

Rationale. This proposal preserves current access for Division II members that have the opportunity participate in the Division I Men's Ice Hockey Championship because no Division II championship is conducted. This change would preclude access to Division I championships in other sports for institutions that are not active members of Division I, either as a full member or as a multidivisional member in the applicable sport. Generally, only Division I programs should be eligible to participate in Division I

championships. In order to participate in the championship, an eligible Division II institution must be selected pursuant to Division I selection processes and procedures.

- 2) Single-Sport Football Conference Voting. The Strategic Vision and Planning Committee rescinded its previous recommendation that the council adopt expedited legislation regarding Football Championship Subdivision single-sport conference voting requirements to specify that a conference is eligible for voting rights if it plays a full round-robin or conducts a conference schedule that includes at least eight contests.
- 3) Reclassifying Schools Update. (Operational) The council received an update on the status of the 19 institutions currently in the reclassification process (six schools reclassifying from FCS to FBS; 12 from Division II to Division I; and one from Division III to Division I).
- 4) Institutional Reclassification Processes: From Divisions II and III to Division I. (Operational) The Strategic Vision and Planning Committee continues to explore a new reclassification process based on objective standards. A future recommendation may include a three-year transition process for reclassifying institutions from Division II to Division I and a four-year transition process for Division III to Division I with the possibility of accelerating the processes if elevated objective benchmarks are achieved. A reclassification review subgroup was approved by the NCAA Division I Council Coordination Committee to complete the comprehensive review of the reclassification process. The subgroup plans to develop possible legislative recommendations for introduction by the council in October.
- Single-Sport Conference Requirements. (Operational) The Strategic Vision and Planning Committee continues to discuss: (1) Requiring an application and a separate annual fee for each sport (and each gender where applicable); (2) Appropriate minimum number of Division I programs that must be included in each new single-sport conference; and (3) Additional requirements or best practices for all single-sport conferences.

g. Student-Athlete Experience Committee.

1) Recruiting – Complimentary Admissions to Conference Tournaments – Sports Other Than Basketball and Football. (Well-Being) The council introduced legislation into the October legislative cycle, in sports other than basketball and football, to permit a conference to provide members of the community in the locale of the tournament with complimentary admissions. Such complimentary admission provided to a prospective student-athlete shall not be considered a visit to a member institution's campus, provided it

is unrelated to athletics recruitment by the institution. An institution's athletics department or representatives of an institution's athletics interests may not be involved in any way, including in identifying recipients of complimentary admissions. The proposal would be effective immediately.

Rationale. This proposal promotes the growth of conference championship events through additional attendance and the opportunity for enhanced community for engagement. For example, conference offices would be permitted to provide complimentary admissions to community organizations or school districts. Allowing conferences to provide complimentary admissions unrelated to recruitment will not impact competitive equity between member schools. Selection of specific recipients (as individuals, teams or athletics programs) would not be permissible. Any complimentary admission provided by a conference must be unrelated to athletics recruitment and not involve athletics staff at member schools (or boosters) in any way. No recruiting activities in conjunction with the conference championship would be permitted.

Playing and Practice Seasons – First Date of Competition – Men's Water Polo. (Well-Being) The council <u>introduced</u> legislation into the October legislative cycle, in men's water polo, to specify that an institution shall not engage in its first date of competition with outside competition (other than an alumni scrimmage) prior to the Friday that is 14 weeks before the start of the NCAA Division I Men's Water Polo Championship. The proposal would be effective August 1, 2025. If adopted, the first permissible date of competition would move up seven days in 2025.

<u>Rationale</u>. Establishing a first date of competition dependent on the date of the Division I Men's Water Polo Championship will promote consistency in the start of the 14-week championship segment. This proposal was unanimously supported at the Association of Collegiate Water Polo Coaches Convention.

3) Playing and Practice Seasons – Dates of Competition – Men's Lacrosse Nonchampionship Segment. (Well-Being) The council introduced legislation into the October legislative cycle, in men's lacrosse, to specify that an institution shall limit its total playing schedule with outside competition during the playing season to 17 dates of competition during the segment in which the NCAA championship is conducted and three dates of competition during the nonchampionship segment. The proposal would be effective August 1, 2025.

<u>Rationale</u>. Currently, an institution is permitted 17 dates of competition, which may be divided between the championship and nonchampionship

segments as the institution chooses. Under the current legislation, programs are struggling to establish a competitive championship segment while also saving playing dates to help develop student-athletes in the nonchampionship segment, which is a time of year less likely to be impacted by severe weather. This proposal would enhance the student-athlete experience and the development of student-athletes in the nonchampionship segment without expanding the existing 132-day season. The proposed structure is similar to that of other sports, including women's lacrosse, which allows five nonchampionship dates of competition. This proposal would maintain the prohibition on missed class time during the nonchampionship segment.

Playing and Practice Seasons – First Date of Practice in Championship Segment – Women's Lacrosse. (Well-Being) The council introduced legislation into the October legislative cycle, in women's lacrosse, to specify that an institution shall not commence practice sessions in the championship segment before the second Saturday in January.

<u>Rationale</u>. By moving up the first permissible practice date by one week, women's lacrosse student-athletes would have a longer transition period between the start of practice and competition, which would benefit their physical and mental health. Although the first opportunity to practice would occur one week earlier, the playing season would not be extended beyond the current limit of 132 days.

- 5) Duration of Transfer Portal Windows Sports Other Than Basketball and Football. (Fairness/Operational) The Student-Athlete Experience Committee discussed a potential modification to reduce the notification of transfer windows for sports other than basketball and football from 45 to 30 days. The committee will consider feedback from the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee prior to consideration of making a recommendation to modify the transfer windows. The Student-Athlete Experience Committee continues to support the following:
 - a) In fall and spring sports, a 30-day notification of transfer window beginning seven days after championships selections and a second 15-day transfer window that occurs at the conclusion of the semester of the nonchampionship segment; and
 - b) In winter sports, a continuous 45-day transfer window beginning seven days after championships selections.
- 6) Baseball Legislative Review Subgroup. (Fairness/Operational) The council received a report on the composition and work of the Baseball

Legislative Review Subgroup of the Student-Athlete Experience Committee, which was approved by the Council Coordination Committee. The subgroup expects to present a package of recommendations to the Student-Athlete Experience Committee during its October meeting. The Student-Athlete Experience Committee will consider the recommendations and determine if any concepts should be presented to the council for introduction as legislative proposals.

- 10. Report From the Division I Student-Athlete Advisory Committee. (Well-Being/Operational) The council received a report from the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee noting changes to the committee's composition and an update on agenda items the committee plans to cover during its meeting on July 9-11 in Indianapolis, including transfer portal windows, sports wagering, the NCAA fan database, student-athlete survey updates and recent legislative changes.
- 11. Report From the NCAA Division I Committee on Academics. The council received a report from the Committee on Academics that included the following informational items.
 - a. Review of Transfer Policy Issues. (Academics/Fairness/Well-Being/Operational) The Committee on Academics updated the council on the referrals from the NCAA Division I Board of Directors to create a transfer "Graduation Passport" and a transfer academic progress rate. The Committee on Academics is examining available data to develop policy and/or legislative recommendations.
 - b. Variables Impacting Student-Athlete Academic Performance. (Academics/Well-Being) The council received an update on the developments of plans and possible data collection to inform the impact of name, image and likeness activities, sports wagering and conference realignment on the academic performance of student-athletes.
 - **c. Division I Academic Unit.** (Academics/Operational) It was noted that 308 (87%) of Division I schools qualified for the academic unit this year.
 - **d.** Additional Discussion Items. (Academics/Fairness/Well-Being/Operational) The Committee on Academics continues to review the following key items:
 - 1) Continued support for Limited Resourced Institutions/Historically Black Colleges and Universities through the NCAA Accelerating Academic Success Program grant management and educational and outreach initiatives.
 - 2) Integration of the degree completion legislation contained within the student-athlete holistic model into current degree completion opportunities.

- 3) Committee on Academics representation on the Baseball Legislative Review Subgroup and the Strategic Vision and Planning Committee's review of membership requirements.
- **12. Annual Review of Division I Council Policies and Procedures.** (Operational) The council reviewed and ratified changes to council policies and procedures and NCAA Division I Nominating Committee policies and procedures that were approved by the Council Coordination Committee in the previous year.
- **13. Report of the April Council Videoconference.** (Operational) The council approved the report of its April 17-18 videoconference.
