Dear College Football All-Star Game Administrators,

As the conclusion of the college football season nears, please be reminded of the rules for NFL club personnel to attend college all-star games and of player eligibility rules for the 2024 NFL Draft.

NFL club employees are prohibited from becoming involved, directly or indirectly, in the recruitment of players for any college all-star event. Such personnel are prohibited from directly participating in the process of selecting and inviting players to any all-star event, though it is permissible to offer opinions about players to the sponsors of such all-star event. NFL club personnel are not permitted to recommend to players or their representatives that they participate in a certain all-star event or withdraw from an all-star event to which they have made a commitment or engage in any other activity that can reasonably be construed as recruiting a player to participate in an event. In addition, such personnel must not discourage players from participating in such events.

**A. Attendance of Club Personnel at College All-Star Games.** In May, you were advised of revised NFL rules governing attendance by NFL club personnel at college all-star games.

NFL club personnel will be permitted to attend the practice sessions and/or game of a college all-star event under the following conditions:

1. Participating players are not required to pay (e.g., a registration fee) to attend such event. However, the game may require players to pay for reasonable and customary travel and lodging costs (no miscellaneous fees or costs can be included.) Additionally, all participants must be treated equally. For example, the all-star game can't pay for travel and lodging for some players and not for others.
2. Players are not paid by the college all-star game for attendance or participation.
3. The game administrators carry insurance (*i.e.*, per player liability and/or umbrella) to protect participating players while in attendance at the event, including but not limited to practice sessions and the game.
4. Practice sessions do not include Combine-type drills. Scouts are only permitted to attend customary practice sessions. Player measurements and interviews are permitted.
5. The game is played by two squads in a bona fide football game (e.g., 11-on-11, offense/defense/special teams, four downs, win-loss-tie standard), located in a stadium with tickets being sold to the public. The game must consist of timed quarters or halves, with statistics and scoring recorded. The game must use football playing rules from the high school, college, or professional level, and be officiated by game officials from such entities.

6. Free agents, underclassmen, or players under contract to other professional football leagues do not participate in the event.
  - Upon being officially announced by the NFL as having been granted special eligibility, the East-West Shrine Bowl, HBCU Legacy Bowl, and Senior Bowl may invite underclassmen to participate in their respective practices and games.
  - Only members of a college all-star game roster may be timed, tested, and interviewed in the metropolitan area of the city in which the all-star game is being held. Draft-eligible players who are not part of the college all-star game are not eligible for such activities.
7. The college all-star game does not charge NFL clubs a fee for scouting personnel to attend its event(s) or to pay for different levels of scouting information, including but not limited to access to players, scouting reports, or game information. However, games may charge NFL clubs for the use of a suite at the stadium.

If any of the above-defined conditions are not met, NFL club personnel are prohibited from attending the all-star event and/or receiving video or statistics from the event.

Each game may decide to organize and conduct its event as it desires, these rules apply to NFL personnel only.

- B. **Underclassmen in College All-Star Games.** As referenced in Section A6 above, earlier this year, the NFL revised its policy regarding underclassmen participating in college all-star games. Upon the NFL publicly announcing that a player has been granted special eligibility, the **East-West Shrine Bowl, HBCU Legacy Bowl, and Senior Bowl** may invite such players to participate in their respective game activities. Only these three games are permitted to invite underclassmen to participate.
- C. **Player Eligibility.** Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the NCAA granted all 2020 fall sport student-athletes an additional year of eligibility. As a result, many college football players participating in the 2023 fall season are using a fifth year of eligibility.

Since the NCAA has not provided guidance to their colleges on how to label a player's experience, you may notice that some schools have labelled players entering their fourth season of full-time competition as "juniors," while other schools have chosen to label them as "seniors." Given that the experience labels across various colleges may differ (e.g., senior versus junior), college all-star game personnel should be particularly diligent in reviewing eligibility of potential players and should contact the NFL Player Personnel department if there is any uncertainty regarding a specific player's eligibility.

**It is highly recommended that prior to inviting a player, you contact the compliance office for their respective school to confirm that they have exhausted their eligibility.**

1. **General Rules of Eligibility.** Attached to this document is a chart that can be used to determine a player's eligibility status for the 2024 NFL Draft ("2024 NFL Draft Eligibility Chart"). Please review the following guidelines and clarifications that are in place for the 2024 NFL Draft.

The NFL's general rules for eligibility state that a college football student-athlete will become eligible for the upcoming NFL Draft if the player meets one of the following requirements:

- a. All college football eligibility of such player has expired through participation in college football (expiration does not include a loss of college football eligibility through withdrawal from school, dismissal, or signing of a professional contract in another football league); or
- b. Such player has graduated and received a diploma from a recognized four-year college or university prior to the beginning of the National Football League's next regular season; or
- c. Five League seasons have elapsed since such player first attended, practiced football at, or participated in football games for a recognized junior college, college, or university; or
- d. Such player did not play or otherwise participate in college football, and four League seasons have elapsed since the player first entered or first attended college; or
- e. Such player has been granted eligibility through special permission of the Commissioner.

Players who only qualify via Subparagraph (b) or Subparagraph (e) above, will be required to notify the Commissioner by January 15, 2024, of their intent to enter the 2024 NFL Draft.

2. **Automatic Eligibility.** The following are examples of players who are automatically eligible for the 2024 NFL Draft.
  - a. A player who entered college in 2020, and who did not redshirt in 2021, 2022, or 2023, and was a member of his school's team in 2020 (including any player who opted out), is automatically eligible for the 2024 NFL Draft.
  - b. A player who entered college in 2019, and who received a redshirt year in 2019, 2021, 2022, or 2023, and was a member of his school's team in 2020 (including any player who opted out), is automatically eligible for the 2024 NFL Draft.

- c. A player who entered college in 2019, and who did not redshirt in 2019, 2021, 2022, or 2023, and is a member of his school's team this fall, is automatically eligible for the 2024 NFL Draft regardless of whether the player removed his name from eligibility in the 2023 NFL Draft ("Draft Opt-Out") or was eligible for the 2023 NFL Draft ("Repeat Eligibility").

3. **Clarifications.** The following clarifications are in effect for the 2024 NFL Draft:

- a. Any college football player who participates in his fourth season of full-time eligibility, as distinguished from those who "redshirt," during the 2023 college football season will be deemed to be automatically eligible for the 2024 NFL Draft; and
- b. The 2020 college football season will be considered one season of participation for all college football student-athletes. This includes, but is not limited to: (i) players who "opted out" of the 2020 college season; (ii) players who received a redshirt year in 2020; (iii) players who were academically ineligible for 2020; (iv) players who attended schools that cancelled their 2020 football seasons; (v) players who attended schools that played their 2020 seasons in the spring of 2021.

It is not necessary for such players to notify the League office to become eligible for the Principal Draft under this provision.

4. **Opting Out of the 2024 NFL Draft.** The deadline for a player to submit a notice to not be considered for the 2024 NFL Draft to the NFL Player Personnel department is **Friday, February 2, 2024**. If a player provides notice by this date, NFL clubs are prohibited from selecting the player in the 2024 NFL Draft. The February 2 deadline does not preclude a player from informing NFL clubs at a later date that he is returning to school in the fall of 2024. However, if a player informs clubs of his decision after the February 2 deadline, he may still be selected in the 2024 Draft. If the player is selected and subsequently returns to school, the NFL club will retain the player's exclusive negotiating rights as if selected in the 2025 Draft, but with the rookie pool amount allocated in the 2024 Draft.
5. **College Advisory Committee.** Prospects who are considering applying for special eligibility may submit an evaluation request to the NFL Player Personnel department through their school's athletic department following the school's last regular season football game. The soft deadline, for which an evaluation is guaranteed, is **Friday, December 15, 2023**. The hard deadline, for which best efforts will be made to get a player an evaluation prior to the special eligibility deadline is **Friday, January 5, 2024**.
6. **Special Eligibility.** The NFL has implemented a new process for prospects who have completed their college seasons, including postseason games, to petition for special eligibility into the NFL Draft.
  - a. An early "soft" deadline of **Friday, January 5, 2024**, has been added to permit players whose seasons are complete to submit their petitions sooner. Players will then have 72 hours from the deadline to revoke their submission. NFL clubs will receive an initial list of these players on **Tuesday, January 9, 2024**.

- b. The traditional "hard" deadline to submit a special eligibility petition is **Monday, January 15, 2024**, seven days after the FBS National Championship Game. Players will have 72 hours from the deadline to revoke their submission. NFL clubs will receive the full list of players who have been granted special eligibility for the 2024 Draft on **Friday, January 19, 2024**.

The additional early date was implemented to permit players who were approved for special eligibility to be invited to select college all-star games in a timely manner.

7. **Frequently Asked Questions.** Below are Frequently Asked Questions regarding 2024 NFL Draft and College All-Star Game eligibility.

**Q1. If a player participates in our game, can he still go back to school and utilize his COVID year?**

**A1.** While that decision is in the hands of the NCAA, the NCAA has informed our office that a player who participates in a college all-star game greatly jeopardizes his ability utilize the additional COVID year. Participating in your game or signing with an agent will most likely sacrifice the players ability to return to school.

**Q2. Is a player who is listed as a 4th-year player, and has not redshirted (excluding the COVID year), immediately eligible to be invited to a college all-star game?**

**A2.** Yes. He may be invited and can participate in the college all-star game because he is automatically eligible for the 2024 NFL Draft.

**Q3. If a player is considered automatically eligible for the Draft, does the player's graduation semester have any impact on whether the player can be invited to a college all-star game?**

**A3.** No. If the player is automatically eligible for the 2024 NFL Draft and is not opting out of the Draft, he can be invited, even if he has yet to officially graduate. As an example, if a player initially enrolled in 2020 and was a full participant in all four seasons (i.e., did not receive a redshirt) then such player is deemed to be automatically eligibility for the Draft. Assuming such player does not opt out of the Draft, then the player may be invited to participate regardless of his graduation status.


**Q4. Can an underclassman participate in a college all-star game?**

**A4.** Except for the East-West Shrine Bowl, HBCU Legacy Bowl and the Senior Bowl, NFL personnel are prohibited from attending a college all-star game that has prospects who are underclassmen participating in activities.

Such underclassmen may not be invited until the NFL publicly announces its list of underclassmen for have been granted special eligibility.
